Recorder.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The hamble Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council affembled.

Moft Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majefty's most dutiful and loyal Sub-jects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council affem-bled, humbly approach the Throne with renewed Profeifions of firm and unfhaken Attachment to your Majefly and Royal Family, and full Determination to support our most excellent Constitution in Church and Siate, against all fuch Attempts as have lately been made to fubvert it.

With the deepest Concern we have beheld, that notwithstanding the uniform Bravery manifested throughout your Majesty's Fleets and Armies, the Objects of the just and necessary War in which this Country is engaged have not yet been accomplished.

But at the fame Time, with the fleadiest Confidence on the God of all Victory, we rely for the final Succefs of your Majefty's Arms to fecure to thefe Kingdoms the permanent Enjoyment of focial Order, Freedom, and every other Bloffing which we experience under your Majeity's mild and paternal Government, and the glorious Constitution as established at the Revolution.

Your Majefty may be affured of the warm and uniform Support of your faithful Citizens of London in your Majefty's Exertions towards this defirable End; convinced as we are that on this Event alone depends the Exittence of all good Government, Security, Law and Religion.

# St. James's, January 29.

TIS Majefty having been pleafed to appoint Thuriday the 29th of January for the Ceremony of the Publick Entry and Publick Audience of His

Excellency Yuffof Adjiah Effeadi, Ambaffador from the Sublime Porte, the Earl of Juley (the Conduct-ing Earl appointed by His Majetty) and SI: Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Mafter of the Cercmonies, proceeded in one of His Majefty's Coaches, with Six Ho.fes, attended by Six Gentlemen of the Privy Chamber in others of the Royal Coaches, to the Royal College at Chelfea, the Place from wherea His Majeliy had thought fit that the Procession should begin, where Field-Marshal Sir George Howard, K. B. the Governor, not only allotted the Grand Apartment for the Ufe of the Ambaffador, on this Occafion, and provided an elegant Cold Collation for his Entertainment; but in further Compliment to the Ambaflador, repaired to the College early in the Morning, to be ready to receive the Ambaffador in Perfon.

About Ten o'Clock the Ambassador and his Suite arrived at the Royal College at Chelfea, in His Excellency's own Coaches, where the Royal Standard was difplayed, and His Excellency was received with all Military Honours.

Alighting from his Carriage, His Excellency was met by William Bulkeley, Elq; Major of the Royal College, and others the Military Officers belonging to the Establishment, and conducted to the Grand Apartment, where Field-Marshal Sir George Howard, K. B. the Governor, made a fhort Speech to His Excellency fuitable to the Occasion.

At a Quarter after Ten o'Clock the Conducting Earl and the Master of the Ceremonies arrived at the College, when the Earl of Jersey made His Majefty's Compliment to the Ambailador, and the Company fat down to Breakfall; and about Eleven the Procession to St. James's began in the following Order :

- Six of the Knight Marshal's Men, on Horseback, to clear the Way.
- The Mafter of the Ceremonies Coach, with Six Horfes.
- The Conducting Earl's Coach, with Six Horfes, in which went the Marshal of the Ceremonics.
- One of the Ambafilador's Ecuyers, on Horfeback, followed by fome fine Turkish Horses, brought over by the Ambaffador as a Prefent to His Ma, jefty from the Graad Signior, very richly caparifoned, and led by Turkish Grooms.
- A State Coach of His Majefly, in which went the Ambaffador, the Conducting Earl, the Mafter of the Ceremonics, and Signor Perfianni, First Interpreter to the Ottoman Embafly : Eight of the Ambaflador's Footmen walking, Four on each Side the Carriage.
- A leading Coach of His Majefty, with Six Horfes, in which went Mahmoud Raif Effendi, Secretary to the Embaffy, bearing the Ambafiador's Letter of Credence, in a rich Bag; and Mr. Lu-fignan, His Majafty's Interpreter: Four of the Ambafiador's Footmen, walking, Two on each Side the Carriage.
- A leading Coach of Her Majefty, with Six Horfes, in which went Three of the Gontlemen of the Privy Chamber, appointed to attend the Audience.
- A leading Coach of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, with Six Florfes, in which went the Three other Gentlemen of the Privy Chainber.
- A leading Coach of His Royal Highness the Duke of York, with Six Herfes.

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- A leading Coach of His Royal Highnefs the Dake of Clarence, with Six Horfes.
- A leading Coach of His Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester, with Six Horses.
- The Ambassiador's Coach, with Six Horses, in which went Three of the principal Persons belonging to His Excellency's Suite.
- Several Coaches of the Nobility, each drawn by Six Horfes, closed the Procession.

In this Order the Procession moved on from Chelfea College to the Gate of St. James's Park, adjoining the Queen's House, and proceeded up Constitution Hill, along Piccadilly and St. James's-Street, to the Palace, where His Excellency arrived at Half pass I welve, and, alighting at the Palace Gate, was received by Hugh Bolcawen, Eq. the Knight Marshal, (having his Baton of Office in his Hand) and the Marshal of the Ceremonics.

The Foot Guards on Duty were drawn up in the Court Yard, and their Officers fainted the Ambalisdor as he pailed on to the Little Courcil Chamber ; where Notice being given by one of His Majelty's Gentlemen Uthers that His Majeily was ready, the Procef-fion moved forward to the Audience in the Great -Council Chamber, (where, on each Side, were ranged the Band of Genilemen Penfoners) the Gentlemen of the Privy Chamber going before the Conducting Earl, and the principal Perfons of the Ambafiador's Suite before His Excellency, the Conducting Earl being on the Ambastador's Right Hand, and the Master of the Ceremonies on his Left. His Excellency was received at the Door of the Guard Cham-iber, in the Abfance of the Earl of Aylesford, Captain of the Yeomen of the Guard, by James Roberts, Big; Lieutenast of the Yeomen of the Guard, who conducted the Ambaflador to the Door of the Privy Chamber, where His Excellency was received by Viscount Falmouth, Captain of the Band of Gentlemen Penfiniers, who conducted His Excellency to the Door of the Great Council Chamber.

At the Door of the Great Council Chamber His Excellency was received by the Marquis of Salifbury, Lord Chamberlain of His MajeRy's Houfehold, who taking the Right Hand of the Ambafiador, and the Earl of Jerfey, with Sir Clement Coursell Dormer, taking the Left, His Excellency, dreffed in his Habit of Ceremony, and wearing the Turban called *Choroffani*, (which is only worn by the Ministers of the Sublime Porte) was conducted up to the Throne, making Three profound Reverences, which His Majesty was pleafed to return in the ufual Manner.

The Ambaffador then made a flort Speech to His Majefty, which was interpreted to His Majefty by Signor Perfianni; and His Majefty was pleafed to aniwer the fame in English, His Majefty's Answer being interpreted in the Turkish Language by Mr. Lusignan, His Majefty's Interpreter.

The Ambafizdor, in the Courie of his Harangue to His Majefty, took from the Secretary of the Embaffy his Letter of Credence, and kifling the fame, prelented it to His Majefty, who immediately delivered it to Lord Grenville; and, after His Majefty's Reply to the Ambafiador, he prefented to His Majefty the Secretary of the Embaffy, and the principal Perfons of his Suite, all of whom were received most graciously by His Majefty.

The Ambassiador then retired, making again Three Reverences to His Majesty as he withdrew from the Audience, and was reconducted with the fame Ceremony to the Little Council Chamber, to reft himfelf till Her Majesty was ready to receive

him; of which Notice being given by One of Her Majefty's Gentlemen Ulhers, the Ambaffador proceeded to the Queen's Apartments, and was received at the Door of Her Majefty's Guard Chamber by William Price, Efq; Her Majefty's Vice-Chamberlain, and at the Door of the Room of Audience by the Earl of Morton, Lord Chamberlain to Her Majefty, and fo conducted up to Her Majefty by the Earl of Morton, William Price, Efq; and Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer.

The Ambaffador, after his Audience of the Queen, went to the Drawing-Room to pay his Court to Their Majeflies; and having previoufly defired that the Royal Coacles might not be kept waiting to carry him back to his own Houle, returned Home after the Drawing-Room in his own Coach.

The uniform Tenor of your Conduct has demonfirated that you will not only be defirous, but zealous to fecond and emulate the Magnanimity of a Sovereign, formed to lead a Nation, that has ever been as firm to affert its Liberties, as affectionately devoted to a Government which maintains its own Authority for the fole Purpofe of fupporting thole Liberties. As you are thus cordially attached to that Sovereign, and to the Confiduntion which it is his Glory to protect, I have to announce to you, with true Satisfaction, what you will hear with equal Pleafure, the intended Marriage of His Royal Highnels the Prince of Wales with the Princels Caroling Amelia Elizabeth, Daughter of His Moft Illustrious Highnels the Duke of Bruafwick and Lunenburgh, a Princels of that illustrious House to whole mild and conflicturious!

As foon as the Ratification of this Treaty shall have been exchanged; and I shall . have received a Copy of it, 1 will direct it to be : laid before you, in order that you may confider if it will be neceffary to make any Provisions for carrying ginto Effect a Treaty, in which the Commerce of this Kingdom is fo materially and extensively interetted.

### Gentlemen of the Houfe of Commons,

I have directed the Effimates for the Public Serwice, and the State of the Public Accounts, to be laid before you.

His Majefty has that affured Confidence, grounded on a long and uniform Experience of your Loyalty, and your Zeal for his Service and the Good of your Country, that I think it unneceffary to prefs you in any particular Manner to make a Provision adequateto the prefent awful Situation of Affairs.

It is with Pleafure I acquaint you, that the Provision will, in fome Degree, be facilitated by the Circumflance, that during the Exiftence of luch a War as the prefent, the Public Revenue, together with the Commerce of the Kingdom, has kept up, and has been even augmented : Advantages which are due to the Care and Vigilance of our Sovereign, in the general Protection provided by him for all his · Subjects.

# My Lords, and Gentlemen,

I earneilly recommend to you a Continuance of the laudable Pains you have constantly taken to cultivate all your domettic Advantages in Commerce, in Manufacture, and in fuch Public Works as have appeared directed to promote those important Objects. These are the true Foundations of all Public Revenue and Public Surength. Your Endeavours have had their Fruit. . The great Staple Manufacture of this Kingdom has encreafed beyond the most fanguine Expectations: An Advantage principally owing to the contlant Superintendance and wife Provifions of the Parliament of Ireland; and next to those to the affured liberal and most merited Encouragement which it receives in the rich and extentive Mar-; ket of Great Britain; a Circumftance tending to cement the Union and to perfect the Harmony which happily fublifis, and, I truft, will fubfilt for ever, between the Two Kingdoms.

Attached as you are to the general Caufe of Religion, Learning and Civilization, I have to recom-mend to your Confideration the State of Education in this Kingdom, which, in fome Parts, will admit of Improvement, in others may require fome new Arrangement. Confiderable Advantages have been already derived under the wife Regulations of Parliament, from the Protestant Charter Schools, and thefe will, as ufual, claim your Attention: But as these Advantages have been but partial, and as Circumftances have made other Confiderations, connected with this important Subject, highly neceffary, it is hoped that your Wifdom will order every Thing relating to it in the Manner most beneficial, and the best a lapted to the Occasions of the feveral Defeript ons of Men, which compole His Majefty's faithful Subjects of Ireland.

We are engaged in an arduous Conteft. The Time calls not only for great Fortitude, and an unufual Share of Public Spirit, but for much Con-ftancy and Perfeverance. You are engaged with a Power which, under the ancient Forms of its internal Arrangement, was always highly formidable to the neighbouring Nations. Lately this Power has affumed a new Shape: But with the fame Ambition, with much more extensive and systematic Deligns, far more effective, and, without Comparison, more dreadful in the certain Confequences of its eventual Succefs, it threatens nothing lefs than the entire Subverfion of the Liberty and Independence of every State in Europe. An Enemy to them all, it is actuated with a peculiar Animofity against these Kingdoms, not only as the natural Protection of the Balance of Power in Europe, but also because, by the Poffeffion of a legal, humane and rational Freedom. we feem to reproach that falle and fpurious Liberty, which, in Reality, is an ignominious Servitude, tending to extinguith all good Arts, to generate nothing but Impiety, Crime, Diforder and ferocious Man. ners, and to end in Wretchednefs and general Defolation.

To guard his People from the Enterprifes of this : dangerous and mulignant Power, and for the Protection of all civilized Society against the Inroads of Anarchy, His Majeily has availed himfelf of every rational Aid, Foreign and Domeffic: He has called upon the Skill, Courage and Experience of all his Subjects, wherefoever difperfed : And you must be duly fenfible, in fuch a Crifis as the prefent, which rarely occurs in the Courfe of Human Affairs, of the Advantage of His Majefty's thus endeavouring to profit of the united Strength and Zeal of every Defeription of his Subjects.

I have to affine you of His Majefly's most cheerful Concurrence in every Measure which your Wifdom and comprehensive Patriotifin shall point out for this falutary Purpofe.

On, my Part you shall find me, from Principle and from Inclination, thoroughly difpofed to concur with His Majeffy's paternal Wishes, and with the wife Measures of his Parliament. On a cordial Affection to the Whole of Ireland, and on a Conduct fuitable to that Sentiment, I with to found my own perfonal Effimation and my Reputation in the Execution of the great Truth committed, by the most beneficent of Sovereigns, to my. Care.
