I is Majesty has been pleased to cause His Royal Proclamation to be issued, For the Apprehending certain Persons therein Named, Accused of High Treason:

CHARLES R.

Hereas it appeareth by Information upon Outh, That Francis Evers, alias Ewic, alias Ireland; late of Tixall in the County of Stafford, John Gaven, late of Wolverhampton in the same County, Vavasor, aliss Gissord, late of Boscobell in the Jame County, Edward Levison, late of Wilnott in the Jame County (being all fessies) and also Broadlirect, late of Horecross m. the same County (a Popish Priest) are guilty of the late Damnable and Treasonable Plot for destruction of the Kings Royal Person, the Subversion of the Government, and for the Extirpation of the True Protestant Religion Established by Lawwithin this Kingdom; The Kings most Excellent Majesty (with Advice of Hr Privy Council) doth by This His Royal Proclamation straitly Charge and Com-mand all and every Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Mayors, Constables, and other His Majesties Officers and Loyal Subjects what soever, That they do use their utmost and most effectual endeavour for the Apprehending and Securing of the said Offenders, and of every of them, and after such their Apprehension, they do with all speed and care, bring them and every of them unto, and before one of His Majesties Principal Secretaries of State, or the Chief Fustice of His Majesties Cours, of Kings Bench, to be by them, or one of them, Examined, and Committed to safe Cusholy, in order to their Tevel and Committed to Safe Custody, in order to their Tryal. And His Majesty doch hereby straitly Forbid and Prohibit any of His Subjects from Concealing, Shelsaring, Relieving, or Receiving any of the Said Offenders, under Peril of being themselves proceeded against (as by Law they may) for the Crime of High Treason. And for the better Encouragement of such as shall do their Duty berein, His Majesty doth hereby Graciously promise to any who shall Discover and Apprehend the said Exces, the Sum of One hundred pounds; and to any who shall Discover and Apprehend any other of the said Offenders, the Reward of Fifty pounds; which said respective Sums shall be immediately respectively paid down to the person or persons who shall Apprehend the said Evers, or any other of the Offenders aforesaid, and shall bring, of Eauje to be brought, such of them before either of His Majeflies said Principal Secretaries, or the faid Chief

Given at Our Court at Whitehall, the Fifteenth day of Fanuary 167 in the Thirtieth Year of Our Reign.

Dantzick, Fan, 7. The Suedes Army in Prussia is now in motion again, having lost good Spisors is

Tilfe, Ragnizz, and other Posts that may be of use to them; they have had the good fortune to take a ceratain Castle, where they found a very great quantity of Corn, and we are now expecting to hear in a day or two of their entring upon some considerable Action: It is said, that they have received some fresh Troops by the way of Courland, and that the Forces which have lay'n so long in these Parts will join them; on the other side it is certain, that the Elector of Brandenburgh is coming this way. From Poland they write, that the Crown Treasurer, who has been in Italy and France, was returned home, and that he had brought with him from France a very great Sum of Money, which, it's thought, may dispose things in Poland very much in savor of the Suedes.

Berlin, Jan. 11. The 9th instant the Elector of Brandenburg, accompanied with his Dutchess and the Electoral Prince, parted hence for Prussa, where his Electoral Highnesses presence will yery much assure the minds of people; which are squaewhat dejected, to see an Enemies Army advances with the heart of their Country. The Heer Tramp accompanied his Electoral Highness as far as Susprin, from whence he intended to take his, way to Marienwalk,

and so to return for Holland.

Hamburgh, Jan. 13. The Alliance between Dens mark, Brandenburgh, and the Princes of Qunenburg, for the security of the Conquells they have made during this War, is ratifi d; and hereupon the Duke of Zell hath caused a new Oath of Fidelity to be taken by the Inhabitants of Stade. We are told that in pursuance of a particular agreement between the Duke of Hanoner, and the Bilhop of Munster, the latter will put the Dutchy of Ferden into the possession of that Duke. The Elector of Brandenburg is on his way for Prussia, whither he takes with him his Dutcheis and his whole Court. The Letters from Dantzick fay, that the Suedes are hitherto abfolute Masters in Prussa, and that nothing can with 1 fland them, till the Forces from pomeren artive, which were impatiently expected there,

Talogue, Jani 20. One of the Syndics of this City, having been sent by the Magistrates for Holland to receive into their Service some of the Troops disbanded there, he hath performed his Commission, and yesterday in the evening arrived here 400 of these new raifed Men, and 300 more, who stay'd the last night on the other fide of the Rhine at Duyts, are expected here to day; and feeing our fears of the French increase every day, the Troops of the Allies which are now lodged in Wetteravia, are to come down this way, and to have their Head-quarter at Mulbeim, for the lecurity of this City, as well as of Bon and Dufelderit; this last place is at present guarded by 2000 Boors, and fix Companies of Dragoons of the Holflein Regiment, but the Boots will in a day or two be xelieved by a Regiment of Brandenburg, and another of Ofnabrug. Several pieces of Cannon have within these two dayes been brought upon the walls of this City, and all other care is taken for our defence.

Bruffels & Fan. 17. On Sunday arrived the Spawish Ordinary, and brought Bills for a considerable Sum of Money, which, with what his Excellency reneixed before, amounts to a Million of Crowns. Yesterday Monsieur de Fue marched with several Rogiments towards Aeth, which is this day to be put into his hands, and to morrow other Regiments march from Dendermond to Audenzed, which is to be delivered up the 11 to the Baron Gurier. Ghent will be the last place evacuated, and the Inhabitants are like to be left in a very poor condition, for belides the great Suras of Money the French have already drawn from them, they now make a new demand of 228 thousand Florins, upon account of Quarters, Impoles, and other the Kings Duties for the months of November, December and Fanuary; and if that Sum be not raised, the Governour threatens he will give the Soldiers in Garifon Free-quarter upon the Burghers, till such time as that City is evacuated, which is to be on the 26th instant. Last Night Sir Samuel Clerke came hither from Flanders, where he had embarked some of the English Troops for England; those that are quartered in Brabant will follow, as foon as the weather will permit their paffing down the Schelde to Zealand, in order to their embarking on the Ships appointed for their Transportation. Within few dayes a Chapter is to be held here of the Knights of the Galden Fleece, to regulate the manner of his Excellencies Reception into that Order, which they intend shall be very fplendid and extraordinary, his Excellency being the first Governor of the Spanish Netherlands, who during his Government hath been made Knight of that Order. The Prince de Mamines is sent for, and isto preside in the said Chapter, as being the eldest Knight of that Order in these Countries, and will be accompanied with the Prince de Nassau, the Prince de Chimay, the Prince de Roeberq, the Duke d'Haure, the Prince de Vaudemont, and the Marquis de Conflans; the Duke d'Aerschot will receive the Order at the same time with his Excellency,

Ditto, Fan. 201 Acth, as we told you in our last, was evacuated the 17th instant, the Baron de Fue is now setling the Garison there. The Baron de Gurrier is gone to take possession of Audenarde with two Regiments, one of Spaniards, and the other of Wallows. There are not at present any Soldiers in Garison here, except his Excellencies Guards. The Solemsity of his Excellencies Reception into the Order of the Golden Fleece, is appointed to be the 20th of the

next month after his Excellencies return from Flanders, whither he goes immediately after the evacuas tion of Ghent. The Marquis de Rhisberg hath also a promise of the Order given him, but he must slay till there is a vacancy, the whole number being now complete. From Liege of the 18th inflant they write, that Monsieur Calvo is marched with some Troops towards Haffelt which place, it's faid, the Dutch will deliver up to him. It is faid here that the States General of the United Provinces will put Maestricht into the hands of the Spaniards, pirsuance to an Article of the Treaty made between Spain and them, when the lateWar first broke out. From Strasburg of the 13th we are told, that the French continue their preparations on that fide for fome great Enterprize; and that they are making a very large way through Suntgow to Brifao, which was to be finished about the middle of this month + and that the Sieur de Monclar was come to Benfelt with a considerable Body of Horse.

Hague, Jan. 24. His Highness having settled affairs at Utrecht, went thence yesterday to Naerden, of which place he has made the Heer Colliers Governor, and so will continue his Journey for Gelderland. The Letters we receive this morning from Nimeguen, say, that the success of the Treaty between the Imperial and French Ambassadors, was as yet somewhat doubtful, for that there still remained difficulties which seemed hard to be removed.

Marfeilles, Fan. to. We are told that at Thoulos they are fitting out 10 Men of War, and two Fire-flips, defigned, as is reported here, to be employed against the Tripolius, in order to the obliging that Government to make a Peace with this Crown, which they have hitherto refused. We have no account from Sir John Narborough, since his departure from Alicans for Argiers. Here is a report that those Corsairs have lately taken two English Vossels on this Coast bound for Italy, the one laden with Corn, the other with Lead and Piece Goods, but we hope it will prove a mistake. Some dayes since passed by this Port 17 or 18 English Ships, bound for several places of Italy.

Parit, Fan. 25. From Flanders we have an account, that Charleroy. Aeth and Audenard were evacuated, and actually delivered up to the Spaniards, as Comray was to be the 22d inflant, and Ghest the 22d of February. The Datch Ambassadors have not yet made their Publick Audience. From Asface we hear, that the Sieur de Monclar was the 11th instant with 1500 Horse at Benfelt, upon some design that was kept secret. The preparations for War in those Parts are continued with great application.
