HEREAS in the Act of Uniformity, which establishes the Liturgy of the Church of England, Provision is made for such Alterations in the Prayers for the Royal Family as from Time to Time shall become necessary, and be directed by lawful Authority; It is thereupon this Day ordered by His Majesty in Council, That, in the Morning and Evening Prayers, in the Litany, and in all other Parts of the Public Service, as well in the Occasional Offices as in the Book of Common Prayer, where the Royal Family is appointed to be particularly prayed for, the following Form and Order shall be observed, viz.

Our Gracious Queen Charlotte, Their Royal Highnesses George Prince of Wales, the Princess of Wales, and all the Royal Family.

And His Majesty doth strictly charge and command, That no Edition of the Common Prayer be from henceforth printed but in the Form aforementioned; and that in the mean Time, and until Copies of such Edition may be had, all Parsons, Vicars and Curates within this Realm, do (for the preventing of Mistakes) with the Pen, correct and amend all such Prayers in their Church Books, according to the

aforegoing Direction: And, for the better Notice hereof, that this Order be forthwith printed and published, and fent to the feveral Parishes; and that the Right Reverend the Bishops do take Care that Obedience be paid to the same accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. THEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council, bearing Date the 6th of February last, to order, and it was thereby ordered, That notwithstanding any Thing contained in Two Acts passed in the last Session of Parliament, referred to in the faid Order, it should be lawful for any Person, residing or being in Great Britain. to pay any Bill drawn or indorfed in any Part of the United Provinces, and fent from the faid Provinces on or before the Sixteenth Day of January last; provided such Bill should have been made payable at no greater Distance of Time than Three Months from the Date thereof, or Three Months from Sight thereof, under certain Conditions in the faid Order contained: -His Majesty, with the Advice of his Privy Council, is hereby, pleased to order, That the Licence so granted by the above recited Order of the Sixth of February laft, with respect to the Payment of the Bills the lair described, he extended, subject to the Confittion mentioned in the faid Ordes, to any Bills, diawings indorfed in any Part of the United Provinces and fent from the said Provinces, on or before the kid
