P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act made in the Twenty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for preventing certain Instruments from being required from Ships belonging to the United States of America; and to give to His Majesty, for a limited Time, certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the said United States;" which said Act has been continued by several subsequent Acts until the 5th Day of April, 1795. And whereas by an Act made in the Twenty-fourth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to extend the Powers of an Act, made in the Twenty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for giving His Majesty certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the United States of America, to the Trade and Commerce of this Kingdom with the British Colonies and Plantations in America, with respect to certain Articles therein mentioned," the Powers given by the said recited Act were extended to the Trade and Intercourse between this Kingdom and the British Colonies and Plantations in America, so far as the same might relate to Iron, Hemp and Sailcloth, and other Articles of the Produce of any Place bordering on the Baltic, which might be exported from this Kingdom; which last mentioned Act has also by several subsequent Acts been continued until the said 5th Day of April, 1795.

And whereas by another Act passed in this present Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to continue the Laws now in Force for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the Territories belonging to the United States of America, so far as the same relate to the Trade and Commerce carried on between this Kingdom and the Inhabitants of the Countries belonging to the said United States," it is declared to be expedient, that the said Act of the Twenty-third Year of His present Majesty's Reign, so far only as the same extends to the Trade and Commerce carried on between this Kingdom and the People and Territories belonging to the United States of America, and also that the said Act of the Twenty-fourth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, should be further continued and be in Force; and it is thereby enacted, that the said Acts shall

shall continue and be in Force until the 5th Day of April, 1796. and to the End of the then next Session of Parliament:

His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That any Unmanufactured Goods and Merchandizes, the Importation of which into this Kingdom is not prohibited by Law (except Tobacco, for which Provision is herein after made, and except Oil made from Fish or Creatures living in the Sea, and Blubber, Whale-Fins and Spermaceti) and any Pig Iron, Bar Iron, Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Rosin, Pot Ash, Pearl Ash, Indico, Malts, Yards and Bowsprits, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, may be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, either in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, or in Ships built in the Countries belonging to the United States of America, or any of them, or in Ships taken by any of the Ships or Vessels of War belonging to the Government, or any of the Inhabitants of the said United States, and condemned as lawful Prize in any Court of Admiralty of the said United States (of which Condemnation due Proof shall be given) and owned by the Subjects of the said United States, or any off them, and whereof the Master and Three-fourths of the Mariners at least are Subjects of the said United States, or any of them, and may be entered and landed in any Port of this Kingdom, upon Payment of such Duties as the like Sorts of Goods or Merchandize are or may be subject and liable to if imported in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, from any British Island or Plantation in America, notwithstanding such Goods or Merchandize, or the Ships in which the same may be brought, may not be accompanied with the Certificates or other Documents heretofore required by Law.

And it is further ordered, that all other Goods and Merchandize, not herein before enumerated or described, the Importation of which into this Kingdom is not prohibited by Law, (except Snuff, for which Provision is herein after made) and also Oil made from Fish or Creatures living in the Sea, and Blubber, Whale-Fins and Spermaceti, being the Growth, Production or Manufacture of any of the Territories of the said United States of America, may be imported from thence into this Kingdom in British or American Ships, owned and navigated as herein before required, upon Payment of such Duties of Customs and Excise as are payable on the

like Goods and Merchandize upon their Importation into this Kingdom from Countries not under the Dominion of His Majesty, according to the Schedule and Tables, marked A. D. and F. annexed to an Act passed in the Twenty-seventh Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for repealing the several Duties of Customs and Excise, and granting other Duties in Lieu thereof, and for applying the said Duties together with the other Duties composing the Public Revenue; for permitting the Importation of certain Goods, Wares and Merchandize, the Produce or Manufacture of the European Dominions of the French King, into this Kingdom; and for applying certain unclaimed Monies remaining in the Exchequer, for the Payment of Annuities on Lives, to the Reduction of the National Debt;" or by any other Laws in Force passed subsequent to the said Act, touching the Duties contained in the said Schedule and Tables, marked A. D. and F.; and in Cases where different Duties are imposed upon the like Goods imported from different Countries not under the Dominion of His Majesty, then that such Goods shall be imported upon the lowest Duties which by the said Schedule and Tables, marked A. D. and F. are required to be paid on the Importation of any such Goods from any European Country not under the Dominion of His Majesty.

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that all such Goods and Merchandize shall be intitled to the same Drawbacks as are allowed upon the Exportation of the like Goods and Merchandize when exported from this Kingdom, according to the said Schedule and Tables, marked A. D. and F. annexed to the before mentioned Act passed in the Twenty-seventh Year of His present Majesty's Reign, or according to any other Law in Force, passed subsequent to the said Act, touching Drawbacks. And it is hereby further ordered, that there shall be allowed and paid the same Drawbacks and Bounties on Goods and Merchandize exported from this Kingdom to the Territories of the said United States, or any of them, as are or may hereafter be allowed by Law upon the Exportation of the like Goods or Merchandize to any of the Islands, Plantations, or Colonies, belonging to the Crown of Great Britain in America. And it is hereby further ordered, that there shall be allowed and paid the same Drawbacks upon the Exportation of any Sort of Foreign Hemp or Foreign Iron exported from this Kingdom into any British Colony or Plantation in America, or into the Territories of the United States of America, or any of them,

them, as are or may hereafter be allowed by Law upon the Exportation of the like Sort of Hemp or Iron to other Foreign Parts; and all such Drawbacks and Bounties respectively shall be allowed and paid in the same Manner, and under the same Rules, Regulations, Restrictions and Forfeitures, in all Respects, as such Drawbacks and Bounties are allowed and paid, or are subject and liable to by Law; provided always, and His Majesty is further pleased to order, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the Importation of Rice and other Articles, without Payment of any Duty whatever, by virtue of an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for enabling His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation, and permit the Importation of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision for a limited Time, without Payment of Duty," and in the Manner in the said Act mentioned.

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that any Tobacco, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the said United States of America, may be imported in British or American Ships, owned and navigated as herein before required, upon Payment of the same Duties as Tobacco, imported by British Subjects from any British Colony or Plantation, is or may hereafter be subject to; and that any Snuff, being the Production or Manufacture of any of the said Territories, may be imported in Manner before mentioned, upon Payment of such Duties as Snuff, being the Production or Manufacture of Europe, imported from Europe, is or hereafter may be subject to, and may be warehoused and again exported; subject respectively nevertheless to all and singular the Regulations of an Act made and passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for repealing the Duties on Tobacco and Snuff, and for granting new Duties in Lieu thereof:" And another Act passed in the Thirtieth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to explain and amend an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for repealing the Duties on Tobacco and Snuff, and for granting new Duties in Lieu thereof:" And also another Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to prevent other Ships than those laden with Tobacco from mooring and discharging their Lading at the Places appointed by an Act made in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for repealing the Duties on Tobacco and Snuff, and for granting new Duties in Lieu thereof;

"to prohibit the Exportation of damaged or mean Tobacco; and for permitting the Importation of Tobacco and Snuff into the Port of Newcastle upon Tyne."

And His Majesty is further pleased to order, That in case and as often as Rice shall not be allowed, by the said Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, to be imported without Payment of any Duty, any Rice, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, which shall be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, in Manner above-mentioned, may, upon the Importer paying down, in ready Money, the Duty of Eight-pence the Hundred Weight, being Part of the Duties now payable on the Importation of Rice, be landed and warehoused (except as hereinafter excepted) under His Majesty's Locks, in such Warehouses as shall be approved of for that Purpose by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, or any Four or more of them, upon the Importer's own Bond for Payment of the Remainder of the Duties due and payable for such Rice, within Eighteen Months, according to the net Weight and Quantity of such Rice at the Time it shall be so landed: But it is His Majesty's Pleasure nevertheless, that upon the Importation of any such Rice into the Ports of London, Bristol, Portsmouth, Cowes, Liverpool, Lancaster, Falmouth, Pool, Whitehaven, Hull, Greenock, and Port Glasgow, or either of them, in the Manner herein before expressed, the Importer shall be at Liberty to enter and land the same without Payment of any Duty whatever; in which Case such Rice shall be warehoused, under the joint Locks of His Majesty and the Proprietors, in such Warehouse or Warehouses as shall be approved of for that Purpose by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, or any Four or more of them, in that Part of Great Britain called England, and any Three or more of them, in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland; every Expence attending which Warehousing shall be borne by the said Proprietors: And that such Proprietor or Proprietors, or his or their known Agent, shall from Time to Time, at all seasonable Hours, as Occasion may require, have free Access to such Warehouses, in the Presence of some proper Officer of the Customs, for the Purpose of screening and shifting the Rice, to prevent it's receiving Damage. And that if any Rice, which shall be so imported from the Territories of the said United States into any of the Ports abovementioned respectively, and warehoused as aforesaid, shall be taken out of the Warehouses wherein the same shall be secured, under the joint Locks of His Majesty and the Proprietors as aforesaid, for Home Consumption,

the

the full Duties, due and payable by Law upon the Importation of such Rice into this Kingdom for Home Consumption, shall, previously to it's being taken out of such Warehouses, be paid to the Collector of His Majesty's Customs at the Ports where such Rice shall be so warehoused; but that such Proprietor, if he intends to export such Rice, shall have Liberty to export the same from such Warehouses respectively, under the usual Regulations, without Payment of any Duty whatever: Provided that the Exportation of any such Rice, hereafter to be warehoused, be made within the said Space of Eighteen Months; and if not within that Period, that the full Duties, payable by Law upon the Importation of such Rice, be paid for the same, and not be afterwards drawn back: And that if any Rice which shall have been imported into any Port of this Kingdom, not herein before specially named, and shall have been warehoused upon the Importer's Bond, in Manner aforesaid, shall, within the Time herein before mentioned, be taken out of the Warehouse wherein it shall have been so secured, to be exported directly from thence, the Bond entered into for the Payment of the said Duties thereon shall be discharged and cancelled by Debenture or Debentures, made out and passed in the usual Manner, for the Quantity or Quantities of Rice duly exported. And if any Rice imported into any Port of this Kingdom, not herein before specially named, and warehoused in Manner aforesaid, shall be taken out of any such Warehouse for Home Consumption, the Remainder of the Duties, due and payable by Law, shall, previously to it's being taken out of such Warehouse, be paid to the Collector of His Majesty's Customs at the Port where such Rice shall be so warehoused; and that such Payment shall be made, and the Warehouse cleared for such Rice hereafter to be warehoused, within the said Space of Eighteen Months, otherwise the same shall and may be sold for the Duties, in like Manner, and under the same Rules, Regulations and Restrictions, as any other Goods are now directed by Law to be sold for the Duties.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them, may respectively appertain.

No Letter or Packet whatsoever, sent by the Post within Great Britain, directed by or to any Member of either House of Parliament of Great Britain, shall, from and after the 5th Instant, be exempted from the Duty of Postage, if such Letter or Package shall exceed One Ounce in Weight.

No Letter or Packet directed by any such Member, shall be exempted from the Postage, unless the Member whose Name shall be indorsed thereon, shall actually be in the Post-Town into the Post-Office of which every such Letter or Packet shall be put, or within the Limits of the Delivery of Letters for such Post-Town, or within Twenty Miles of such Post-Town, on the Day, or on the Day before the Day on which such Letter or Packet shall be put into the Post-Office.

No such Member shall be entitled or allowed to send by the Post, free from Postage, superscribed or directed by him, more than Ten Letters in any One Day, nor to receive by the Post, free from Postage, more than Fifteen Letters directed to him in any One Day.

Provided; that whenever the Number of Letters or Packets, not weighing more than One Ounce each, sent or received by any such Member in any One Day, shall exceed the Number exempted by the said Act from Postage, and the Rate of Postage upon any of them shall differ, then such of the said Letters or Packets as would be chargeable with a higher Rate of Postage than the Remainder, shall be included in the Number so exempted, in Preference to any which would be chargeable with a lower Rate of Postage, and the Remainder shall be chargeable with the several Rates of Postage respectively to which such Letters would now by Law be chargeable, if sent or received by any

Persons not entitled to send or receive Letters or Packets free from Postage.

The several Persons who by Law are authorised in Right of their Offices and Employments to send and receive Letters free from Postage, and their Successors in such Offices and Employments, may, during their Continuance in such Offices and Employments, send and receive Letters and Packets, free from Postage, as they now send and receive the same.

No printed Votes or Proceedings in Parliament, or printed Newspapers sent without Covers, or in Covers open at the Sides, which shall be signed on the Outside thereof by the Hand of any Member of Parliament as heretofore practised, or which shall be directed to any such Member at any Place whereof he shall have given Notice in Writing to the Postmaster-General, or his Deputy, shall be charged with Postage.

No single Letter sent by the Post from any Non-commissioned Officer, Seaman, or Private employed in His Majesty's Navy, Army, Militia, Fencible Regiments, Artillery or Marines, shall, whilst such Non-commissioned Officer, Seaman or Private shall be employed on His Majesty's Service, and not otherwise, be charged with an higher Rate of Postage than the Sum of One Penny for the Conveyance of each such Letter, such Postage to be paid at the Time of putting the same into the Post-Office of the Town or Place from whence such Letter is intended to be sent by the Post.

Provided, that no such Letter shall be exempted from Postage unless there shall be written thereon in the Hand-Writing of and signed by the Commanding Officer for the Time being of the Ship or Vessel, or of the Corps, Regiment, or Detachment to which such Non-commissioned Officer, Seaman, or Private shall belong, the Name of such Commanding Officer, and of the Ship, Vessel, Corps, Regiment or Detachment commanded by him.

No single Letter, directed to any such Non-commissioned Officer, Seaman or Private, upon his own private Concerns, only whilst such Non-commissioned Officer, Seaman or Private shall be employed on His Majesty's Service, and not otherwise, shall be charged with an higher Rate of Postage than One Penny for each such Letter, which Penny shall be paid at the Time of the Delivery thereof.

Provided, that no such Letter shall be exempted from the Rates of Postage chargeable upon Letters, unless every such Letter shall be directed to such Non-commissioned Officer, Seaman or Private, specifying the Ship, Vessel, Regiment, Troop, Corps, Company, or Detachment to which he may belong: And provided also that it shall not be lawful for the Deputy Postmaster of the Town or Place to which such Letter shall be sent to be delivered, to deliver such Letter to any Person, except to the Non-commissioned Officer, Seaman, or Private to whom such Letter shall be directed, or to any Person appointed to receive the same by the Commanding Officer of the Ship, &c. to which the Non-commissioned Officer, Seaman, or Private to whom such Letter shall be directed shall belong.

Every

Every Packet or Cover containing therein, or having affixed thereto, one or more Paper or Papers, with Patterns, or one or more Pattern or Patterns of Cloth, Silk, Stuff, or other Goods, or one or more Sample or Samples of any other Sort of Thing, not exceeding together one Ounce in Weight, shall be charged with no higher Rate of Postage than as a single Letter, so as every such Packet or Cover shall be sent open at the Sides, and without any Letter or Writing in, upon, or with such Packet or Cover, other than the Name or Names of the Person or Persons sending the same, and the Place or Places of his or their Abode, and the Prices of the Articles contained therein, or affixed thereto.
