Lord Chamberlain's Office, March 30, 1795.

THE Lord Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household is hereby pleased to order, That, on the Day of the Solemnization of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales's Nuptials, the Door of the Chapel Stairs is to be locked, and not opened on any Pretence whatsoever.

The Gallery leading to the Chapel to be kept perfectly clear.

The Foreign Ministers are to assemble in the little Council Chamber, and to be conducted by Stephen Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies, to the Closet allotted them in the Chapel.

No Gentleman whatever to be admitted to the Presence or Privy Chamber, unless full dressed; Ladies to be without Hats or Feathers.

The Footmen in the Royal Livery to be in the Guard-Chamber behind the Yeomen of the Guard.

The Pages, Valets de Chambre, &c. are not to suffer any Person to go up any of the Private Stairs.

And the Gentlemen Pensioners and Yeomen of the Guard are to take Care that no Person be suffered to stand in their respective Rooms, so as to obstruct the Procession.

Extract of a Letter from Sir Edward Pellew, Captain of His Majesty's Ship Indefatigable, dated Falmouth, March 23, 1795, to Mr. Nepean.

HAVING failed agreeable to my Letter of the 1st Instant, I proceeded in Execution of my Orders. I have now to communicate the Return of His Majesty's Ship under my Command to this Port; and beg you will be pleased to inform their Lordships, that having received Information from the Master of a Ship which I had chased, that a Convoy of Sixty Sail were to leave Brest on the 7th in the Morning, for Bourdeaux, protected by Three Frigates, I placed the Squadron under my Command as near the Penmarks as possible, and at Day-Light saw Twenty-five Sail close among the Rocks, under Guard of One small Armed Ship. Fifteen of this Number were taken and destroyed; the Remainder ran between the Rocks in such a Manner as rendered any Attempt of mine to pursue them fruitless.

Out of Eight taken, Two are laden with Building Timber, One with Bale Goods, and One partly with Sugar, Indigo and some Bales of Linen. Two Ships, Three Brigs and Two Sloops were burnt.

and the Most Christian King, and for regulating the Trade between this Kingdom and His Majesty's Colonies, and for other Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act for securing the Payment of the Annuities and of the Interest upon the Principal Sums therein provided for, and towards the Discharge of such principal Sums in such Manner as therein is directed, and for enabling the Officers of His Majesty's Treasury to receive certain Sums for a limited Time in Manner therein mentioned, and for granting to His Majesty a certain Sum of Money out of the Consolidated Fund, and for applying a certain Sum of Money therein mentioned for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Ninety five.

An Act for granting to His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, certain Duties and Rates upon the Portage and Conveyance of all Letters and Packets within this Kingdom.

An Act for granting to His Majesty the Duties therein mentioned upon Hides and Skins, and Manufactures of Leathers.

An Act for granting to His Majesty, for One Year, the Duties therein mentioned on Fire-Hearts, in Lieu of all Duties payable on the same prior to or during the said Term.

An Act for granting to His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, several Duties therein mentioned, to be levied by the Commissioners for managing the Stamp Duties.

And Act for defraying the Charge of the Pay and Clothing of the Militia for One Year from the Twentieth Day of March, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Ninety-five, and for the more easily raising the same.

An Act for the more effectual Support of the Families of Militia Men.

An Act that Acts of Parliament shall commence from the Time of the Royal Assent given.

An Act for indemnifying such Persons as have acted for the Service of the Public, in advising or carrying into Execution Two several Proclamations of the Lord Lieutenant and Council of this Kingdom, bearing Date the 24th and 29th Days of January, 1795, respectively, and for continuing and giving Effect to the said Proclamations.

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters within this Kingdom.

An Act to explain and amend an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, entitled, An Act for amending and reducing into one Act of Parliament the Laws relating to the Militia in Ireland.

An Act for the regulating the Payment of Bounties on the Exportation of certain Manufactures of this Kingdom.

An Act for the Regulation of Presentments for the Purpose of levying Money to be expended in erecting Court-Houses, Gaols, and other expensive Buildings.

An Act for continuing an Act, entitled, An Act for facilitating the Trade and Intercourse between this Kingdom and the United States of America.

An Act to repeal an Act of the Eleventh of George the Second, entitled, An Act for repairing the high Road from the Town of Teanawaragh in the County of Tipperary, to the Towns of Silvermines and Nenagh, and from said Towns by Shallee Orchard through the Town of Tullis in the said County, to the City of Limerick; as also one other Act passed in the Seventeenth Year of George the Second, to explain, continue and amend the first recited Act.

An Act for building a Bridge over the River Shannon at Portumna, in the County of Galway.

Dublin-Castle, March 25, 1795.

This Day his Excellency the Earl Fitzwilliam, between One and Two o'Clock, set out from the Castle, in the usual State, upon his Return to England, accompanied by the principal Nobility and Gentry, and followed by an extraordinary Concourse of People, who crowded the Streets and Quays to wish his Excellency a safe Voyage; which they did with repeated Acclamations and the strongest Expressions of their Regard. His Excellency embarked from the South Wall, together with the Countess Fitzwilliam and their Suite, on Board the Dorset Yacht, which sailed from the Bay at Half past Two o'Clock.
