To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Chancellor, Masters and Scholars of the University of Oxford, beg Leave to approach your Royal Person with our most respectful and hearty Congratulations on the auspicious Nuptials of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales; and to express the Joy we feel at every Event which may conduce to the Happiness of your Majesty and your Royal Family.

Persuaded that, in uniting the Heir of your Crown to a Princess of the House of Brunswick, your Majesty had an especial Regard to the Public Good, we are bound to declare our Gratitude for your gracious Intention, and our Confidence that it will redound to the Increase of our National Prosperity. And this we are induced to expect, as well from the personal Virtues of Her Royal Highness, as from the Reflection that she is a Princess so nearly allied in Blood to your Majesty, and descended from a Branch of that illustrious House to which we owe the Preservation of our Civil and Religious Freedoms.

Permit us to assure your Majesty, that, in declaring these genuine Sentiments of our affectionate Duty, we express our real and fervent Attachment to your most sacred Person, and to the hereditary and constitutional
