WE, taking into Our most serious Consideration the just and necessary War in which We are engaged with France, and putting Our Trust in Almighty God, that He will graciously bless Our Arms, both by Sea and Land, have resolved, and do, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, That a Publick Fast and Humiliation be observed throughout that Part of Our Kingdom of Great Britain called England, Our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, on Wednesday the Twenty-fifth Day of February next; that so both We and Our People may humble Ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain Pardon of Our Sins; and may, in the most devout and solemn Manner, send up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty, for averting those heavy Judgements which Our manifold Sins and Provocations have most justly deserved; and imploring his Blessing and Assistance on Our Arms, and for restoring and perpetuating Peace, Safety and Prosperity to Us and Our Kingdoms: And We do strictly charge and command, That the said Publick Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in England, Our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation; and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as

contemn and neglect the Performance of so religious and necessary a Duty. And for the better and more orderly solemnizing the same, We have given Directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops, and the Right Reverend the Bishops of England, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to this Occasion, to be used in all Churches, Chapels, and Places of Publick Worship; and to take Care the same be timely dispersed throughout their respective Dioceses.

Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty, for averting those heavy Judgements which Our manifold Sins and Provocations have most justly deserved, and imploring His Blessing and Assistance on Our Arms, and for restoring and perpetuating Peace, Safety, and Prosperity to Us and Our Kingdoms: And We do strictly charge and command, That the said Publick Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in Scotland, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation; and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as contemn and neglect the Performance of so religious and necessary a Duty. Our Will is therefore, and We charge, That this Our Proclamation seen, ye forthwith pass to the Market-Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there, in Our Name and Authority, make Publication hereof, that none pretend Ignorance: And Our Will and Pleasure is, That Our Solicitor do cause printed Copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We ordain to see the same published; and We appoint them to send Copies hereof to the several Parish Churches within their Bounds, that upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the Day above-mentioned, the same may be published, and read from the Pulpits, immediately after Divine Service.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to amend an Act made in the Thirty-first Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for regulating the Importation and Exportation of Corn, and the Payment of the Duty on Foreign Corn imported, and of the Bounty on British Corn exported," it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, and He and They is and are thereby authorized, with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, at any Time when the General Average Price of any Sort of Corn or of Oatmeal, in England or Scotland respectively, taken as in the said Acts, passed in the Thirty-first and Thirty-third Years of His present Majesty's Reign, is directed, shall appear to be at or above the Price at or above which

Foreign Corn, Meal or Flour of the same Sort is allowed by Law to be imported from Ireland or the Province of Quebec, or the other British Colonies and Plantations in North America, at the first Low Duties specified in the Table marked E. in the said Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of His present Majesty's Reign, to prohibit generally, for a limited Time, the Exportation from England and Scotland respectively, as the Case may be, of any such Sort of Corn or other Articles mentioned in the said Acts; and in like Manner, at any Time when the Average Price of any Sort of Corn or of Oatmeal, in England or Scotland respectively, taken as in the said Acts, passed in the Thirty-first and Thirty-third Years of His present Majesty's Reign, is directed, shall appear to be at or above the Price at or above which Foreign Corn, Meal or Flour of the same Sort is allowed by Law to be imported from any other Foreign Country at the first Low Duty specified in the said Table marked E. to permit generally the Importation into England or Scotland respectively, as the Case may be, or the taking out of Warehouse for Home Consumption, of any such Sort of Foreign Corn, Meal or Flour, on Payment of the second Low Duty only, and no other; and in the like Manner to recall such Prohibition or Permission, if Circumstances shall appear so to require: Provided always, that as often as the Importation of any Sort of Corn, Meal or Flour, on the Low Duties, shall be permitted by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, such Permission shall continue in Force for the Space of Three Months at least from the Date of the Order in Council made for that Purpose.

And whereas, in pursuance of the Powers vested in His Majesty by the said Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His present Majesty's Reign, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, was pleased, by His Order in Council bearing Date the 28th of August, 1793, to prohibit (under the Provisions, Regulations and Exceptions therein mentioned and referred to) until the 30th of November then ensuing, the Exportation from any of the Ports of that Part of Great Britain called England of any Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, or Oats, or any Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made thereof; and in like Manner to prohibit the Exportation from any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland of any Barley, Beer or Bigg, Pease, Beans, or Oats, or any Meal, Flour, Bread or Biscuit made thereof; and also to declare and order, that from and after the Date of the said Order, until the Thirtieth Day of November then ensuing, it should be lawful to import into any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called England, and to take out of Warehouse for Home Consumption, any Foreign

Foreign Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Oats, or Oatmeal; and also to import into any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, and to take out of Warehouse for Home Consumption, any Foreign Barley, Pease, Oats and Oatmeal, on Payment of the second Low Duty only, mentioned in the said Table marked E. and no other; which Order has, by several subsequent Orders, been since revived and continued, and is now to remain in Force until the 1st Day of February, 1795.

And whereas it appears, from the Returns received in the Week ended the Third Day of January, 1795, that the General Average Prices of Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Oats and Oatmeal, in that Part of Great Britain called England, are above the Prices at which Foreign Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Oats and Oatmeal, are allowed by Law to be imported at the first Low Duty specified in the said Table marked E.; His Majesty, therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, pursuant to the Powers given by the said Act, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Prohibition to export Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, or Oats, or any Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made thereof, from any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called England, and every Provision respecting the said Prohibition in the said Order of the Twenty-eighth Day of August, 1793, shall be and continue in Force until the Third Day of June, 1795.

And whereas it appears, from the Returns received in the Month immediately preceding the Fifteenth Day of January, 1795, that the General Average Price of Barley, Beer and Bigg, Oats and Oatmeal, in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, is above the Price at which Foreign Barley, Beer or Bigg, Oats and Oatmeal, are allowed by Law to be imported at the first Low Duty specified in the said Table marked E.; His Majesty, therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, pursuant to the Powers given by the said Act, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Prohibition to export Barley, Beer and Bigg, Oats and Oatmeal, from any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, and every Provision, Regulation and Exception respecting the said Prohibition in the said Order of the Twenty-eighth Day of August, 1793, shall be, and the same is hereby revived, and shall continue in Force until the Third Day of June, 1795.

And His Majesty, by and with the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit further to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Permission to import into any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called England, any Foreign Rye, Pease, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Oats or Oatmeal, and into any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called

Scotland, any Foreign Barley or Oats, and to take the same out of Warehouse, for Home Consumption, on Payment of the second Low Duty only, mentioned in the said Table marked E. and no other, and every Provision and Regulation respecting the said Importation, in the said Order of the Twenty-eighth Day of August, 1793, contained, shall be, and the same is hereby revived, and shall continue in Force until the said Third Day of June, 1795.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS His Majesty, by His Order in Council, bearing Date the 16th Instant, was pleased to direct, That all Goods, Wares, Merchandizes and Effects whatsoever, coming directly from any of the Ports of the United Provinces to any of the Ports of this Kingdom, in the Vessels of any Country, and navigated in any Manner, should be permitted, until further Order, to be landed, and secured in Warehouses, under the joint Locks of His Majesty and of the Proprietors, at the Risk and Expence of the said Proprietors, there to remain in safe Custody, for the Benefit of the Proprietors thereof, until due Provision shall be made by Law to enable such Proprietors to re-export, or otherwise dispose of the same: And whereas it is judged expedient further to extend the Benefit of the said Order: His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that all Goods, Wares, Merchandizes and Effects whatsoever, belonging to any of the Subjects or Inhabitants of the United Provinces, or belonging to any Subject of His Majesty, or to any Subject of any Country in Amity with His Majesty, coming from any Part of Europe, Asia, Africa or America, in Amity with His Majesty, in Vessels belonging to any Subject or Inhabitant of the United Provinces, or to any Subject of His Majesty, or of any Country in Amity with His Majesty, and bound to any Port of the United Provinces, may, until further Order, be permitted to be landed in any Port of this Kingdom, and may be secured in Warehouses, for the Benefit of the Proprietors thereof, in the same Manner as was directed in the above mentioned Order of His Majesty in Council, bearing Date the 16th of this instant January. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

A Letter from Rear-Admiral Bligh, late Captain of His Majesty's Ship the *Alexander*, to Mr. Stephens, (a Copy of which is as follows) was received at this Office the 30th of last Month.

On Board the Marat, at Brest,

S I R,

November 23, 1794.

THE Arrival of the *Canada* must long since have informed their Lordships of my Misfortune, in losing His Majesty's Ship *Alexander*, late under my Command, having been taken by a Squadron of French Ships of War, consisting of Five of Seventy-four Guns, Three large Frigates, and an armed Brig, commanded by Rear-Admiral Neilly; farther Particulars and Details I herewith transmit you, for their Lordships Information. We discovered this Squadron on our Weather Bow, about Half past Two o'Clock, or near Three, in the Morning on the 6th Instant, being then in Latitude 48 Deg. 25 Min. North, 7 Deg. 53 Min. West, the Wind then at West, and we steering North-East; on which I immediately hauled our Wind, with the Larboard Tacks on Board, and without Signal, the *Canada* being close to us. We passed the strange Ships a little before Four o'Clock, the nearest of whom at about Half a Mile distant, but could not discover what they were. Shortly after we bore more up, let the Reefs out of the Top-Sails, and set Steering-Sails. About Five o'Clock, perceiving, by my Night-Glass, the strange Ships to stand after us, we crowded all the Sail we could possibly set, as did the *Canada*, and hauled more to the Eastward. About Day-break the *Canada* passed us, and steering more to the Northward than we did, brought her on our Larboard Bow. Two Ships of the Line and Two Frigates pursued her; and Three of the Line and One Frigate chased the *Alexander*. About Half past Seven o'Clock the French Ships hoisted English Colours. About a Quarter past Eight o'Clock we hoisted our Colours, upon which the French Ships hauled down the English, and hoisted their's; and drawing up within Gun-Shot, we began firing our Stern Chaces at them, and received their Bow Chaces. About Nine o'Clock, or shortly after, observing the Ships in Pursuit of the *Canada*, drawing up with her, and firing at each other their Bow and Stern Chaces, I made the *Canada*'s Signal to form a-head for our mutual Support, being determined to defend the Ships to the last Extremity; which Signal she instantly answered, and endeavoured to put it in Execution by steering towards us; but the Ships in Chace of her, seeing her Intentions, hauled more to Starboard to cut her off, and which obliged her to steer the Course she had done before. We continued firing our Stern Chaces at the Ships pursuing us till near Eleven o'Clock, when Three Ships of the Line came up, and brought us to close Action, which we sustained for upwards of Two Hours, when the Ship was become a complete Wreck, the Main-Yard, Spanker-Boom, and Three Top-Gallant-Yards shot away, all the lower Masts shot through in many Places, and expected every Minute to go over the Side; all the other Masts and Yards were also wounded, more or less, nearly the Whole of the Standing and Running Rigging cut to Pieces, the Sails torn into Ribbands, and her Hull much shattered, and making a great Deal of Water, and with Difficulty she floated into Brest. At this Time the Ships that had chased the *Canada* had quitted her, and were coming fast up to us, the Shot of one of them at the Time passing over us. Thus situated, and cut off from all Resources, I judged it advise-

able to consult my Officers, and accordingly assembled them all on the Quarter-Deck; when, upon surveying and examining the State of the Ship, (engaged as I have already described) they deemed any farther Resistance would be ineffectual, as every possible Exertion had already been used in vain to save her, and therefore they were unanimously of Opinion, that to resign her would be the Means of saving the Lives of a Number of brave Men. Then, and not till then, (painful to relate) I ordered the Colours to be struck; a Measure which, on a full Investigation, I hope and trust their Lordships will not disapprove. Hitherto I have not been able to collect an exact List of the Killed and Wounded, as many of the former were thrown overboard during the Action, and, when taken Possession of, the People were divided, and sent on Board different Ships, but I do not believe they exceed Forty, or thereabout. No Officer above the Rank of Boatswain's Mate was killed. Lieutenant Fitzgerald, of the Marines, Mess. Burns, Boatswain, and M'Curdy, Pilot, were wounded, but in a fair Way of doing well.

The cool, steady, and gallant Behaviour of all my Officers and Ship's Company, Marines as well as Seamen, throughout the whole of the Action, merits the highest Applause; and I should feel myself deficient in my Duty, as well as in what I owe to these brave Men, were I to omit requesting you will be pleased to recommend them in the strongest Manner to their Lordships Favour and Protection; particularly Lieutenants Godench, Epworth, Carter, West and Daracott; Major Tench, Lieutenants Fitzgerald and Brown of the Marines; Mr. Robinson the Master, together with the Warrant and Petty Officers, whose Bravery and good Conduct I shall ever hold in the highest Estimation. I have hitherto been treated with great Kindness and Humanity, and have not a Doubt but that I shall meet with the same Treatment during my Captivity.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, that between the Hours of One and Two in the Morning of the 11th Instant, a large Barn, with a Bullock Shed adjoining, in the Borough of Eye in the County of Suffolk, the Property of the Marquis Cornwallis, containing about 90 Coombs of Barley in the Straw; about 40 Bushels of Suckling in the Stalk; 10 Coombs of Rye Grass, and 30 Coombs of Wheat in Sack, with many Implements of Husbandry; also a large Haulm Stack standing in the Yard, belonging to the said Barn, the Property of Mr. John Wythe, of the Borough aforesaid, were discovered to be in Flames; and that the same were wilfully and maliciously set on Fire by some Person or Persons unknown, by which they were all nearly consumed.

And it has also been humbly represented to the King, that between the Hours of Three and Four in the Morning of the 10th Instant, a Stack of Barley Straw, standing between a Stack of Beans and a Stack of Wheat, the Property of Mr. John Martin Denny, of the said Town, was discovered to be in Flames; and that the same was wilfully and maliciously set on Fire by some Person or Persons unknown, by which the same was entirely consumed.
