Copy of a Litter from Sir John Warren, Cuptain of Ilis Majesty's Ship La Pomone, to Mr. Stephens, dated Cawjand Bay, March 2, 1795.

S 1 R

I Beg you will inform their Lordships, that, in purfuance of their Orders, I put to Sea on the 12th of February path, with the Shirs named in the Margin *. The Weather becoming thick, with fresh Breezes and a heavy Sea, on the 14th the Anson carried away her Main-Topmast, which obliged me to heave-to; and, owing to her Damages, I was under the Necessity of bearing down the Two following Days, as she had drifted considerably to Leeward; and, being unable to repair her Desects at Sea, I ordered Captain Durham to proceed with all possible Dispatch to Plymouth.

On the 18th, having fell in with Three Sail of the Enemy's Transports, Part of a Convoy bound from Brett, I hauled the Wind, and endeavoured to make the Land; and on the 21st the Light-House on Isle of Oleron bearing S. E. by E. I discovered a Frigate and Twenty Sail of Vessels under Convoy, close in with the Shore, many of them under American, Danish and Swedin Colours. I pursued them haif Way up the Pertuis D'Antioche, in Sight of the Isle of Aix; but the Tide of Flood setting strong up, and the Wind right in, I was obliged to tack, and captured and destroyed the Vessels in the enclosed List. I understand the Frigate was La Neriade, of Thirty-sic Guns, Twelve-Pounders, with Transports and other Vessels for Wine and Stores, to Rockfort and Bourdeaux, on Account of the Convention, for their Fleet. On the 26th, the Isle of Groubering Etst Six Leagues, I gave Chace to Six Sail of Vessels, in the N. W. At Nine, A. M. captured the Conventional Schoöner La Curiette, with the Five others. They were bound to Nantz from Brest, with Cloathing for the Army.

I am much indebted to the Ascention and Activity of Captains Keats and Martin, with their Officers and Men, upon this Occasion.

I arrived here this Day with the Galatea and Artois, and shall use every Dispatch in completing the Ships for Service.

Copy of a Letter from Captain George Burlton, of His Maj fiy's Ship Lively, to Mr. Stephens, dated Plymouth, March 4, 1795.

HAVING received Orders from my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty to put myself under the Command of Captain Stirling, of His Majeity's Ship Jason, I have the Honor to acquaint you, for their Lordships Information, that I sailed, in Company with her, on the 27th of February, from Spithead, and that on the 1st of March a hard Gale of Wind and thick Weather from S. S. E. separated us. I used my utmost Endeavours to gain the Cruizing Ground, in order to join her again. At Nine o'Clock in the Evening of the 2d Infant, Uthant then bearing S. E. Thirteen Leagues, I faw a Sail poming down upon me, which I foon perceived to be an Armed Vessel, and gave her Chace. At Twelve o'Clock we took Posselsion of her; she proves to be the L'Espion, of Eighteen Six-Pounders and 140 good Order, lately one of His Majesty's Sloops of War. I think the is a year of first year. I think the is a very defirable Veffel for the fame Purpose, as she fails well. As I have many Prisoners on Board, I hope their Lordinips will approve of my coming into the nearest Port to land Wish their Permission I shall leave her for the Inspection of the Officers of the Dock-Yard at this Port. As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, bave, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the fllowing Asstracts of Acts of Parliamen of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second and of His present Majelly, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Dischedience to them: And it will be observed, that fuch Penalties likewife extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of theje Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments wed by them, as well as to the Artistcers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

F any Person shall contract with, entice, or folicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Atificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and mall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be unprisoned I bree Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Perfon having been once convicted shall offer d again he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine ce paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Mouths after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificer-shall be, or by any Perion authorifed by such Ambaliador, &c or by one or the Secretaries of State, and frem henceforth inhabit within this Realm; fuch Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being as Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, De-Purchaie, and shall forfe's all Lands, vise or Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majefte's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His

Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any | Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majetty's Dominions, for the Purposes afoefaid, such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before fome other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of one Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the faid Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Affizes or Quarter Seffions : And, if fuch Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Goal till the mext Affizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any fuch Promife, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary, or the Circuit these.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavout to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufac-tures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland, into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein fuch Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indicament in the Court of Justiciary, or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with, or seduced, sorfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Impriforment in the Common Goal of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in Case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending thall forfeit, for every Person contracted with of seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until fuch Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on Board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up or Einishing of the Woollen or Silk Manusactures or any Part of such Tools, he shall; for every Offence, forseit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on Board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of

Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Ma-Cocket or Susferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and For-

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, jelly's Warehouses, all such Officer shall sind on Boar cany Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publickly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vestel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Vestel, he shall, for every such Offence, forseitONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inslicted upon Persons exporting the Penalties inslicted upon Persons exporting the Captain shall not only forseit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forseit his Empoyment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly uffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil or Implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Linen, Steel or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above mentioned, in the Case of Tools and Utensils used in the Woollen and Silk Manusastures.
