THIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Knt. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act for raising a certain Number of Men in the several Counties in England, for the Service of His Majesty's Navy.

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters.

An Act for the Regulation of His Majesty's Marine Forces while on Shore.

An Act for authorizing the Company of Proprietors of the Grand Junction Canal to vary the Course of a certain Part of the said Canal in the County of Hertford, so as to render the Navigation thereof more safe and convenient; and for making some other Amendments and Alterations in an Act made in the Thirty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for making the said Canal.

An Act to amend and render effectual so much of an Act of the Twenty-eighth Year of His present Majesty, as relates to improving the Entrance into the City of Worcester from the London and Upton Roads.

An Act to continue the Term and enlarge the Powers of Two Acts, made in the Seventh and Thirty-first Years of the Reign of His present Majesty, for repairing the Highways from that Part of Counters Bridge which lies in the Parish of Kennington, in the County of Middlesex, leading through the Towns of Brentford and Hounslow to the Powder-Mills in the Road to Staines, and to Cranford Bridge, in the said County, in the Road to Colnbrook; and for repairing, turning or altering the Highway leading from the said Road, at or near the End of Sion Lane, to the Town of Isleworth, in the said County, and from thence to a Gate on the South Side of Teddington Field; and also the Highway leading out of the said Great Road, near Smallberry Green Turnpike, to a House known by the Sign of the George, in the Town of Isleworth aforesaid; and for lighting and watering Part of the said Highways.

Copy of a Letter from Sir John Warren, Captain of His Majesty's Ship La Pomone, to Mr. Stephens, dated Cowfand Bay, March 2, 1795.

S I R,

I Beg you will inform their Lordships, that, in pursuance of their Orders, I put to Sea on the 12th of February past, with the Ships named in the Margin*. The Weather becoming thick, with fresh Breezes and a heavy Sea, on the 14th the Anson carried away her Main-Topmast, which obliged me to heave-to; and, owing to her Damages, I was under the Necessity of bearing down the Two following Days, as she had drifted considerably to Leeward; and, being unable to repair her Defects at Sea, I ordered Captain Durham to proceed with all possible Dispatch to Plymouth.

On the 18th, having fell in with Three Sail of the Enemy's Transports, Part of a Convoy bound from Brest, I hauled the Wind, and endeavoured to make the Land; and on the 21st the Light-House on Isle of Oleron bearing S. E. by E. I discovered a Frigate and Twenty Sail of Vessels under Convoy, close in with the Shore, many of them under American, Danish and Swedish Colours. I pursued them half Way up the Pertuis D'Antioche, in Sight of the Isle of Aix; but the Tide of Flood setting strong up, and the Wind right in, I was obliged to tack, and captured and destroyed the Vessels in the enclosed List. I understand the Frigate was La Neriade, of Thirty-six Guns, Twelve-Pounders, with Transports and other Vessels for Wine and Stores, to Rochfort and Bourdeaux, on Account of the Convention, for their Fleet. On the 26th, the Isle of Groa bearing East Six Leagues, I gave Chace to Six Sail of Vessels, in the N. W. At Nine, A. M. captured the Conventional Schooner La Curieuse, with the Five others. They were bound to Naatz from Brest, with Cloathing for the Army.

I am much indebted to the Attention and Activity of Captains Keats and Martin, with their Officers and Men, upon this Occasion.

I arrived here this Day with the Galatea and Artois, and shall use every Dispatch in completing the Ships for Service.

Copy of a Letter from Captain George Burlton, of His Majesty's Ship Lividly, to Mr. Stephens, dated Plymouth, March 4, 1795.

HAVING received Orders from my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty to put myself under the Command of Captain Stirling, of His Majesty's Ship Jason, I have the Honor to acquaint you, for their Lordships Information, that I failed, in Company with her, on the 27th of February, from Spithead, and that on the 1st of March a hard Gale of Wind and thick Weather from S. S. E. separated us. I used my utmost Endeavours to gain the Cruizing Ground, in order to join her again. At Nine o'Clock in the Evening of the 2d Instant, Ushant then bearing S. E. Thirteen Leagues, I saw a Sail coming down upon me, which I soon perceived to be an Armed Vessel, and gave her Chace. At Twelve o'Clock we took Possession of her; she proves to be the L'Espion, of Eighteen Six-Pounders and 140 Men, Five Days from Brest, on a Cruize, in perfect good Order, lately one of His Majesty's Sloops of War. I think she is a very desirable Vessel for the same Purpose, as she sails well. As I have many Prisoners on Board, I hope their Lordships will approve of my coming into the nearest Port to land them. With their Permission I shall leave her for the Inspection of the Officers of the Dock-Yard at this Port. I have the Honor to be, &c.

As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesty King George the First and Second and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted shall offend again he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificer shall be, or by any Person authorized by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforesaid, such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of one Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And, if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Goal till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary, or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland, into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary, or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with, or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Goal of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in Case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on Board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Offence, forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on Board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of

Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Eschew, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Ports, or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

Statutes 14, 21, 25 and 26 of His present Majesty.

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, jetties's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on Board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly offer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil or Implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Linen, Steel or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof, and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above mentioned, in the Case of Tools and Utensils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.

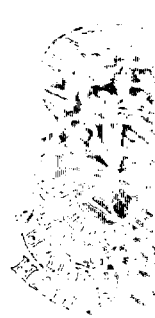

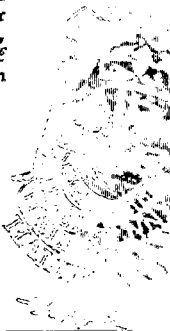
