HIS Majesty having been pleased to appoint William Henry Cavendish, Duke of Portland, to be Lord Lieutenant of the County of Nottingham, His Grace this Day took the Oaths appointed to be taken thereupon, instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 10th Day of December, 1794, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom any of the Wood called Lignum Vitæ, is about to expire: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever do, at any Time, for the Space of Six Months from the Date hereof, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry or convey, or lace or lay on Board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of his Kingdom, any of the Wood called Lignum,

Vitæ, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury respecting the Exportation of Pot Ashes or Pearl Ashes; for preventing Suits in consequence of the same; for authorizing His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying Coastwise of Pot Ashes or Pearl Ashes, and for making further Provisions relative thereto." But it is nevertheless His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on Board any of the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ, which may be necessary for the Use of the said Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, nor to prevent the Exportation of the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark

Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which it shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ to the Places for which it is so entered Outwards, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ has been duly landed at the Places for which it was entered Outwards. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 3d of December last, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 7th Day of this instant June: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time, longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said 7th Day of this instant June, presume to transport, into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship

or lade any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt-Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt-Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."—And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

*Full Dress.*

Blue Coat, with Blue Lappels and round Cuffs; the Lappels to have One Row of Gold Lace, and the Cuffs and Pockets Two; laced Button-Holes:—Two Gold Epäulettes:—Gold-laced Hat, White Lining:—White Waistcoat and Breeches.

The Rank of the respective Flag Officers to be distinguished as follows, viz.

*Admirals.*

Three Silver Stars on each Epäulette, and Three Rows of Lace on the Sleeves.

*Vice-Admirals.*

Two—Ditto—Ditto.

*Rear-Admirals.*

One—Ditto—Ditto.

#### FLAG OFFICERS.

*Undress.*

Plain Blue Coats, lappelled, with the Buttons now in Use on the Sleeves and Pockets.—Ranks to be distinguished by the Epäulettes and Rows of Lace on the Sleeves, as in the Full Dress.

*CAPTAINS, Post of Three Years—Full Dress.*

Blue Coat with Blue Lappels, and long Slash Sleeve, as formerly worn:—The Lappels to have One Row of Gold Lace, and the Cuffs and Pockets Two:—Two plain Gold Epäulettes:—White Lining:—White Waistcoats and Breeches:—Gold-laced Hat.

*DITTO.—Undress.*

Plain Blue Coats, lapelled:—Buttons on the Sleeves and Pockets:—Epäulettes to take off and put on occasionally:—Plain Hat, and Blue Breeches, as may be convenient.

*CAPTAINS, under Three Years.—Full Dress.*

The same in every Respect as Post Captains of Three Years, but to wear only One Epäulette on the Right Shoulder.

*DITTO.—Undress.*

The same as Post Captains of Three Years, with the Difference only of wearing but One Epäulette, as in the Full Dress.

*COMMANDERS.—Full Dress.*

The same as Post Captains, with a plain Gold Epäulette on the Left Shoulder.

**Ditto.—Undress.**

The same as Post Captains, with a plain Gold Epaulette, as in the Full Dress, to take off and put on occasionally.

N. B. The Lace to be of the same Pattern as was in Use previously to the Year 1787; but that to be worn by Flag Officers to be of greater Breadth than that of the Captains.

Officers will be allowed to wear their present Uniform till the 1st of June 1796.

*As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.*

**Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.**

**I**F any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries, out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted shall offend again he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where, such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's

Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purpose aforesaid, such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of one Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And, if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Goal till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary, or the Circuits there.

**Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.**

**I**F any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland, into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary, or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with, or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Goal of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in Case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with, or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on Board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Offence, forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on Board; and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of



of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Cockets or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

*Statutes 14, 21, 25 and 26 of His present Majesty.*

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, jolly's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on Board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder: and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil or Implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Linen, Steel or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above mentioned, in the Case of Tools and Utensils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.

An Act for auditing and settling certain Accounts now remaining unsettled at His Majesty's Treasury.

An Act for continuing an Act, entitled, An Act for continuing the several Laws relating to Licences for the Sale of Spirituous Liquors, and the Regulations for remedying the Abuses which have arisen from the immoderate Use of such Liquors.

An Act for continuing and amending the several Laws relating to His Majesty's Revenue, and further preventing Frauds therein.

An Act for continuing an Act, passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, entitled, An Act for establishing Regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this Kingdom or resident therein, in certain Cases, and Subjects of this Kingdom, who have served or are serving in Foreign Armies; and for continuing and amending another Act, passed in the same Year, entitled, An Act to prevent the Importation of Arms, Gunpowder and Ammunition into this Kingdom, and the removing and keeping of Gunpowder, Arms and Ammunition, without Licence, and for amending the said last mentioned Act.

An Act to continue for One Year several Acts for the Encouragement of the Fisheries on the Coasts of this Kingdom.

An Act to explain an Act, entitled, An Act for establishing a complete School of Physic in this Kingdom.

An Act to explain and render more effectual an Act of Parliament, made and passed in the Thirty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, entitled, An Act respecting the Collection of Public Money to be levied off the County of the City of Dublin by Presentment.

An Act for the Preservation of the Public Roads in this Kingdom, and for the Encouragement of Broad-wheeled Carriages.

An Act for further improving the Post Roads in this Kingdom.

An Act for improving and repairing the Turnpike Road leading from Dublin to Mullingar; and for repealing the several Laws heretofore made relating to the said Road.

An Act for making, widening and repairing the Road leading from the City of Dublin to Ratoath, and for erecting Turnpikes thereon, in Aid of Barony Presentments.

An Act for erecting a Bridge over the River of Rofs, at the Town of Newrofs in the County of Wexford.

And to Two Private Bills.

His Excellency was then pleased to make the following Speech:

*My Lords, and Gentlemen,*

I am directed by His Majesty to convey to you his full Approbation of your Services in the present Session, and to relieve you from further Attendance in Parliament. It has afforded me infinite Satisfaction to observe, since my Arrival in this Kingdom, the great Temper and Wisdom with which your Proceedings have been uniformly conducted.

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons,*

I am particularly to express His Majesty's Acknowledgments for the very liberal Supplies which you have contributed, for the Service of the Empire and the Defence of the Kingdom, with such Unanimity and Cheerfulness. The Extent of your Grants

is a convincing Proof how warmly you feel yourselves interested in the vigorous Prosecution of a War, rendered necessary by the wanton and unprovoked Attack of France, and involving in it the general Cause of social Order, Morality and Religion in all civilized Countries. On my Part, you may be assured, they shall be faithfully applied to the great Purposes for which they were granted.

*My Lords, and Gentlemen,*

His Majesty observes, with the highest Satisfaction, that during the present Crisis you have not failed to cherish and to maintain the various Sources of your internal Prosperity. You have also completed the Intention so benevolently entertained, of entirely relieving the poorer Classes from the Tax of Hearth-Money; a wise Foundation has been laid for educating at Home the Roman Catholic Clergy; a satisfactory Arrangement of the Treasury has been confirmed by Law, and an Alteration of Duties has been introduced, with a View to prevent the immoderate Use of Spirituous Liquors, and in the Hope introducing a more general Habit of Sobriety amongst the lower Orders of the People. In the Execution of these Measures you may depend upon my sincere and earnest Endeavours to pursue that wise and prudent Policy by which they were dictated.

On repairing to your respective Counties, which I cannot too strongly and too earnestly recommend, it is especially incumbent upon you to make those Exertions which the Times demand, and to inculcate the Necessity of an exact Submission to the Laws. By contrabating the Blessings which result from a well-regulated Liberty and peaceable Subordination with the Mischiefs which necessarily spring from Licentiousness and Anarchy, you will increase the Attachment of the People to our free and happy Constitution. To preserve the Constitution inviolate is the great Object of His Majesty in the present Contest; and he cannot but look to its fortunate Issue, when he reflects on the Loyalty, Spirit and Power of his People, and on their just Sense of the invaluable Inheritance for which they contend.

It will be the constant Object of my Administration, in which His Majesty's Commands and my own personal Wishes are most intimately combined, to forward, with unremitting Vigilance, the Welfare and the Happiness of this Country. These Objects I cannot so effectually promote as by attending to and acting upon those established Principles which form the Connexion between Great Britain and Ireland, and on which the Security, the Freedom and the Prosperity of both Kingdoms most essentially depend.

After which the Lord Chancellor, by his Excellency's Command, said,

*My Lords, and Gentlemen,*

No Letter or Packet whatsoever, sent by the Post within Great Britain, directed by or to any Member of either House of Parliament of Great-Britain, shall, from and after the 5th Instant, be exempted from the Duty of Postage, if such Letter or Package shall exceed One Ounce in Weight.

No Letter or Packet directed by any such Member, shall be exempted from the Postage, unless the Member whose Name shall be indorsed thereon, shall actually be in the Post-Town into the Post-Office of which every such Letter or Packet shall be put, or within the Limits of the Delivery of Letters for such Post-Town, or within Twenty Miles of such Post-Town, on the Day, or on the Day before the Day on which such Letter or Packet shall be put into the Post-Office.

No such Member shall be entitled or allowed to send by the Post, free from Postage, supercribed or directed by him, more than Ten Letters in any One Day, nor to receive by the Post, free from Postage, more than Fifteen Letters directed to him in any One Day.

Provided, that whenever the Number of Letters or Packets, not weighing more than One Ounce each, sent or received by any such Member in any One Day, shall exceed the Number exempted by the said Act from Postage, and the Rate of Postage upon any of them shall differ, then such of the said Letters or Packets as would be chargeable with a higher Rate of Postage than the Remainder, shall be included in the Number so exempted, in Preference to any which would be chargeable with a lower Rate of Postage, and the Remainder shall be chargeable with the several Rates of Postage respectively to which such Letters would now by Law be chargeable, if sent or received by any Persons not entitled to send or receive Letters or Packets free from Postage.

The several Persons who by Law are authorised in Right of their Offices and Employments to send and receive Letters free from Postage, and their Successors in such Offices and Employments, may, during their Continuance in such Offices and Em-

ploymments, send and receive Letters and Packets, free from Postage, as they now send and receive the same.

No printed Votes or Proceedings in Parliament, or printed Newspapers sent without Covers, or in Covers open at the Sides, which shall be signed on the Outside thereof by the Hand of any Member of Parliament as heretofore practised, or which shall be directed to any such Member at any Place whereof he shall have given Notice in Writing to the Postmaster-General, or his Deputy, shall be charged with Postage.

No single Letter sent by the Post from any Non-commissioned Officer, Seaman, or Private employed in His Majesty's Navy, Army, Militia, Fencible Regiments, Artillery or Marines, shall, whilst such Non-commissioned Officer, Seaman or Private shall be employed on His Majesty's Service, and not otherwise, be charged with an higher Rate of Postage than the Sum of One Penny for the Conveyance of each such Letter, such Postage to be paid at the Time of putting the same into the Post-Office of the Town or Place from whence such Letter is intended to be sent by the Post.
