WE, taking into Our most serious Consideration the just and necessary War in which We are engaged with France, and putting Our Trust in Almighty God, that He will graciously bless Our Arms, both by Sea and Land, have resolved, and do, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, That a Publick Fast and Humiliation be observed throughout that Part of Our Kingdom of Great Britain called England, Our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, on Wednesday the Twenty-fifth Day of February next; that so both We and Our People may humble Ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain Pardon of Our Sins; and may, in the most devout and solemn Manner, send up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty, for averting those heavy Judgments which Our manifold Sins and Provocations have most justly deserved; and imploring his Blessing and Assistance on Our Arms, and for restoring and perpetuating Peace, Safety and Prosperity to Us and Our Kingdoms: And We do strictly charge and command, That the said Publick Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in England, Our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation; and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as

contemn and neglect the Performance of so religious and necessary a Duty. And for the better and more orderly solemnizing the same, We have given Directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops, and the Right Reverend the Bishops of England, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to this Occasion, to be used in all Churches, Chapels, and Places of Publick Worship; and to take Care the same be timely dispersed throughout their respective Dioceses.

Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty, for averting those heavy Judgements which Our manifold Sins and Provocations have most justly deserved, and imploring His Blessing and Assistance on Our Arms, and for restoring and perpetuating Peace, Safety, and Prosperity to Us and Our Kingdoms: And We do strictly charge and command, That the said Publick Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in Scotland, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation; and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as contemn and neglect the Performance of so religious and necessary a Duty. Our Will is therefore, and We charge, That this Our Proclamation seen, ye forthwith pass to the Market-Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there, in Our Name and Authority, make Publication hereof, that none pretend Ignorance: And Our Will and Pleasure is, That Our Solicitor do cause printed Copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We ordain to see the same published; and We appoint them to send Copies hereof to the several Parish Churches within their Bounds, that upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the Day above-mentioned, the same may be published, and read from the Pulpits, immediately after Divine Service.

HIS Majesty, judging it expedient, under the present Circumstances, to admit into the Ports of this Kingdom all Goods, Wares, Merchandizes and Effects belonging to the Subjects or Inhabitants of the United Provinces, or to any of His Majesty's Subjects who may have Goods, Wares, Merchandizes or Effects in the said United Provinces, in order that the same may be preserved in safe Custody, is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, That all Goods, Wares, Merchandizes and Effects whatsoever, coming directly from any of the Ports of the United Provinces to any of the Ports of this Kingdom, in the Vessels of any Country, and navigated in any Manner, be permitted, until further Order, to be landed, and to be secured in Warehouses, under the joint Locks of His Majesty and of the Proprietors, at the

Risk and Expence of the said Proprietors, there to remain in safe Custody, for the Benefit of the Proprietors thereof, until due Provision shall be made by Law to enable such Proprietors to re-export, or otherwise dispose of the same. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

W H E R E A S the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Sixteenth of July last, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, will expire upon the Twenty-fifth Day of this instant January; and whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer: His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever do at Time, for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Twenty-fifth Day of this instant January, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, any Pig Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores; or ship or lade any of the Articles above mentioned on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the Exportation of Naval Stores, and more effectually to prevent the Exportation of Salt-Petre, Arms and Ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council." But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships or Vessels or Boats, in the Service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's

esty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on Board such Quantities of Naval Stores as may be necessary for the Use of such Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being; nor to the Exportation of the said several Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America, or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa; or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of any of the said Articles, for the Purposes of Trade, to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America, or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of such Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are so entered Outwards, and for the Purposes specified, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up, until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

SEVERAL Persons, whose Names are thereunto subscribed, Electors of Members to serve in Parliament for the City and Liberty of Westminster, having this Day presented their Petition to the House of Commons, setting forth, That the Petitioners observe by the Votes of the House, that the Select Committee lately appointed to try and determine the Merits of a Petition of Sir Samuel Hood, Baronet, Lord Hood in the Kingdom of Ireland, and also a Petition of several Inhabitants, Householders of the City and Liberty

of Westminster, paying Scot and Lot, severally complaining of an undue Election for the said City and Liberty, did, on the Sixth Day of July, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-nine, report to the House, "That it appeared to the said Select Committee, that the Merits of the Petitions did, in Part, depend upon the Right of Election; the Parties were therefore required to deliver in Statements, in Writing, of the Right of Election for which they respectively contended." That in consequence thereof the Petitioner, Lord Hood, delivered in a Statement as follows: "The Petitioner, Lord Hood, states the Right of Election for the City and Liberty of Westminster is in the Inhabitants Householders, paying Scot and Lot, within the united Parishes of St. Margaret and St. John, and the several Parishes of St. Paul Covent Garden, St. Ann, St. James, St. George Hanover-square, in the Liberty of St. Martin le Grand in the County Middlesex, and in so much of the Parishes of St. Martin in the Fields, St. Clement Danes and St. Mary le Strand, as are not within any of the Four Wards of the Liberty of the Dutchy of Lancaster, called the Temple-Bar Ward, the Royal Ward, the Middle Ward, and Precinct of the Savoy." That the Electors Petitioners delivered in a Statement as follows: "The Electors Petitioners state, that the Right of Election for the City and Liberty of Westminster is in the Inhabitants Householders, paying Scot and Lot, within the united Parishes of St. Margaret and St. John, in the several Parishes of St. Paul Covent Garden, St. Ann, St. James, St. George Hanover-square, in the Liberty of St. Martin le Grand in the County of Middlesex, and in so much of the Parishes of St. Martin in the Fields, St. Clement Danes, and St. Mary le Strand, as are not within any of the Four Wards of the Liberty of the Dutchy of Lancaster, called the Temple Bar Ward, the Royal Ward, the Middle Ward, and the Precinct of the Savoy." That the Sitting Member, Lord John Townshend, delivered in a statement as follows: "The Right of Election is in the Inhabitants Householders, of the Parishes of St. Margaret and St. John, St. George Hanover-square, St. James Westminster, St. Martin in the Fields, St. Clement Danes, St. Mary le Strand, St. Mary le Savoy, St. Paul Covent Garden, St. Ann Soho, and the District of St. Martin le Grand." That upon the Statement delivered in by the Petitioners, the said Select Committee have determined, "That the Right of Election for the City and Liberty of Westminster is in the Inhabitants Housekeepers, paying Scot and Lot, within the united Parishes of St. Margaret and St. John, and the several Parishes of St. Paul Covent Garden, St. Ann, St. James, St. George Hanover-square, in the Liberty of St. Martin le Grand in the County of Middlesex, and in so much of the Parishes of St. Martin in the Fields, St. Clement Danes and St. Mary le Strand, as are not within any of the Four Wards of the Liberty of the Dutchy of Lancaster." That upon the Statement delivered in by the Sitting Member, the Committee have determined, "That the Right of Election, as set forth in the said Statement, is not the Right of Election for the said City and Liberty of Westminster." And that the Petitioners are advised,

and humbly insist, that the Right of Election which hath been deemed valid in the Judgment of the said Select Committee, is not the ancient and true Right of Election for the said City and Liberty, and therefore pray, that they may be admitted as Parties to oppose the Right of Election, which has been deemed valid in the Judgment of the said Select Committee, and that the Petitioners may have such further and other Relief in the Premises as to the House shall seem meet, and the Nature of the Case may require. I do hereby give Notice, that the House has appointed Tuesday the Third Day of March next, at Three of the Clock in the Afternoon, to take the said Petition into Consideration. THE Sovereign having signified his Pleasure to invest the Earl of Westmorland, late Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, with the Ensigns of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, of which he had been elected a Knight Companion in Chapter on the 12th of June, 1793, the following Knights and Officers of the Order attended at St. James's in their Mantles, Collars, &c. viz.

Their Royal Highnesses the Prince of Wales, Dukes of Gloucester and York, his Grace the Duke of Grafton, and the Marquis of Stafford, the Chancellor, Garter, and Black Rod; and a Procession was made into His Majesty's Closet.

The Earl of Westmorland being introduced by the Duke of Grafton and the Marquis of Stafford, the Sovereign, assisted by Their Royal Highnesses the Senior Knights, buckled the Garter on his Lordship's Leg, and invested him with the Ribbon and George, the Chancellor reading the Admonitions.

Office for Auditing the Public Accounts,

WHEREAS divers Persons, to whom Money has been issued for Public Services, have neglected to deliver into this Office the Vouchers for the Expenditure thereof, together with an Account Current, in the Manner and within the Time prescribed by the Act for better examining and Auditing the Public Accounts of this Kingdom, the Commissioners for Auditing the Public Accounts have directed that Copies of the following Sections of the said Act be inserted in the London Gazette, in order that all Persons to whom Public Money has been, or shall be, so issued, may be informed of the Consequences of such Neglect.

SECTION XVII. And whereas great Losses and Inconveniencies have arisen to the Public, by Sub-Accountants not having been-put in Charge till a long

long Time has elapsed after the Monies were issued to them, be it enacted, That the Paymaster-General of His Majesty's Forces, the Treasurer of the Navy, the Treasurer of the Ordnance, and every other Public Officer who shall hereafter pay into the Hands of any Person or Persons whomsoever, Money for Public Services, by Way of Imprest or on Account, shall, within Thirty Days of the 31st Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-five, and within Thirty Days of the 31st Day of December in every future Year, transmit an Account of all Sums of Money issued or paid by him or them to any Person or Persons, for the Public Service, within the preceding Year, to the Commissioners to be appointed under the Authority of this Act; who shall, and they are hereby required forthwith to transmit Duplicates of the same to His Majesty's Remembrancer in the Court of Exchequer, who shall immediately, on Receipt of such Accounts, put the several Sums so issued in Charge against the Parties, in like Manner as is now practised with respect to Persons who receive Money by Way of Imprest, and on Account, at the Receipt of His Majesty's Exchequer.

SECTION XVIII. Provided always, and be it enacted, That no Accountant shall be allowed in his Account any Sum which he shall issue or pay over to any Sub-Accountants, unless he shall have transmitted to the said Commissioners regular Accounts thereof, in the Manner and within the Times abovementioned; unless Proof shall be produced, to the Satisfaction of the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of the Treasury, that any Failure of transmitting the same did not happen from the wilful Neglect of the Person issuing or paying over the Money as aforesaid.

SECTION XX. And be it further enacted and declared, That every Sub-Accountant to whom Money shall hereafter be issued for Public Services, in case the Money so issued shall have been for Services to be performed in Great Britain, shall deliver into the Office of the Commissioners to be appointed by virtue of this Act, the Vouchers for the Expenditure thereof, together with an Account Current, within Three Months of the End of each Year from the Commencement of his Account, unless it has been usual for such Account to be made up to any fixed Period in the Year; in which Case they shall be delivered within Three Months of the usual annual Time of the Determination of such Account respectively; and in case such Monies shall have been issued for Services to be performed in any Part of Europe out of this Kingdom, then the Vouchers shall be delivered within Four Months of the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; if in the West Indies, the Continent of America, or in Africa, within Six Months after the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; and if in the East Indies, within Twelve Months after the Expiration of each Year's Accounts; unless it shall in each and every Case be made appear to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of the Treasury, that the Failure of transmitting the same, within the Periods beforementioned, was unavoidable; in which Case such further Delay may be granted by Warrant under the Hands of the Commissioners of the Treasury, or any Three of them, as they shall judge reasonable; and in such Cases the Vouchers shall be delivered at the Expiration of the Term of Delay so granted, on Pain, upon Failure in

any of the abovementioned Cases, of paying such Fine to His Majesty as the Court of Exchequer, on Application made to them, shall think fit to set and impose; which Fine the said Court is hereby authorized and empowered to set and impose accordingly.

SECTION XXII. Provided always, and be it enacted, that when any Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants shall transmit to the Commissioners, to be appointed under the Authority of this Act, a sufficient and satisfactory Discharge from the Principal Officers of the Ordnance; the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy, the Commissioners for Victualling His Majesty's Navy, or the Commissioners for Sick and Hurt, for any Monies he or they shall have received in the said Department severally, the said Commissioners shall transmit a Duplicate of the same to His Majesty's Remembrancer in the Court of Exchequer, who shall forthwith strike out the Name or Names of such Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants from the Imprest Roll; and such Sub-Accountant or Sub-Accountants shall from thenceforth be discharged from any other or further Account for the same.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King; that on the 12th of January instant, David Price and Barnaby Windsor, Two of the Constables belonging to the Public Office in Union Hall, Southwark, were, in attempting to apprehend Two Persons against whom an Information had been duly made of a Robbery and Burglary, fired at and shot, whereby the said David Price was immediately killed, and the said Barnaby Windsor dangerously wounded.

His Majesty, for better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the above daring Act of Violence and Murder, is hereby graciously pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any Person (except the Person or Persons who actually fired upon and killed the said David Price, and fired upon and wounded the said Barnaby Windsor) who shall discover the Person or Persons concerned in the said Murder, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
