AT the Council-Chamber, *Whitehall*, the 20th of May, 1795.

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act made in the Twenty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for preventing certain Instruments from being required from Ships belonging to the United States of America; and to give to His Majesty, for a limited Time, certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the said United States;" which said Act has been continued by several subsequent Acts until the 5th Day of April, 1795. And whereas by an Act made in the Twenty-fourth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to extend the Powers of an Act, made in the Twenty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for giving His Majesty certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the United States of America, to the Trade and Commerce of this Kingdom with the British Colonies and Plantations in America, with respect to certain Articles therein mentioned," the Powers given by the said recited Act were extended to the Trade and Intercourse between this Kingdom and the British Colonies and Plantations in America, so far as the same might relate to Iron, Hemp and Sailcloth, and other Articles of the Produce of any Place bordering on the Baltic, which might be exported from this Kingdom; which last mentioned Act has also by several subsequent Acts been continued until the said 5th Day of April, 1795.

And whereas by another Act passed in this present Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to continue the Laws now in Force for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the Territories belonging to the United States of America, so far as the same relate to the Trade and Commerce carried on between this Kingdom and the Inhabitants of the Countries belonging to the said United States," it is declared to be expedient, that the said Act of the Twenty-third Year of His present Majesty's Reign, so far only as the same extends to the Trade and Commerce carried on between this Kingdom and the People and Territories belonging to the United States of America, and also that the said Act of the Twenty-fourth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, should be further continued and be in Force; and it is thereby enacted, that the said Acts shall
