PRE SENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. THEREAS by an AA made in the Twentythird Year of the Reign of His prefent Majefty, intituled, " An AA for preventing certain " Influments from being required from Ships " belonging to the United States of America; " and to give to His Majesty, for a limited " Time, certain Powers for the better carrying " on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects " of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants " of the faid United States ;" which faid Act has been continued by feveral fubfequent Acts until the 5th Day of April, 1795. And whereas by an Act made in the Twenty-fourth Year of His prefent Majefty's Reign, intituled, " An Act to extend the " Powers of an Act, made in the Twenty-third Year " of the Reign of His prefent Majeity, for giving " His Majelty certain Powers for the better carrying " on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of " His Majelty's Dominions and the Inhabitants " of the United States of America, to the Trade " and Commerce of this Kingdom with the British - Colonies and Plantations in America, with re-" fpect to c. rtain Articles therein mentioned," the Powers given by the faid recited Act were extended to the Trade and Intercourse between this Kingdom and the British Colonies and Plantations in America, so far as the same might relate to

 \mathbf{A}^{T} the Council-Chamber, Wbiteball, the 20th Iron, Hemp and Sailcloth, and other Articles of the Produce of any Place bordering on the Baltic, which might be exported from this Kingdom; which last mentioned Act has also by feveral fubfequent Acts been continued until the faid 5th Day of April, 1795.

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And whereas by another Act passed in this present Sellion of Parliament, intituled, " An Act to continue " the Laws now in Force for regulating the Trade be-" tween the Subjects of His Majelly's Dominions " and the Inhabitants of the Territories belonging " to the United States of America, fo far as the " fame relate to the Trade and Commerce carried " on between this Kingdom and the Inhabitants " of the Countries belonging to the faid United " States," it is declared to be expedient, that the faid Act of the Twenty-third Year of His prefent Majefty's Reign, fo far only as the fame extends to the Trade and Commerce carried on between this Kingdom and the People and Territories belonging to the United States of America, and alfo that the faid Act of the Twenty-fourth Year of His prefent Majefly's Reign, fhould be further continued and be in Force; and it is thereby enacted, that the faid Acts shall continue and be in Force until the 5th Day of April, 1796, and to the End of the then next Seffion of Parliament:

His Majefty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That any Unmanufactured Goods and Merchandizes, the Importation of which into this Kingdom

Kingdom is not prohibited by Law (except Tobacco,) for which Provision is herein after made, and except Oil made from Fifh or Creatures living in the Sea, and Blubber, Whale-Fins and Spermaceti) and any Pig Iron, Bar Iron, Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Rofin, Pot-Afh, Pearl-Afh, Indico; Mafts, Yards and Bowforits, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, may be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, either in British-built Ships, owned by His Majefty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, or in Ships built in the Countries belonging to the United States of America, or any of them, or in Ships taken by any of the Ships or Veffels of War belonging to the Government, or any of the Inhabitants of the faid United States, and condemned as lawful Prize in any Court of Admiralty of the faid United States (of which Condemnation due Proof fhall be given) and owned by the Subjects of the faid. United States, or any of them, and whereof the Mafter and Threefourths of the Mariners at least are Subjects of the faid United States, or any of them, and may be entered and landed in any Port of this Kingdom, upon Payment of fuch Duties as the like Sorts of Goods or Merchandize are or may be fubject and liable to if imported in British-built Ships, owned by His Majefty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, from any British Island or Flantation in America; notwithstanding fuch Goods or Merchandize, or the Ships in which the fame may be brought, may not be accompanied with the Certificates or other Documents heretofore required by Law.

And 'it is further ordered, that all other Goods and Merchandize, not herein before enumerated or defcribed, the Importation of which into this King-"dom is not prohibited by Law, (except Snuff, for which Provision is herein after made) and also Oil made from Fish or Creatures living in the Sea, and Blubber, Whale-Fins and Spermaceti, being the · Growth, Production or Manufacture of any of the Territories of the faid United States of America, may be imported from thence into this Kingdom in : British or American Ships, owned and navigated as herein before required, upon Payment of fuch Duties of Coftoms and Excise as are payable on the like Goods and Merchandize upon their Importation into this Kingdom from Countries not under the . Dominion of His Majefty, according to the Schedule and Tables, marked A. D. and F. annexed to an Act passed in the Twenty-feventh Year of His prefent Majesty's Reign, intituled, " An Act for repealing the feveral Duties of Cufloms and Excife, and grant-

" ing other Duties in Lieu thereof, and for applying the faid Duties together with the other Du-" ties composing the Public Revenue; for permit-"ting the Importation of certain Goods, Wares " and Merchandize, the Produce or Manufacture " of the European Dominions of the French King, " into this Kingdom ; and for applying certain un-" claimed Monies remaining in the Exchequer, for " the Payment of Annuities on Lives, to the Re-"duction of the National Debt;" or by any other Laws in Force paffed fubfequent to the faid Act, touching the Duties contained in the faid Schedule and Tables, marked A. D. and F.; and in Cafes where different Duties are impoled upon the like Goods imported from different Countries not under the Dominion of His Majesty, then that such Goods shall be imported upon the lowest Duties which by the faid Schedule and Tables, marked A. D. and F. are required to be paid on the Importation of any fuch Goods from any European Country not under the Dominion of His Majetty.

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And His Majefty is hereby further pleafed to order, that all fuch Goods and Merchandize shall be intitled to the fame Drawbacks as are allowed upon the Exportation of the like Goods and Merchandize when exported from this Kingdom, according to the faid Schedule and Tables, marked A. D. and F. annexed to the before mentioned Act paffed in the Twenty-feventh Year of His prefent Majefty's Reign, or according to any other Law in Force, paffed fubfequent to the faid Act, touching Drawbacks. And it is hereby further ordered, that there shall be allowed and paid the fame Drawbacks and Bounties on Goods and Merchandize exported from this Kingdom to the Territories of the faid United States, or any of them, as are or-may hereafter be allowed by Law upon the Exportation of the like Goods or Merchandize to any of the Islands, Plantations, or Colonies, belonging to the Crown of Great Britain in America. And it is hereby further ordered, that there shall be allowed and paid the fame Drawbacks upon the Exportation of any Sort of Foreign Hemp or Foreign Iron exported from this Kingdom into any British Colony or Plantation in America, or into the Territories of the United States of America, or any of them, as are or may hereafter be allowed by Law upon the Exportation of the like Sort of Hemp or Iron to other Foreign Parts; and all fuch Drawbacks and Bounties respectively shall be allowed and paid in the fame Manner, and under the fame Rules, Regulations, Restrictions and Forfeitures, in all Refpects, as fuch Drawbacks and Bounties are allowed

allowed and paid, or are fubject and liable to by Law; provided always, and His Majefty is further pleafed to order, that nothing herein contained fhall · be confirued to prevent the Importation of Rice and other Articles, without Payment of any Duty what. ever, by virtue of an ASt poffed in the prefent Seffion of Parliament, intituled, " An Act for enabling-His " Majely to prohibit the Exportation, and per-" mit the Importation of Corn, and for allowing ** the Importation of other Articles of Provision for "" a limited Time, without Payment of Duty," and in the Manner in the faid Act mentioned.

And His Majelly is hereby further pleafed to or der, that any Tabacco, being the Growth or Pro--duction of any of the Territories of the faid United States of America, may be iniported in British or Am rican Ships, owned and navigated as herein before required, upon Payment of the fame Duties as Tobacco, imported by British Subjects from any British Colony or Plantation, is or may hereafter be fubject to; and that any Snuff, being the Production or Manufacture of any of the faid Territories, may be imported in Manner before mentioned, upon Payment of fuch Duties as Snuff, being the Production or Manufacture of Europe, imported from Europe, is or hereafter may be fubject to, and may be warehouled and again exported ; fubject refpectively neverthelefs to all and fingular the Reguittions of an Act made and paffed in the Twentyninth Year of the Reign of His prefent Majefty, intituled, "An Act for repealing the Duties on To-" bacco and Snuß, and for granting new Daties in " Lieu thereof :" And another Act passed in the Thirticth Year of His prefent Majefty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to explain and amend an Act " made in the last Seffion of Parliament, intituled, " An Act for repealing the Dutics on Tobacco and " Snuff, and for granting new Duties in Lieu " thereof " And also another Act passed in the Thirty first Year of His prefent Majesty's Reign, intituled, " An Act to prevent other Ships than those " laden with Tobacco from mooring and discharg-"" ing their Lading at the Places appointed by an " A& made in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign " of His present Majesty, intituled, " An Act for · " repealing the Duties on Tobacco and Snuff, " and for granting new Duties in Lieu thereof; " to prohibit the Exportation of damaged or mean " Tebacco; and for permitting the Importation of " " Tobacco and Snuff into the Port of Newcastle " upon Tyne."

And His Majesty is further pleased to order, That in cafe and as often as Rice shall not be allowed,

liament, to be imported without Payment of any Duty, any Rice, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, which shall be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, in Manner-above-mentioned, may, upon the Importer paying down, in ready Money, the Duty of Eight-pence the Hundred Weight, being Part of the Duties now payable on the Importation of Rice, bellanded and warehoused (except as hereinaster excepted) under His Majefty's Locks, in fuch Warehoufes as shall be approved of for that Purpole by the Commiffioners of His Majefty's Cuftoms, or any Four or more of them, upon the Importer's own Bond for Payment of the Remainder of the Duties due and payable for fuch Rice, within Eighteen Months, according to the net Weight and Quantity of fuch Rice at the Time it shall be so landed : But it is His Majesty's Pleasure neverthelefs, that upon the Importation of any fuch Rice into the Ports of London, Brittol, Portfmouth, Cowes, Liverpool, Lancaster, Falmouth, Pool, Whitehaven, Hull, Greenock, and Port Glafgow, or either of them, in the Manner herein before expressed, the Importer shall be at Liberty to enter and land the fame without Payment of any Duty whatever; in which Cafe fuch Rice shall be warehoused, under the joint Looks of His Majefty and the Proprietors, in fuch Warehouse or Warehouses as shall be approved of for that Purpole by the Commissioners of His Majefty's Cuftoms, or any Four or more of them, in that Part of Great Britain called England, and any Three or more of them, in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland; every Expence attending which Warehousing shall be borne by the faid Proprietors: And that fuch Proprietor or Proprietors, or his or their known Agent, shall from Time to Time, at all scalonable Hours, as Occasion may require, have free Access to fuch Warehouses, in the Prefence of some proper Officer of the Customs, for the Purpofe of Greening and fhifting the Rice, to prevent it's receiving Damage. And that if any Rice, which shall be so imported from the Territories of the faid United States into any of the Ports abovementioned respectively, and warehoused as aforesaid, shall be taken out of the Warehouses wherein the same shall be secured, under the joint Locks of His Majesty and the Proprietors as aforefaid, for Home Confumption, the full Duties, due and payable by Law upon the Importation of fuch Rice into this Kingdom for Home Confumption, fhall, previously to it's being taken out of fuch Warehoufes, he paid to the Collector of His Majefty's Cuftoms at the Ports where fuch Rice shall be so warehoused ; but that such Proby the faid Act passed in the present Session of Par- | prietor, if he intends to export such Rice, shall have Liberty

respectively, under the usual Regulations, without Payment of any Duty whatever : Provided that the Exportation of any fuch Rice, hereafter to be watchoused, be made within the faid Space of Eighteen Months; and if not within that Period, that the full Duties, payable by Law upon the Importation of fuch Rice, be paid for the fame, and not be afterwards drawn back: And that if any Rice which shall have been imported into any Port of this Kingdom, not herein before fpecially named, and shall have been warehoused upon the Importer's Bond, in Manner aforefaid, shall, within the Time herein before mentioned, be taken out of the Warehouse wherein it shall have been so secured, to be exported directly from thence, the Bond entered into for the Payment of the faid Duties thereon shall be discharged and cancelled by Debenture or Debentures, made out and paffed in the usual Manner, for the Quantity or Quantities of Rice duly exported. And if any Rice imported into any Port of this Kingdom, not herein before fpecially named, and warehoused in Manner aforesaid, shall be taken out of any fuch Warehouse for Home Confumption, the Remainder of the Duties, due and payable by Law, shall, previously to it's being taken out of fuch Warehoufe, be paid to the Collector of His Majefty's Cultoms at the Port where fuch Rice shall be fo warehoused; and that such Payment shall be made, and the Warehouse cleared for such Rice hereafter to be warehoufed, within the faid Space of Eighteen Months, otherwife the fame shall and may be fold for the Duties, in like Manner, and under the fame Rules, Regulations and Reffrictions, as any other Goods are now directed by Law to be fold for the Duties.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majefty's Treafury, and the Lords Commiffioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain. W. Fanukener.
