Several Persons, whose Names are thereunto subscribed, being Citizens of the City of Carlisle in the County of Cumberland, having this Day presented their Petition to the House of Commons, setting forth, that by a late Resolution of a Select Committee of this House appointed to try the Merits of the Petition of John Christian Curwen and Wilson Braddyll, Esquires, complaining of an undue Election and Return of the City of Carlisle, in the County of Cumberland, and which, on the 3d Day of March 1791, was by them reported to the House, that the Right of Election for the City of Carlisle, in the County of Cumberland, is declared to be in the Freemen of the said City, duly admitted and sworn Freemen of the said

City, having been previously admitted Brethren of One of the Eight Guilds or Occupations of the said City, and deriving their Title to such Freedom by being Sons of Freemen, or by Service of Seven Years Apprenticeship to a Freeman, resident during such Apprenticeship within the said City, and in no others: That the Petitioners are not satisfied with the said Resolution, and are desirous of being admitted Parties to oppose such Right of Election, and to have the Benefit of the Statute in that Case made and provided; and thereupon pray the House to take the Premises into Consideration, and grant the Petitioners such Relief therein as the House shall think fit. I do hereby give Notice that the House has appointed Thursday the Twenty-sixth Day of February next, at Three of the Clock in the Afternoon, to take the said Petition into Consideration. I do hereby give Notice that the House has appointed Tuesday the Tenth Day of February next to take the said Petition into Consideration, at the same Time that the Petition of several Persons, whose Names are thereunto subscribed on Behalf of themselves and others, being legal Electors or Members to serve in Parliament for the Town and Port of Seaford in the County of Suffex, is ordered to be taken into Consideration.
