The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December, 1792, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the

said Month of February, 1793, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirtieth Day of this instant June; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended, from the said Thirtieth Day of this instant June, to the Thirty-first Day of August next inclusive: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 10th Day of December, 1794, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom any of the Wood called Lignum Vitæ, is about to expire: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever do, at any Time, for the Space of Six Months from the Date hereof, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry or convey, or lade or lay on Board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of his Kingdom, any of the Wood called Lignum Vitæ, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury respecting the Exportation of Pot Ashes or Pearl Ashes; for preventing Suits in consequence of the same; for authorizing His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying Coastwise of Pot Ashes or Pearl Ashes, and for making further Provisions relative thereto." But it is nevertheless His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on Board any of the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ, which may be necessary for the Use of the said Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, nor to prevent the Exportation of the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts

and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which it shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ to the Places for which it is so entered Outwards, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ has been duly landed at the Places for which it was entered Outwards. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 3d of December last, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 7th Day of this instant June: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said 7th Day of this instant June, presume to transport, into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise,

without

without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt-Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt-Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition:"—And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

THIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Mr. Quarne, the Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act for guaranteeing the Payment of the Dividends on a Loan of Four Millions Six Hundred Thousand Pounds to the Emperor of Germany.

An Act for establishing a more easy and expeditious Method for the punctual and frequent Payment of the Wages and Pay of certain Officers belonging to His Majesty's Navy.

An Act to enable Boatswains, Gunners and Carpenters, serving in His Majesty's Navy, to allot Part of their Wages or Pay for the Maintenance of their Wives and Families.

An Act for the Relief of Persons detained in Gaol for Want of Bail, in certain Cases relating to the Public Revenue.

An Act for allowing further Time for the Payment of the Drawback on China Ware, imported by the East India Company before the First Day of April, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-five.

An Act to declare that Hides and Skins, tanned by a new Method, shall be deemed tanned Hides and Skins within the Meaning of the Acts relating to

the Duties of Excise on Hides and Skins tanned in Great Britain.

An Act for permitting the Importation of Organized Thrown Silk, Flax and Flax Seed into this Kingdom in Ships or Vessels belonging to any State in Amity with His Majesty, for a limited Time.

An Act for making perpetual an Act, made in the Thirtieth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, to discontinue the Payment of the Duties in Scotland upon Low Wines and Spirits, and upon Worts, Wash and other Liquors there used in the Distillation of Spirits; and for regulating the Exportation of British-made Spirits from England to Scotland, and from Scotland to England; to continue so much of an Act, made in the Thirty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, as permits Sir William Bishop, George Bishop and Argles Bishop to carry on the Manufacture of Maidstone Geneva; and to make perpetual the Duties granted by an Act, made in the Twenty-seventh Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, upon Worts, Wash and other Liquors for extracting Spirits for Home Consumption.

An Act for further encouraging and regulating the Southern Whale Fisheries.

An Act to remedy certain Omissions in an Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act for the Discharge of certain Insolvent Debtors.

An Act to enable His Majesty to grant the Inheritance of certain Lands or Grounds, situate at or near Painshill, in the several Parishes of Cobham, Walton and Wisley, in the County of Surrey, to George Chamberlaine, Esquire, George Bond, Esquire, one of His Majesty's Serjeants at Law, and Sir Samuel Hayes, Baronet, of the Kingdom of Ireland, upon the Traits declared by the Will of Benjamin Bond Hopkins, Esquire, deceased, of and concerning his Estate at Painshill aforesaid.

An Act for allowing further Time for Inrollment of Deeds and Wills made by Papists, and for Relief of Protestant Purchasers.

An Act for regulating the shipping and carrying Slaves in British Vessels from the Coast of Africa.

An Act to amend an Act, made in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for the better Regulation of Hawkers, Pedlars and Petty Chapmen; and for repealing so much of the said Act as restrains them from selling Goods, Wares, or Merchandize within a certain Distance from any City or Market Town.

An Act for the more effectual Prevention of the Use of defective Weights, and of false and unequal Balances.

An Act for enabling the Mayor and Commonalty and Citizens of the City of London, Governors of the Possessions, Revenues and Goods of the Hospitals of Edward, King of England the Sixth, of Christ, Bridewell, and St. Thomas the Apostle, and other the Governors of Christ's Hospital, to purchase Houses and Ground for enlarging Christ's Hospitals in London and at Hertford, and erecting additional Buildings thereto; and for other Purposes.

An Act for improving and supporting the Navigation of the River Ivel, otherwise Yeo, from the Town of Ivelchester to Bicknell Bridge, in the Parish of Huish Episcopi, in the County of Somerset, and for making a navigable Cut from thence into a certain Drain called Portlake Rhine, in the Parish of Langport, in the same County, and for making the said

said Drain navigable from thence to the River Parrett, below Great Bow Bridge, in the Town of Langport.

An Act for amending and rendering more effectual an Act passed in the Twenty-eighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act to explain, amend, and enlarge the Powers of so much of Two Acts, passed in the Eleventh and Fifteenth Years of the Reign of His present Majesty, for improving and completing the Navigation of the Rivers Thames and Isis, from the City of London to the Town of Cricklade in the County of Wilts, as relates to the Navigation of the said Rivers, from the Boundary of the Jurisdiction of the City of London, near Staines in the County of Middlesex, to the said Town of Cricklade; and for extending and enlarging the Powers of the said several Acts passed in the Eleventh and Fifteenth Years of the Reign of His said present Majesty, so far as the same relate to the improving and completing of the Navigation of the said Rivers, from the Jurisdiction of the City of London, near Staines in the County of Middlesex, to the Town of Cricklade in the County of Wilts.

An Act for amending an Act passed in the Thirteenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for building a Bridge across the River Severn, near Redstone in the County of Worcester; and for making proper Avenues and Roads to and from the same, and for making Satisfaction to the Proprietors of a Ferry across the said River at Redstone aforesaid; and for enabling the Trustees for executing the said Act to rebuild the said Bridge.

An Act for dividing, allotting, inclosing, draining and improving the Commons and Waste Grounds within the several Parishes of Epworth, Haxey, Bolton and Owston, in the Isle of Axholme in the County of Lincoln; and also for making a Compensation for the Tythes arising from the said Commons, and from certain other Lands within the said Parishes.

An Act for continuing the Term and enlarging the Powers of an Act, passed in the Thirteenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for repairing the Road from the Royal Oak, on Wrotham Heath, to the Town of Wrotham in the County of Kent, and from thence to Foot's Cray, and from the said Royal Oak to the Town of Maidstone in the said County; and for making a Road from the said Road, between Wrotham and Maidstone, into the present Turnpike Road leading from Mereworth to Hadlow, in the said County.

An Act to enable the Commissioners and Trustees for executing an Act, passed in the Thirty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for draining, preserving and improving certain Lands lying in the several Parishes of Spalding, (including the Hamlets of Cowbit and Peakill) Welton, Moulton, Whaplode, Holbeach, Fleet, Gedney, Sutton Saint Mary, and Sutton Saint Nicholas, otherwise Lutton, all in South Holland, in the County of Lincoln, to support and repair a certain Bank, extending from Spalding High Bridge to Brother House, in the said County, and to amend and repair the Road thereupon; and for compounding with the Creditors under an Act, passed in the Twelfth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, for making and keeping in Repair the said Road.

An Act to prevent the Removal of Poor Persons until they shall become actually chargeable.

And to Fifteen Private Bills,

*Admiralty-Office, June 1, 1795.*

THE King having signified to my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty His Royal Pleasure, that the Uniform Cloathing at present worn by the Flag Officers, Captains and Commanders of His Royal Navy, shall be altered in the Manner under-mentioned.

Their Lordships do hereby give Notice thereof to all Flag Officers, Captains and Commanders, and require and direct them strictly to conform thereto.

#### FLAG OFFICERS.

##### *Full Dress.*

Blue Coat, with Blue Lappels and round Cuffs, White Lining; the Lappels to have One Row of Gold Lace, and the Pockets Two; laced Button-Holes:—Two Gold Epaulettes:—Gold-laced Hat, —White Waistcoat and Breeches.

The Rank of the respective Flag Officers to be distinguished as follows, viz.

*Admirals.* Three Silver Stars on each Epaulette, and Three Rows of Lace on the Cuffs.

*Vice-Admirals.* Two—Ditto—Ditto—Ditto.

*Rear-Admirals.* One—Ditto—Ditto—Ditto.

#### FLAG OFFICERS.

##### *Undress.*

Plain Blue Coats, lappelled, with the Buttons now in Use on the Cuffs and Pockets.—Ranks to be distinguished by the Epaulettes and Rows of Lace on the Cuffs, as in the Full Dress.

#### CAPTAINS, *Post of Three Years—Full Dress.*

Blue Coat with Blue Lappels, and long Slash Sleeve, as formerly worn:—The Lappels to have One Row of Gold Lace, and the Cuffs and Pockets Two:—Two plain Gold Epaulettes:—White Lining:—White Waistcoats and Breeches:—Gold-laced Hat.

##### *DITTO.—Undress.*

Plain Blue Coats, lappelled:—Buttons on the Sleeves and Pockets:—Epaulettes to take off and put on occasionally:—Plain Hat, and Blue Breeches, as may be convenient.

#### CAPTAINS, *under Three Years.—Full Dress.*

The same in every Respect as Post Captains of Three Years, but to wear only One Epaulette on the Right Shoulder.

##### *DITTO.—Undress.*

The same as Post Captains of Three Years, with the Difference only of wearing but One Epaulette, as in the Full Dress.

#### COMMANDERS.—*Full Dress.*

The same as Post Captains, with a plain Gold Epaulette on the Left Shoulder.

##### *DITTO.—Undress.*

The same as Post Captains, with a plain Gold Epaulette, as in the Full Dress, to take off and put on occasionally.

N. B. The Lace to be of the same Pattern as was in Use previously to the Year 1787; but that to be worn by Flag Officers to be of greater Breadth than that of the Captains.

Officers will be allowed to wear their present Uniform till the 1st of June 1795.

*As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any way concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Sending Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.*

*Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.*

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted shall offend again he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforesaid, such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of one Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And, if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Goal till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall

be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Judiciary, or the Circuit there.

*Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.*

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland, into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Judiciary, or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with, or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in Case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on Board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Offence, forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on Board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Effoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Ports or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

*Statutes 14, 21, 25 and 26 of His present Majesty.*

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, jetty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on Board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

On the 6th Instant, between Three and Four o'Clock in the Afternoon, a dreadful Fire broke out in the Dock-Yard of this City, which soon communicated across the Canal to the Houses in the Town, and shortly after to one of the principal Churches. The Fire, driven with Violence from these different Places, continued to rage with great Fury for Forty-eight Hours, but was at length stopped, in consequence of the Houses immediately in the Line of it's Direction having been pulled down. It is computed that One-fourth Part of the City has been consumed by this Calamity, rendered the more dreadful from the Circumstance of the Quarter which has been burned having been the most populous. Every possible Attention has been shewn, on the Part of the Government, for the Relief of the Sufferers; and the Number of Lives lost is supposed not to be considerable. The Royal Family was in the Country; the Prince Royal, however, immediately came to Town, and passed the whole Night in the Streets, giving Orders, and encouraging the Firemen and others who were employed, and even affording his personal Assistance, at the imminent Hazard of his Life.

**B**y an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for further regulating the sending and receiving Letters free from the Duty of Postage; for allowing Non-commissioned Officers, Seamen, and Private Men, in the Navy and Army, whilst on Service, to send and receive Letters at a low Rate of Postage; and for permitting Patterns and Samples of Goods to be transmitted by the Post at an easier Rate than is now allowed by Law,"

No Letter or Packet whatsoever, sent by the Post within Great Britain, directed by or to any Member of either House of Parliament of Great-Britain, shall, from and after the 5th Instant, be exempted from the Duty of Postage, if such Letter or Package shall exceed One Ounce in Weight.

No Letter or Packet directed by any such Member, shall be exempted from the Postage, unless the Member whose Name shall be indorsed thereon, shall actually be in the Post-Town into the Post-Office of which every such Letter or Packet shall be put, or within the Limits of the Delivery of Letters for such Post-Town, or within Twenty Miles of such Post-Town, on the Day, or on the Day before the Day on which such Letter or Packet shall be put into the Post-Office.

No such Member shall be entitled or allowed to send by the Post, free from Postage, superscribed or directed by him, more than Ten Letters in any One Day, nor to receive by the Post, free from Postage, more than Fifteen Letters directed to him in any One Day.

Provided, that whenever the Number of Letters or Packets, not weighing more than One Ounce each, sent or received by any such Member in any One Day, shall exceed the Number exempted by the said Act from Postage, and the Rate of Postage upon any of them shall differ, then such of the said Letters or Packets as would be chargeable with a higher Rate of Postage than the Remainder, shall be included in the Number so exempted, in Preference to any which would be chargeable with a lower Rate of Postage, and the Remainder shall be chargeable with the several Rates of Postage respectively to which such Letters would now by Law be chargeable, if sent or received by any Persons not entitled to send or receive Letters or Packets free from Postage.

The several Persons who by Law are authorized in Right of their Offices and Employments to send and receive Letters free from Postage, and their Successors in such Offices and Employments, may, during their Continuance in such Offices and Em-

ployments, send and receive Letters and Packets, free from Postage, as they now send and receive the same.

No printed Votes or Proceedings in Parliament, or printed Newspapers sent without Covers, or in Covers open at the Sides, which shall be signed on the Outside thereof by the Hand of any Member of Parliament as heretofore practised, or which shall be directed to any such Member at any Place whereof he shall have given Notice in Writing to the Postmaster-General, or his Deputy, shall be charged with Postage.

No single Letter sent by the Post from any Non-commissioned Officer, Seaman, or Private employed in His Majesty's Navy, Army, Militia, Fencible Regiments, Artillery or Marines, shall, whilst such Non-commissioned Officer, Seaman or Private shall be employed on His Majesty's Service, and not otherwise, be charged with an higher Rate of Postage than the Sum of One Penny for the Conveyance of each such Letter, such Postage to be paid at the Time of putting the same into the Post-Office of the Town or Place from whence such Letter is intended to be sent by the Post.

Provided, that no such Letter shall be exempted from Postage unless there shall be written thereon in the Hand-Writing of and signed by the Commanding Officer for the Time being of the Ship or Vessel, or of the Corps, Regiment, or Detachment to which such Non-commissioned Officer, Seaman, or Private shall belong, the Name of such Commanding Officer, and of the Ship, Vessel, Corps, Regiment or Detachment commanded by him.
