And His Majefty is hereby further pleafed to order, that any Tobacco, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the faid United States of America, may be imported in British or American Ships, owned and navigated as herein before required, upon Payment of the fame Duties as Tobacco, imported by British Subjects from any British Colony or Plantation, is or may hereafter be subject to; and that any Snuff, being the Production or Manufacture of any of the faid Territories, muy be imported in Manner before mentioned, upon Fayment of fuch Duties as Snuff, being the Production or Manufacture of Europe, imported from Europe, is or hereafter may be fubject to, and may be warehoused and again exported ; subject refpectively neverthelefs to all and fingular the Regulations of an Act made and paffed in the Twentyninth Year of the Reign of His prefent Majefty, insituled, " An A& for repealing the Duties on To-** bacco and Snull, and for granting new Duties in " Lica thereof :" And another Act passed in the Thirtieth Year of His prefent Msjefty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to explain and amend an Act " made in the last Seffion of Parliament, intituled, " An Act for repealing the Duties on Tobacco and " Snuff, and for granting new Duties in Lieu " thereof :" And also another Act passed in the Thirty fuit Year of His prefent Majefty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to prevent other Ships than those " laden with Tobacco from mooring and discharg-" ing their Lading at the Places appointed by an " Act made in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign " of His prefent Majefty, intituled, " An Act for " repealing the Duties on Tobacco and Snuff, ss and the granting new Duties in Lieu thereof; " to prohibit the Exportation of damaged or mean " Tobacco; and for permitting the Importation of " Tobacco and Snuff into the Port of Newcafile " upon Tyne."

And His Majefty is further pleafed to order, That in cafe and as often as Rice shall not be allowed, by the faid Act paffed in the prefent Seffion of Parliament, to be imported without Payment of any Duty, any Rice, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, which shall be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, in Manner above-mentioned, may, upon the Importer paying down, in ready Money, the Duty of Eight-pence

payable on the Importation of Rice, be landed and warehoused (except as hereinafter excepted) under His Majefty's Locks, in fuch Warehoufes as shall be approved of for that Purpole by the Commilfioners of His Majefty's Cuftoms, or any Four or more of them, upon the Importer's own Bond for Payment of the Remainder of the Duties due and payable for fuch Rice, within Eighteen Months, according to the net Weight and Quantity of fuch Rice at the Time it shall be fo landed : But it is His Majefty's Pleafure neverthelefs, that upon the Importation of any fuch Rice into the Ports of London, Briftol, Portfmoath, Cowes, Liverpool, Lancaster, Falmouth, Pool, Whitehaven, Hull, Greenock, and Port Glafgow, or either of them, in the Manner herein before expressed, the Importer shall be at Liberty to enter and land the fame without Payment of any Duty whatever; in which Cafe fuch Rice shall be warehoused, under the joint Locks of His Majefly and the Proprietors, in fuch Warehoufe or Warehoufes as shall be approved of for that Purpole by the Commillioners of His Majefty's Cuftoms, or any Four or more of them, in that Part of Great Britain called England, and any Three or more of them, in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland; every Expence attending which Warehoufing shall be borne by the faid Proprietors: And that fuch Proprietor or Proprietors, or his or their known Agent, shall from Time to Time, at all feafonable Hours, as Occasion may require, have free Access to fuch Warehouses, in the Prefence of fome proper Officer of the Cultoms, for the Parpole of fkreening and shifting the Rice, to prevent it's receiving Damage. And that if any Rice, which fhall be fo imported from the Territories of the faid . United States into any of the Ports abovementioned respectively, and warehoused as aforefaid, shall be taken out of the Warehouses wherein the same shall be fecured, under the joint Locks of His Majeffy and the Proprietors as aforefaid, for Home Confumption, the full Duties, due and payable by Law upon the Importation of fuch Rice into this Kingdom for Home Confumption, fhall, previoufly to it's being taken out of fuch Warchouses, he paid to the Collector of His Majefly's Culoms at the Ports where fuch Rice shall be so warehoused ; but that such Proprietor, if he intends to export such Rice, shall have Liberty to export the fame from fuch Warehoufes respectively, under the usual Regulations, without Payment of any Duty whatever: Provided that the Exportation of any fuch Rice, hereafter to be warehoused, be made within the faid Space of Eighteen Months; and if not within that Period, that the full Duries, payable by Law upon the Importation of fuch Rice, be paid for the fame, and not be afterwards drawn back : And that if any the Hundred Weight, being Part of the Duties now | Rice which shall have been imported into any Port af
