Before we withdraw from your Royal Presence, we feel it our inditpensible Duty to return your Ma-jesty our most unseigned Thanks for your truly Royal and patriotic Establishment and Patronage of the most laudable and beneficial Institution ever set on Foot in any Nation for human Happiness, in Conjunction with the other Two august Branches of the Legislature; we mean the National Board of Agriculture, whereby, we trust, these Kingdoms will be raifed to a still greater unexampled Pitch of Opulence, Power and Prosperity, and the Names and Memories of it's Royal and noble Founders immortalized.

We do now most humbly and finally presume to express another most ardent and important Wish and Defire to our most gracious and beloved Monarch, in which, we are persuaded, all Ranks of People in your Majesty's Dominions, and perhaps all Europe, will most heartily concur, that the happy Æra we now have the high Honour joyfully to felicitate your Majesties upon, may be productive of the like great, important and beneficial Consequences to these Kingdoms, and the whole habitable Globe, as those which occurred upon your Majesty's happy and auspicious Union with your Royal and Illustrious Confort; and that your paternal Wishes, coincident with those of your People, may be fully and speedily gratified, by your holding out the Olive Branch, and giving now, as you did then, the inestimable Eleflings of Peace to the contending Nations of Europe, and other Climes, confistent with the Honour and Dignity of your Imperial Crown of these Realms, and the unalienable Religious and Civil Rights of the People, whereby your Majesty's great and amiable Character would be enrolled in the Anrials of National History, and transmitted down to the latest Posterity with still greater Eciat, Justice and Veneration.
