Dublin-Castle, January 5, 1795.

This Evening, about Nine o'Clock, the Earl of Westmorland, late Lord Lieutenant of this Kingdom, embarked on Board the Duchess of Rutland Packet-Boat, on his Return to England.

The Earl of Westmorland went from the Castle in the State Coach, accompanied by Lord Viscount Milton,

Milton, the Lord Lieutenant's Chief Secretary, on Account of his Excellency's Indisposition, preceded by a leading Coach, in which were the Officers of State, to the Pigeon-House, from whence the Earl of Westmorland went on Board the Packet-Boat. His Lordship was escorted by a Squadron of Dragoon Guards, and attended by a great Number of the Nobility and Persons of Distinction, the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, several of the Aldermen, and principal Citizens, in their Carriages, followed by a Concourse of People, to the Water Side. The Streets were lined by the Regiments of Infantry on Dublin Duty, and every Demonstration of Respect was shewn to his Lordship, in passing through the Streets, from the People, who testified their Regard by repeated Wishes for his Welfare and safe Return to England.
