P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December, 1792, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February, 1793, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to

any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains and Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Twenty-eighth Day of this instant February; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended, from the said Twenty-eighth Day of this instant February, to the Thirtieth Day of April next inclusive: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

WHEREAS there was this Day read at the Board a Representation from the Right Honorable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council appointed for the Consideration of all Matters re-

lating

lating to Trade and Foreign Plantations, dated the 29th of last Month, in the Words following, viz.

“ *May it please your Majesty,*

“ THE Lords of the Committee being of Opinion
 “ that it may be advisable for your Majesty to al-
 “ low the Importation into the Island of Newfound-
 “ land of Bread, Flour and Indian Corn, from any of
 “ the Territories belonging to the United States of
 “ America, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and
 “ Fishermen of the said Island, for the ensuing Sea-
 “ son only, in like Manner as your Majesty has
 “ been pleased to permit such Importation for the
 “ Six preceding Years; their Lordships humbly take
 “ Leave to lay herewith before your Majesty the
 “ Draught of an Order proper to be issued by your
 “ Majesty in Council, and a Warrant, under your
 “ Majesty’s Sign Manual, to the Governor of New-
 “ foundland, for the Purpose above mentioned.”

His Majesty, having taken the same into Con- sideration, was pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed, and also of the Draught of the Order in Council, and of the Warrant to the Governor of Newfoundland, for the respective Purposes therein mentioned.

And His Majesty doth hereby order, that his Grace the Duke of Portland, One of His Majesty’s Principal Secretaries of State, do prepare the said Warrant (Copy whereof is hereunto annexed) to the Governor of Newfoundland, for His Majesty’s Royal Signature.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Twenty- eighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, “ An Act for regulating the Trade
 “ between the Subjects of His Majesty’s Colonies
 “ and Plantations in North America and in the
 “ West India Islands, and the Countries belonging
 “ to the United States of America, and between
 “ His Majesty’s said Subjects and the Foreign Islands
 “ in the West Indies,” it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order or Orders to be issued and published from Time to Time, to authorize, or by Warrant or Warrants, under His Sign Manual, to empower the Governor of Newfoundland for the Time being to authorize, in case of Necessity, the Importation into Newfoundland of Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, from any of the Territories belonging to the United States, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the then ensuing Season only; provided always, that such Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, so authorized to be imported into the said Island of Newfoundland, shall not be imported except in conformity to such Rules, Regulations and Restrictions as shall be specified in such Order or Orders,

Warrant or Warrants, respectively, and except by British Subjects and in British-built Ships owned by His Majesty’s Subjects, and navigated according to Law.

It is Our Royal Will and Pleasure, and We do, by virtue of the Power vested in Us by the said Act, hereby empower you to authorize, in case of Necessity, the Importation into Newfoundland Bread, Flour, and Indian Corn, from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States of America, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of Our Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season only; provided that such Bread, Flour, and Indian Corn so authorized to be imported into Our Island of Newfoundland shall not be imported except by British Subjects and in British built Ships, owned by His Majesty’s Subjects, and navigated according to Law; provided also that such Ships as aforesaid shall clear out from some of the Ports of the said Island for any of the said United States, and shall be duly licensed for that Purpose by you, or such other Person or Persons as shall, by an Instrument under your Hand and Seal, be authorized to license the same.

And We do hereby order and direct that such Licences so to be granted by you, or by any Person or Persons duly authorized as aforesaid, shall be of the like Nature, as near as the Circumstances will admit, with those which are directed to be granted to Ships clearing out from Great Britain, by an Act passed in the 25th Year of Our Reign, intituled, “ An Act for confining, for a limited Time, the
 “ Trade between the Ports of the United States of
 “ America and His Majesty’s Subjects of the Island
 “ Newfoundland, to Bread, Flour and Live Stock,
 “ to be imported in none but British-built Ships,
 “ actually belonging to British Subjects, and navi-
 “ gated according to Law, clearing out from the
 “ Ports of His Majesty’s European Dominions, and
 “ furnished with a Licence according to the Form
 “ hereunto annexed.”

And We do hereby strictly charge and command you, that, in granting of such Licences as aforesaid, especial Care be taken to prevent all contraband and fraudulent Trade between the Inhabitants and Fishermen of Our said Island of Newfoundland, and the People belonging to the Territories of the United States of America.
