The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December, 1792, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the

said Month of February, 1793, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirtieth Day of this instant April; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended, from the said Thirtieth Day of this instant April, to the Thirtieth Day of June next inclusive: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council, bearing Date the 6th of February last, to order, and it was thereby ordered, That notwithstanding any Thing contained in Two Acts passed in the last Session of Parliament, referred to in the said Order, it should be lawful for any Person, residing or being in Great Britain, to pay any Bill drawn or indorsed in any Part of the United Provinces, and sent from the said Provinces on or before the Sixteenth Day of January last; provided such Bill should have been made payable at no greater Distance of Time than Three Months from the Date thereof, or Three Months from Sight thereof, under certain Conditions in the said Order contained:—His Majesty, with the Advice of his Privy Council, is hereby pleased to order, That the Licence so granted by the above recited Order of the Sixth of February last, with respect to the Payment of the Bills therein described, be extended, subject to the Condition mentioned in the said Order, to any Bills, drawn or indorsed in any Part of the United Provinces, and sent from the said Provinces, on or before the said Sixteenth Day of January last, which shall have been made payable at no greater Distance of Time than Five Months from the Date thereof, or Five Months from Sight thereof.

Extract of a Letter from Captain Sir J. B. Warren, Bart. of His Majesty's Ship La Pomone, dated off Falmouth, April 24, 1795, to Evan Nepean, Esq;

UNtil the 15th Instant nothing material occurred; when a Sail having been discovered in the N. E. the Ile de Rhé bearing E. N. E. Five Leagues, I made the Signal for a general Chace, and at Half past Eight, A. M. the Artois brought her to. She proved to be Le Jean Bart, Ship Corvette, of 26 Guns and 187 Men.

On the 16th, having seen several Sail a-head, gave Chace with the Squadron, and at Four, P. M. Belleisle bearing N. Eight Leagues distant, came up with the Rear of a Convoy. A Corvette Brig, passing us to Leeward, exchanged a few Shot, which carried away her Studding-Sails. Finding it impracticable to pursue her, she running close in Shore, I stood after the rest, and at Five, P. M. brought to a Brig and a Sloop, which, being in Ballast, were set on Fire. The Galatea also, after exchanging a few Shot brought to a Ship-Corvette a-head, which proved to be L'Expedition, of 16 Guns and 120 Men, formerly a Packet in our Service.

The Artois also captured Two Sloops laden with Fish. The rest of the Convoy, with a Frigate, standing in between the Rocks, for Hedié and Quiberon Bay, escaped.

Extract of a Letter from the same, dated April 25.

IN Addition to the List of Vessels taken and destroyed by the Squadron under my Command, Captain Nagle, of the Artois, acquaints me, that, on the Evening we fell in with the last Convoy off Belleisle, he chased a Ship and Brig upon the Rocks near the Island of Hedié, and that they were lost thereon.
