By the KING, PROCLAMATION, For apprehending Robert Thomas Crossfield.

WHEREAS Robert Thomas Crossfield, late of Dyers Buildings, in the Parish of St. Andrew, Holborn, in the County of Middlesex, Surgeon, stands charged with Suspicion of High Treason: We have therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby requiring and commanding all Our loving Subjects to discover and apprehend, and cause to be discovered and apprehended, the said Robert Thomas Crossfield, and to carry him before fome of Our Justices of the Peace, or Chief Magistrates of the County, Town or Place where he shall be apprehended, who are respectively required to fecure him, and thereof to give speedy Notice unto Our Privy Council, or one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, to the End he may be forthcoming and may be dealt withal, and proceeded against according to Law. And whoever shall discover and apprehend the faid Robert Thomas Crossfield, and bring him before fuch Justice of the Peace or Chief Magistrate, or so discover him that he may be apprchended, shall receive for Reward the Sum of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS; which faid Sum of Two Hundred Pounds the Lords Commissioners of Our Treasury are hereby required and directed to pay accordingly. Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twenty-seventh Day of February, in the Thirtyfifth Year of Our Reign.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-fixth Day of December, 1792, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every fuch Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Licutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as asoresaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majefty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February, 1793, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that fuch Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majefty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains and Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Twenty eighth Day of this inflant February; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended, from the faid Twenty-eighth Day of this instant February, to the Thirtieth Day of April next inclusive: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

#### Horse Guards, February 28, 1795.

Dispatch, dated Rheine, February 11, 1795. of which the following is an Extract, has been received by His Royal Highness the Duke of York from Lieutenant-General Harcourt, and communicated by His Royal Highness to the Right Honorable Henry Dundas, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

HAD the Honor to inform your Royal Highness, in a Letter, dated January 21, from Deventer, of the Arrival of the Troops in their Cantonments behind the Yssel. The Frost having precluded all! Communication with England fince that Time, it has been out of my Power to acquaint you of the Movements which have fince taken Place, and it is only

any Person who should discover any Seaman or | within these Two or Three Days that the Thaw again offers a Prospect of it's being open.

In consequence of the Arrangements'made, inconjunction with, and in pursuance of General Wallmoden's Orders, to place the Army in Cantonments behind the Ems, we marched on the 27th of January from Deventer and the rest of the Cantonments on the Yssel, leaving Lieutenant-General Abercromby with the Guards and Colonel Strutt's Brigade, the Advanced Posts still remaining at Appeldern, Low, &c. to take the necessary Steps for the Removal of the Sick, Stores and Provisions, and for the Destruction of whatever of the latter could not be conveyed. Lieutenant-General Abercromby was to march the next Day, and I am happy to fay, that by the Exertions which were made, and principally by those of Lieutenant-Colonel Brownrigg, which on this, as well as on all other Occasions, have been of the most esfential Service, the Number of Sick left at Deventer. Zwell and Zutphen, did not exceed Six Hundred, most of whose Cases would not admit of Removal; Major M'Murdo, with a Captain, Two Subalterns, and the necessary Medical Attendants, was left in Charge of them. The greatest Part of the Stores and Provisions were removed or destroyed. The Ammunition, which had been brought from Arnheim to Doelburg, has likewise, in great Part, been got off, and is now at Bentheim.

The first Column arrived at and near Halten on the 27th, marched from thence to Delden on the 28th, and proceeded on the 29th to Oldensaal. On the 30th they arrived at and near Bentheim. General Coates's Brigade had marched some Days sooner, and was then cantoned at Skuttorpe, Rheine and other Places, near and behind the Ems.

General Abercromby's Corps arrived at Oldenfaal on the 30th and 31st, and the Advanced Posts were withdrawn to this Side of Deventer, and posted at Delden, Almela, and other Villages on that Front. I am forry to add that the Troops on their March fuffered confiderably, not only from the Badness of the Roads and the Inclemency of the Weather, but likewise from the Difficulty of procuring Cover for the Men.

Letter from Major-General Sir Adam Wil-A liamson, K. B. dated Jamaica, the 20th of December, 1794, of which the following is an Extract, has been received by the Right Honorable Henry Dundas, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

Have the Honor to inclose the Copy of a Letter to Brigadier-General Horneck, from Captain Grant of the 13th Regiment, who commanded at Bizzeton in St. Domingo, when attacked by Three Columns of the Brigands, of at least 2,000 Men. The Garrison consisted of not more than 120 Men. Captain Grant and his Two Lieutenants, Lieutenant Clunes of the Royals, and Lieutenant Hamilton of the 22d Regiment, merit every Attention that can be shewn them. They were all Three severely wounded early in the Attack; but tied up their Wounds, and continued to defend the Post. It has been a very gallant Defence, and does them great Honor.

Captain M'Kiver, of the Brig Mary, has been of infinite Service. I had stationed Armed Vessels off Bizzeton and Tiberoon, and they have contributed

effentially to the Preservation of these Posts.

Bizzeton,

Bizzeton, December 5, 1794.

I HAVE the Honor to inform you, that between the Hours of Four and Five this Morning, immediately as the Moon set, the Two Posts at this Place were attacked by Three Columns almost at the same Moment, commencing by an Attempt on the Redan, which was followed by others from the Old Mill-House, and on the Work constructed on the opposite

The Enemy advanced perfectly filent, and in such Secrecy that they were close under the Works before they were discovered; but having had the Garrison under Arms for some Hours, as is customary, and the Militia being in Readiness on their Posts, the Enemy met with an instant Check.

After an ineffectual Attack of about Three Quarters of an Hour, and Day-Light breaking fast upon them, they retreated, carrying with them all their Wounded, and (as is supposed) many of their Dead, as Thirty-seven Bodies only were found.

I should not do Justice to His Majesty's Troops both Officers and Men, under my Command, if I did not acquaint you, Sir, with what cool and determined Spirit they conducted themselves on this Occasion; to the former, Lieutenants Hamilton and Clunes, 1 am particularly indebted for their Exertions, though I

am forry to fay they were both severely wounded.

I must also thank Captain M'Kiver, of the Brig Mary, for the constant and steady Fire he kept up

during the Whole of the Action.
