By HIS MAJESTY's Command,

the Night of the Nuptials of His Royal Highness the
Prince of Wales, or on the Day of the DrawingRoom ensuing.

And that all Chairs do come in at the Gate in Cleveland-Row, from whence they are to proceed

through the Green Cloth Court to the Bar at the Passage leading to the Great Court, where they are to set down, and return through the Piazza under the Ball-Room into the other Courts, where they are to attend, being placed in Order.

The Footmen attending Chairs are to wait in the Green Cloth Court, ranging themselves on each Side the Broad Pavement, so as to leave Room for the Chairs to pass.

His Majethy's Serjeant Porter, Yeoman and Groom Porters, and Marshal-Men, are strictly required to put these Orders in Execution, and to take into their Custody all Persons who shall offend against the same, or behave in an indecent or rictous Manner. Such Offenders will be proceeded against in the most exemplary Manner.

It is farther ordered, That the Serjeant Porter, Yeoman and Groom Porters, and Marshel-Men, do thut all the Gates and Avenues to the Palace, upon the first Notice that the Proceding coming from the Apartments to the Chapter and that they take particular Care that no Servants come within any of the Pars.

Letter from Major-General Sir Adam Williamfon, K. B. dated Jamaica, January 12, of which the following is an Extract, has been received by the Right Honorable Henry Dundas, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

Am concerned to have to report to you the Capture of Tiburoon. I inclose a Copy of Lieutenant Bradford's Letter, who commanded. I have every Reason to be perfectly satisfied with the Conduct of the Garrison: Their Situation was such that they could not possibly do more.

M. Du Plessis, the Lieutenant-Colonel, and Two other Officers of the South Legion were killed .-M. Du Plessis is a very great Loss to the Service.

Lieutenant Baskerville of the 13th Regiment, who had been badly wounded in a former Attack, was the only British Officer who lost his Life on this Occasion.

SIR, Cape Donna Maria, December 30. AS in Cases of this Nature Matters are very likely to be misrepresented, I take this Opportunity (thinking it my Duty) to inform you of the real State of the Garrison of Tiburoon before it's Evacuation.

We, to the Amount of 450 Men, counting the Army of Jean Kina, were attacked on the 25th, at Day-Light, by the Enemy, from Aux Cayes, with Three Armed Vessels. Their Attention, at first, was chiesly taken up by the King Grey, who defended the Harbour with much Spirit; but their Artillery being landed, and brought to bear from an Eminence, to the Amount of 1 Eighteen-Pounder, 1 Nine, 2 Pieces of Four, and 1 of Two, after Eight and Forty Hours of heavy cannonading, attended with a 50lb. Shell from an Eight-Inch Mortar, about every Ten Minutes, Night and Day, at length pierced the King Grey fo frequently, that he lowered so many Fort in the Wyter as to reader her Rattery weeks Feet in the Water as to render her Battery useless, and a red-hot Shot taking the Magazine, she blew

They then turned their Fire on our lower Battery, and very foon dismounted 2 Eighteen-Pounders, the

other being burft.

5 Finding it filenced, they then attacked the great Fort more vigorously than the former Days, bringing all their Cannon to bear on it, with heavy Musketry. They killed and wounded upwards of an Hundred Mer, every Shell latterly falling infide the Fort, all our Cannoniers being difabled.

A Shell falling in the Ditch where we had placed fome of Jean Kina's Corps, they forced the Draw-Bridge, and flew towards Jeremie Road. We then rallied, and forming a Rear and Advanced Guard, putting our Wounded in the Center, retreated in as much Order as the Case admitted of; and forcing an Ambuscade of the Enemy at Irois, are now endeavouring to put outfelves under the Command of Lieutenant-Colonel Handfield, at Jeremie.

We evacuated the Fort the 29th, about Two o'Clock in the Asternoon. I beg Leave to recommend to your Attention the Conduct of Mons. De Savre, Major de Place, which really proves the justice of the general Opinion of his Zeal and Bravery; also that of Mons. D'Anglade, of the Legion of the South, and Monf. De Breuil, commanding the Gunners.

The Conduct of the Troops in general was per fectly what you would have wished, and that of Jean Kina's Army, until Panic struck by the Shells, was admirable.

The Number of the Enemy was supposed to be about 3000, 800 of which were Troops of the Line,

including Artillery.
