

Genova, Jan. 15. No Ships are arrived here this week, save the *Edward Pink* from *Leverpoole*, with Lead, Corn, &c. The *Genova Merchant* is put into *Vila Franca*.

Brussels, Jan. 31. We cannot yet certainly say when *Ghent* will be delivered up to us, though we hope it may be in two or three days, for the security which is to be given for the payment of the Arrears of Contribution is agreed, and the City of *Ghent* is raising 300 thousand Crowns, which the Governor *Monfieur de Montbrun* demands for the charge of sending away his Cannon and Ammunition by Wagons and Carriages, which he will hire. Yesterday *Monfieur Minders*, Envoy from the Elector of *Brandenburgh*, passed here in his way to *Paris*, whither he is sent, as we are told, to assist the Ambassadors of the *States General* of the *United Provinces*, for the obtaining a Neutrality for the Country of *Cleves*, though the Ministers of *Denmark* and *Lunenburgh* seem to suspect that that is not all his Commission. Our Letters from *Cologne* tell us, that the *French* are making great preparations in order to their passing the *Rhine*; that their Troops were marching in considerable Bodies as well above as below *Cologne*; that one part of them, with Cannon and all materials for a Siege, had bended their course towards *Rhinberg*, as if they intended to attack it, but had in the night changed their march, and taken it directly towards *Bonne*. That this march of the *French* on this side the *Rhine*, makes the Confederate Troops move on the other, a Body of which was marched to a place over against *Ordinghen*, for the defence of the *Lower Rhine*, while *Monfieur de Louvigny* is posted near *Bonne*.

Ditto, Febr. 3. The Letters we receive from *Ghent*, give no appearance of the *French* quitting that City yet in some days, the Governor having demanded a new Tax of 24000 Crowns to be paid within ten days, and this to be in recompence for the good order which the *French* Troops have kept since their being there: and after all we are told, that the Caution which is offered by his Excellency for payment of the Arrears of Contributions, is refused by the *French*, who will have the Caution given not only for what is at present demanded, but likewise for all that shall hereafter appear to be due. Our last Letters from *Nimeguen* are dated the 31 past at 10 at night; they tell us, that the Mediators, and the *Imperial* and *French* Ambassadors, had been all that day in their Conferences at the *Stadthouwe*, without allowing themselves time to go home to dine, but had their dinners brought to them there. That when these Letters came away they were so near agreed, that it was not doubted but they would come to a close, and sign the Peace yet that night.

Hague, Febr. 7. We have this day advice from *Nimeguen* by Express, That the Peace between the Emperor and *France* was actually Signed the 5th instant, as that between the Emperor and *Sueden* was intended to be yesterday.

Paris, Febr. 4. The *Dutch* Ambassadors have not yet had their Publick Audience, they insisting to have several Honors and Respects shewn them on that occasion, according to the practice of former Times, which the King will not grant them. The said Ambassadors complain, that at *Rochelle*, and other Ports of this Kingdom, greater Impositions are laid upon their Merchants, than consist with the promise the King had made the States, to treat their Subjects in

their Trade as favourably as his own. The Letters we receive from the *Rhine* of the 27 past tell us, that *Monfieur Calvo* having drawn his Troops together, was marched with them to attack *Bonne*.

Ditto, Febr. 8. The King having made an Order in his Council, that no Protestant should hold any Publick Office or Employment in this Kingdom for the future, and that such as were at present in any, should be put out, the same is accordingly executing, and the Consuls and other publick Officers in several places who are Protestants, have been dismissed their respective Charges. It is said the King has named the *Marquis de Villars* to be his Ambassador in *Spain*. From *Alsace* they write, that the *Imperialists* had beaten up our quarters at *Colmar*, where lay two Battalions of the Regiment of *Champagne*, of whom most were killed or taken Prisoners. Some of our Troops have passed the *Rhine* at *Andernach*, and have ravaged the Countrey on that side. At *Thoulon* are fitting out 10 Men of War, and at *Marseilles* 28 Gallies, which will be ready to put to sea about the middle of *March*, under the Command of the Duke de *Vivonne*, and are, as is said, to be employed against the *Tripolins*, who have of late been very troublesome. And at *Brest*, *Rochefort*, *Havre de Grace*, and *Dunkirk*, are, as we are told, fitting out 25 or 30 Frigates more, of which some are said to be designed for the *West-Indies*, but it's thought they will want Seamen.
