

of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Maces or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

*Statutes 14, 21, 25 and 26 of His present Majesty.*

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, jolly's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on Board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publickly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly offer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil or Implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Linen, Steel or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above mentioned, in the Case of Tools and Utensils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.

An Act for raising the Sum therein mentioned, to defray such extraordinary Expences as may be necessarily incurred for the Service of the present Year.

An Act for the better Regulation of the Receipts and Issues of His Majesty's Treasury, and for repealing an Act of Parliament, passed in the Tenth Year of Henry the Seventh, entitled, An Act authorizing the Treasurer to make all Officers as the Treasurer of England doth.

An Act for auditing and settling certain Accounts now remaining unsettled at His Majesty's Treasury.

An Act for continuing an Act, entitled, An Act for continuing the several Laws relating to Licences for the Sale of Spirituous Liquors, and the Regulations for remedying the Abuses which have arisen from the immoderate Use of such Liquors.

An Act for continuing and amending the several Laws relating to His Majesty's Revenue, and further preventing Frauds therein.

An Act for continuing an Act, passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, entitled, An Act for establishing Regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this Kingdom or resident therein, in certain Cases, and Subjects of this Kingdom, who have served or are serving in Foreign Armies; and for continuing and amending another Act, passed in the same Year, entitled, An Act to prevent the Importation of Arms, Gunpowder and Ammunition into this Kingdom, and the removing and keeping of Gunpowder, Arms and Ammunition, without Licence, and for amending the said last mentioned Act.

An Act to prevent the Exportation of Starch under certain Conditions.

An Act for the better promulgating the Statute Law of this Kingdom.

An Act for establishing the new Courts of Justice and new Session House, and constituting the same and the Areas thereof respectively to be within the County of the City of Dublin and County of Dublin.

An Act for the better Education of Persons professing the Popish or Roman Catholic Religion.

An Act for confirming Grants heretofore made by Patents under the Great Seal of England.

An Act, that the Acceptance of the Office of a Lord Justice or Chief Governor of this Kingdom by the Speaker of the House of Commons shall not vacate his Seat in Parliament.

An Act for regulating the Election of Members to serve in Parliament; and for repealing the several Acts therein mentioned.

An Act for the Relief of Persons who have omitted to qualify themselves according to Law.

An Act for repealing the several Regulations which affect the Trade of a Brewer in this Kingdom.

An Act for regulating the Baking Trade.

An Act for more effectually preserving the Peace within the City of Dublin and the District of the Metropolis, and establishing a Parochial Watch in the said City.

An Act to explain and amend an Act, passed in the Tenth and Eleventh Years of the Reign of King Charles the First, entitled, An Act for Preservation of the Inheritance, Rights and Profits of Lands belonging to the Church and Persons Ecclesiastical.

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
