CEVERAL Persons whose Names are thereunto fubscribed, being Freemen and Citizens of the City of Carliffe in the County of Cumberland, and having a Right to vote in the Election of Citizens to serve in Parliament for the said City, having this Day presented their Petition to the House of Commons, fetting forth, that on the 3d Day of March in the Year 1791, a Select Committee of this House, appointed to try and determine the Merits of a Petition of John Christian Curwe: and Wilson Braddyll, and also of another Petition on the Part of and subscribed by several other Persons, Free-men and Citizens of the City of Carlisse in the County of Cumberland, and having a Right to vote in the Election of Citizens to serve in Parliament for the said City, severally complaining of an undue Election and Return for the said City of Carlifle, reported to the House their final Determination on the Merits of those Petitions, and did at the same Time also report to the House that it appeared to the faid Select Committee, that the Merits of the faid l'etitions did, in Part, depend upon the Right of Election for the faid City; and that thereupon the faid Committee had required the Counsel for the several Parties to deliver to the Clerk of the said Committee Statements in Writing of the Right of Election for which they re spectively contended. That in consequence thereof the Counsel for the said John Christian Curwen and Wilson Bradayll, and also for the said other Petitioners, the Freemen and Citizens of the faid City of Carlifle, having a Right to vote in the Election of Citizens to ferve in Parliament for the Said City, delivered in a Statement as follows:

The Countel for the Petitioners state the Right " of Election to be in the Freemen of the City of Carlifle, duly admitted and fivorn Freemen of the faid City, and deriving their Title to fuch Freedom by being Sons of Freemen, or by Ser " vice of Seven Years Apprenticeship to a Free-" man, resident during such Apprenticeship within the faid city, or by Election of the Mayor and Common Council of the faid City, with the " Consent and Approbation of certain Persons co called the Fours, otherwise the Fours of the " Election of each of the Eight Guilds or Occupations within the faid City, as Representatives of the whole Commonalty of the faid City; they also state, that no Person is entitled to be or admitted a Freeman of the faid City, who has " not been previously admitted a Brother of one of the Eight Guilds or Occupations of the faid Lity." That the Counfel for the Sitting Members, James Clarke Satterthwaite and Edward Knubley, Esquires, delivered in a Statement as follows: "The Counsel for the Sitting Members " fiate the Right of Election to be in the Freemen of the City of Carlifle, who acquire a Title to fuch Freedom by being Sons of Freemen, or by ferving an Apprenticethip during Seven Years to a Freeman, or by Election of the Mayor, Al-« dermen, Bailiffs and Capital Citizens of the faid " City; they also state, that it is not necessary, in order to become a Freeman of the faid City, to have been previously admitted a Brother of one of the Eight Guilds or Occupations within the faid City." That upon the Statement delivered in by the Counfel for the faid several Petitioners the faid Select Committee determined, " That the Right of Election, as fet forth in the said State-" ment, is not the Right of Election for the City of Carlifle in the County of Cumberland." That

upon the Statement delivered in by the Counsel for the Sitting Mombers the said Select Committee de-termined, "That the Right of Election, as fet forth "in the faid Statement, is not the Right of Election for the faid City of Cartifle." That the
faid Select Committee, having duly considered the faid Statements, and the Evidence adduced before them touching the Right of Election for the faid City of Carlifle, determined, "That the Right " of Election for the City of Carlisle, in the " County of Cumberland, is in the Freemen of "the faid City, duly admitted and sworn Free-"men of the said City, having been previously

admitted Brethren of one of the Eight Guilds

or Occupations of the said City, and deriving

their Title to such Freedom by being Sons of

Freemen, or by Service of Seven Years Appran " ticeship to a Freeman, resident during such Apprenticeship within the said City, and in no others." And that on or about the 12th Day of January last past, Thomas Wisson Morley, James Paine, Robert Murray, Edward Wastell, John Richardson, Robert Yarker, Thomas Wyley, John White, Richard Rowland, Joseph Yeoward, Ralph Elliott, and Joseph Brownrigg, presented their Petition to the House, in order to prevent the faid Judgment of the faid Select Committee from becoming final and conclusive in all subsequent Elections of Members of Parliament for the faid City, thereby stating they were not fatisfied with the faid Resolution, and were desirous of being admitted Parties to oppose such Right of Election, and to have the Benefit of the Statute in that Cafe made and provided, and praying the House to take the Premises into Consideration, and to grant them such Relief therein as the House should think fit; and that the Petitioners infift, that the Right of Election, which hath been deemed valid in the Judgment of the said Select Com-mittee, and in Favour of which the said 3elect Committee fo reported as aforesaid, is the ancient and true Right of Election for the faid City of Carlifle; and therefore praying that they may be admitted as Paries to defend such Right of Election, so reported to the House as aforesaid, according to the Form of the faid Statute; and that they may have such further and other Relief as to the House shal' feem meet, and as the Nature of their Case may require. I do hereby give Notice that the House has appointed Thursday the Twenty-sixth Day of February instant, at Three o'Clock in the Afternoon of the same Day, to take the said Petition into Confideration, at the same Time that the Petition of Thomas Wilson Morley, James Paine, Robert Murray, Edward Wastell, John Richardson, Robert Yarker, Thomas Wyley, John White, Richard Rowland, Joseph Yeoward, Ralph Elliot, and Joseph Brownigg, Citizens of the City of Carlifle, is ordered to be taken into Confideration.
