Here having been lately prefented by the Fustices of the Peace, Six Queries to His Majelty in Council, viz.

I. Hether Foreigners (Popifh Recu-fants) that are, and have long been here fetled Houfe-keepers, and are Tradefmen, viz. Chyrurgeons, Taylors, Perriwig makers, or ordinary Shop-keepers, following Imployments for their o vn advantage, but not otherwife Merchants, but are c tified to be Merchant-Strangers, shall be excused) taking the Oaths, or finding Surctics or either for them?

11. Whether such Foreigners being Certified by Amballadors, or other Foreign Ministers, to be th ir Servants at this time, fhall be exculed ?

LII. Whether Foreigners (Popilh Recularts) Lticd here House keepers, but neither are Tradelmen, Travellers, or Foreign Ministers Servants, shall be excufed >

IV. Whether Native Subjects of Our Sovereign Lord, that are Menial Servants of Foreign Minifters, fhall be excufed ?

V. Whither Marriel Women, being Popifh Reculants, but their Husbands Protestants, shall be ex-Lufed >

¥I. Whither Popifh Recufants that have taken the Oaths, found surceies, have appeared, and 'are Convict, fhall find new Suretics, or be continued over?

And Els Majesty baving from the Fudges to whom the Same were Referred, received Answer in Writing in the words fallowing,

May it pleafe Your Majelty,

We have met, and Confidered of the Questions propoled to Us, and do hereby humbly return Our Opinions.

To the First We are of Opinion,

"Hat Foreigners Lbeing Popilh Reculants)

Merchähts) are not excuted from taking the Oaths, or finding, Scuritics. I.I. To the Second, that For igners, though Çer-tified by Ambailadors to be their Servants, except

they are their Menial Servants, are not exculed. TII, To the third, That Foreigners, though fee-lad Houle-keepers, being no Travellers, or Foreign Minifters Servantspare not exculed.

IV. To the fourth, That the Kings Native Subjects are not exculed from taking the Oaths, by being Menial Servants to Poleign Matters O

V. To the Fifth, We find no Law that excutes a Feme Covert, being a Papili, from taking the Oaths, though her Husband be a Proteflant.

VI. To the Sixth, That a Popifh Reculant having taken the Oaths, is not bound to find new Sureties, unless upon a new tender of the Oaths, he shall refule to take them.
