DISPATCHES, of which the following is an Extract and Copy, have been received from General Count Wallmoden and Lieutenant-General Harcourt by His Royal Highness the Duke of York, and transmitted by His Royal Highness to the Right Honorable Henry Dundas, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

Extract of a Letter from General Wallmoden to His Royal Highness the Duke of York, dated Voorhuizen, January 16, 1795.

SINCE my last Dispatch the Enemy have made several Movements, indicating a Design of a general Attack on our Posts, rendered more easy by the unfortunate Loss of Heusden.

On the 14th Instant they attacked all the Points of our Line, from Arnheim to Amerongen. The most serious Attempt appears to have been directed against Rhenen, on which the advanced Posts had fallen back from the other Side of the River. These Posts were, however, immediately recovered and preserved by the brave and spirited Conduct of the British Guards, and of Salm's Infantry; of the former in particular I cannot express myself in Terms of sufficient Commendation: Each of these Corps had Two Officers slightly wounded.

The Intentions of the Enemy against our Position between Cuylenberg and Rhenen being now manifest, the Right Wing of the Army effected its Retreat on the Night of
