R E S E N Т, The KING's Most Excellent Majerty in Council. 7 HEREAS His Majefty was gracioufly pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-fixth Day of Décember, 1792, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majefty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every fuch Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themfelves to ferve in His Majefty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Mojefty's Ships or Veffels, gr Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majefty was ailo gracioufly pleafed, by His faid Proclamation, to declare, that all Abie-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor ander the Age of Twenty Years, who should fo enter themfelves as aforefaid, fhould receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was alfo gracioufly pleafed, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the

faid Month of February, 1793, to promife and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to ferve on board His Majefty's Ships, fhould be paid to any Perfon who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themfelves, fo that fuch Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majefty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raife Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coafts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the faid Proclamations for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirtieth Day of this inftant June; and it being judged expedient for His Majefty's Service that the faid Bounties and Reward thould be continued to be paid for fome Time longer; His Majefty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended, from the faid Thirtieth Day of this inflant June, to the Thirty-first Day of August next inclusive : Whereof all Perons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themfeives accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 10th Day of December, 1794, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom any of the Wood called Lignum Vitæ, is about to expire : And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majefty's Service that the faid Prohibition should be continued for some 'Time longer; His Majefty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Perfon or Perfons whofoever do, at any Time, for the Space of Six Months from the Date hereof, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry or convey, or lade or lay on Board of any Ship, Veffel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of his Kingdom, any of the Wood called Lignum Witze, without Leave or Permiffion being first had and obtained from His Majefty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act paffed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majefly's Reign, intituled, " An Act for indemnifying ** all Perfons who lrave been concerned in advifing "" or carrying into Execution an Order of the Lords . Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury respect-... ing the Exportation of Pot Afhes or Pearl Afhes; for preventing Suits in confequence of the fame; ... for authorizing His Majefty to prohibit the Ex-"reportation or carrying Coaftwile of Pot Alhes or ... Pearl Alhes, and for making further Provisions " relative thereto." But it is neverthelefs. His Majefty's Pleafure, that nothing herein contained shall vextend, or be confirued to extend, to prevent any Ship or Veffel from taking or having on Board any of the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ, which may be neceffary for the Ule of the faid Ship or Veffel during the Courfe of her intended Voyage, nor to prevent the Exportation of the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ to Ireland, or to His Majetty's Islands of Guernley, Jerley, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the Weft Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majefty's Forts and Settlements on the Coaft of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies ; provided that, upon the Exportation of the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ to Ireland, or to His Majefty's Iflands of Guernfey, Jerfey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majefly's Colonies and Planstations in America or the West Indies, or to the illand of Newfoundland, or to His Majetty's Forts

and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ do first make Oath of the true Defination of the fame to the Places for which it shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the fame shall be made, and do give full and fufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ to the Places for which it is fo entered Outwards, and none other; and fuch Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the faid Commiffioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commissioners, and fpecified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in fuch Form and Manner as shall be directed by the faid Commissioners, shewing that the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ has been duly landed at the Places for which it was entered Outwards. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

7 HEREAS the Time limited by His Majefty's Order in Council of the 3d of December laft, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coaltwife, Gunpowder or Salt-Pere, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 7th Day of this inflant June: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majefty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the faid Prohibition fhould be continued for some Time, longer; His Majefty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Perfons whatfoever (except the Mafter-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the faid 7th Day of this inftant June, prefume to transport, into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwife, any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Veffel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the fame Coastwife, without

without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majefty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incorring and fuffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act palled inthe Twenty ninth Year of His late Majefly's Reign, intituled, " An Act to impower His Majely to pro-" hibit the Exportation of Salt-Petre, and to enforce "" the Law for impowering His Majefty to prohibit *** the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of "" Arms or Ammunition ; and also to empower His Majefty to reftrain the carrying Coaliwie of Salt-. Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Am-" munition :"-And the Lords Commissioners of .His Majefty's Treafury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majefty's Secretary at War, are to give the neceffary

Blue Coat, with Blue Lappels and round Cuffs, White Lining; the Lappels to have One Row of Gold Lace, and the Pockets Two; laced Button-Holes :-- Two Gold 'Epaulettes :-- Gold-laced Hat, White Waiffcoat and Breeches.

The Rank of the respective Flag Officers to be diftinguished as follows, viz.

Admirals. Three Silver Stars on each Epaulette, and Three Rows of Lace on the Cuffs. Vice-Admirals. Two-Ditto-Ditto-Ditto. Rear-Admirals. One-Ditto-Ditto-Ditto.

The fame in every Respect as Post Captains of Three Years, but to wear only One Epaulette on the Right Shoulder.

DITTO.-Undrefs.

The fame as Post Captains of Three Years, with the Difference only of wearing but One Equalette, as in the Full Drefs.

COMMANDERS.-Full Drefs.

The fame as Post Captains, with a plain Gold Epaulette on the Left Shoulder.

DITTO.-Undrefs.

The fame as Post Captains, with a p'ain Gold Epaulette, as in the Full Drefs, to take off and put on occasionally.
