PRESENT,

The KING's Moft Excellent Majefty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Fourteenth of January last, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Femp, Pitch, Tar, Rofin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, will expire upon the Twenty-fifth Day of this inftant July: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majefly's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the faid Prohibition fhould be continued for fome Time longer; His Majetty doth therefore, with the Advice of Hi Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Perfon or Perfons whofoever do at any Time, for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the faid Twenty-fifth Day of this instant July, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rofin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, or ship or lade any of the Articles above mentioned on board any Ship or Veffel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first

had and obtained from His Majefty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures infifted by an Aft, paffed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majetty's Reign, intituled, "An A& to ena-* ble His Majefty to reftrain the Exportation of Na-" val Stores, and more effectually to prevent the Ex-" portation of Salt-Petre, Arms and Ammunition, " when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in " Council." But it is, neverthelefs, His Majefty's Pleafure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be confirued to extend, to any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships or Vessels or Boats, in the Service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majetty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on Board fuch Quantities of Naval Stores as may be necessary for the Use of fuch Ship or Veffel during the Courfe of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being ; nor to the Exportation of the faid feveral Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrifons, or to His Majefty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, cr to Newfoundland, or to His Majefty's Forts and Settlements on the Coail of Africa; or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of any of the faid

Taid Articles, for the Purpoles of Trade, to Ire- | land, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrilons, or to His Majefty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majefty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of fuch Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the 'fame to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the fame shall be made, and do give full and fufficient Security by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majefty's Cufloms, to carry the faid Articles to the Places for which they are fo entered Outwards, and for the Purposes specified, and none other; and fuch Bond fhall not be cancelled or delivered up, until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the faid Commissioners, by the Production. within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commiffioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in fuch Form and Manner as shall be directed by the faid Commissioners, shewing that the faid Articles have been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majefly's Treafury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS it is of the greatest Importance, at the prefent Moment, that the Rice which may have been hitherto imported, or which may hereafter be brought into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, should be secured and retained therein for the Confumption of the People of this Kingdom: And whereas there is Reafon to believe that large Quantities of Rice are now on Board various Ships for Exportation : His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby ordered, that no Perfon or Perfons whatever shall, until further Order, directly or indirectly, export, tranfport, carry or convey, or caufe or procure to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed, any Rice out of or from any Port or Place in Great Britain, or load or lay on Board, or caufe or procure to be loaded or laid on Board of any Ship, Veffei or Boat any Rice, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of any Port or Place in Great Britain. His Majefty hath, nevertheless, thought fit to order, and doth hereby order, that nothing herein contained shall extend to prohibit any Ships or Veffels, having Rice on Board, which may have been entered Outwards for Foreign Parts at any Port in Great Britain, and which, although within Port, may have been regularly cleared in the Cuffom-House, previous to the faid Publication of this Order. from proceeding on their refpective Voyages, provided the Quantity of Rice on Board each respective Ship or Veffel shall not exceed the Quantity of Two Barrels; nor to prohibit any Perfon or Perfons to fhip or put on Board any Rice to be carried Coaftwife, that is to fay, from any Port, Creek, Member or Part of the Kingdom of Great Britain to any other Port, Creek or Member of the fame, having fuch or the like Coast Cocket or Sufferance for that Purpofe, on fuch or the like fufficient Security being first given for the landing and discharging of the fame in fome other Port, Member, Creek or Part of the faid Kingdom, and returning a Certificate in Six Months, as is required by Law in Cafes where Goods, which are prohibited to be exported from Great Britain to Foreign Parts, are carried Coaftwife from one Port of Great Britain to another : nor to prohibit fuch or fo much Rice from being exported or carried out in any Ships or Veffels in their Voyages Out and Home, as shall be necessary for the Suftenance of the Perfons on Board of fuch Ships or Veffels only, not exceeding the Quantity of Two Barrels for each Ship or Veffel; nor for victualling or providing any of His Majefty's Ships of War or other Ships in His Majesty's Service, or for the Ufe of His Majesty's Forces, Forts or Garrisons .---And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majefty's Treafury are to give the neceffary Directions herein accordingly.

CEREMONIAL of the Knighthood and Investiture of Major-General Sir Ralph Abercromby, Knight of the Most Honorable Military Order of the Bath.

THE Knights and Officers of the Order attending in the Privy Chamber in their Mantles, Collars, &c. proceeded from thence, after the Levee, into the Sovereign's Prefence, making the usual Reverences, in the following Order.

Gentleman Ufher of the Order, in his Mantle, Chainand Badge, bearing the Scarlet Rod.

Deputy Bath, King of Arms, in the Mantle, Chain and Badge of Bath, bearing the Ribbon and

Badge of the Order, on a Crimfon

Velvet Cushion.

The Genealogist, in his Mantle, Chain and Badge. KNIGHTS COMPANIONS.

Right Honorable Sir George Yonge, Bart.

Sir William Fawcett.

Sir George Howard.

Sir Ralph Payne. Lord Amherit.

His Royal Highnefs the Duke of York and Albany, First and Principal Companion.

Then, by the Sovereign's Command, Major-General Ralph Abercromby was introduced into the Prefence, between the Right Honourable Sir George Yonge, Bart. and Sir William Fawcctt, the Two Junior Knights Companions prefent, preceded by the Gentlemen Usher of the Order, with Reverences as before.

The Sword of State was delivered to the Sovereign by Lord Amherft, the Second Knight in Seniority, and General Altercromby kneeling was knighted therewith. Then His Royal Highnefs the Duke of York, Senior Knight, prefented the Ribbon and Badge to the Sovereeign, and His Majefty put them over the new Knight's Right Shoulder, who, being thus inverted, had the Honor to kifs His Majefty's Hand; and the Proceflion returned to the Privy Chamber in the Order as above mentioned.

The Ceremony was performed in His Majefty's Clofet, feveral Great Officers of the Court being prefent.

Whitehall, July 25.

As feveral Artificers and Manufasturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of thefe Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majeflies King George the First and Second and of His prefent Mujefty, for preventing fuch Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Difobedience to them : And it will be observed, that fuch Penalties likewife extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufactuvers out of thefe Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Infiruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufasturers themselves.

Statute 5 George 1. Chap. 27.

IF any Perfon shall contract with, entice, or folicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brafs, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Atificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Affizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Perfon fon having been once convicted shall offend again he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being fuch Artificers, fhall go into any Country out of His Majefty's Dominions, to exercife or teach the faid Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any fuch Foreign Country, exercifing any of the faid Trades, fhall not return into this Realm within Six Mouths after Warning given by the Ambaflador, Minitler or Conful of Great Britain, in the Country where fuch Artificers fhall be, or by any Perfon authorifed by fuch Ambaflador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm ; fuch Perfons fhall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Defcent, Devife or Purchafe, and fhall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majefty's Ufe, and fhall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majefty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Juitice of Peace, that any Person is endeavour ing to feduce any fuch Artificer, or that any fuch Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majefty's Dominions, for the Purpofes aforefaid, fuch justice may fend his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before fome other Juffice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of one Witnefs, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the faid Offences, fuch Jultice may bind him to appear at the next Affizes or Quarter Seffions : And, if fuch Perfon shall refuse to give Secority, the Justice may commit him to Goal till the next Affizes or Quarter Seffions, and until he shall be delivered by due Courfe of Law. And if any fuch Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any fuch Promife, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpole aforefaid, he shall give fuch Security to the King not to depart out of His Majetty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be profecuted in the Court of Justiciary, or the Circuts there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Perfon shall contract with, or endeavout to feduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland, into any Foreign Coun-try not within the Dominions of the Crown of Grat Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indiftment or Information, in the King's Bench at Weltminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &cc. wherein such Offence thail be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Jufficiary, or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if fuch Offence be committed in Ireland ; the Perfon fo convicted shall, for every Ar-tificer contracted with, or feduced, forfeit FIVE

fonment in the Common Goal of the County of Stewartry wherein fuch Offender shall be convicted, for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in Cafe of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contrasted with cr seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Perfon in Great Britain or Ireland fhal put on Board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to fome Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to fome other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any fuch Tools or Utenfils as are commonly ufed in. or proper for the Preparing, Working up or Finifhing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures or any Part of fuch Tools, he fhail, for every Offence, forfeit all fuch Tools, or Parts thereof, put on Board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Weftmintler, or in the Court of Seffion in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin refpectively, wherein no Effoin, &c. fhall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to feize and fecure, in fome of His Majetty's Warehoufes, all fuch Tools or Utentils prohibited to be exported, as fuch Officer shall find on Board any Vessel not bound directly to fome Yors in Great Britain or Ireland, or to fome other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools fo feized shall, after Condemnation, be publickly fold to the bett Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majetty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall feize and fecure the fame.

If the Captain of any Veffel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the faid Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Veffel, he fhall, for every fuch Offence, forfeitONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Perfons exporting the Tools; and, if the Veffel belongs to His Majeffy, the Captain fhall not only forfeit ONE HUN-DRED POUNDS, but thall alfo forfeit his Empoyment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majeffy.

If any Officer of the Cuftoms in Great Britain, or of the Revenue in Ircland, take, or knowingly fuffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or fign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the faid Tools, or knowingly fuffer the fame to be done, he fhall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be ecovered as aforefaid, and alfo forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majeffy.

under His Majefty. One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

Statutes 14, 21, 25 and 26 of His prefent Majefly.

Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if fuch Offence be committed in treland; the Perfon fo convicted fhall, for every Arsificer contracted with, or feduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED FOUNDS, and fhall fuffer Imprior Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Prefs, Paper,

Paper, Utenfil or Implement what sever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Linen, Steel or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of fuch Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Perfons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the fame to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers fuffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above mentioned, in the Cafe of Tools and Utenfils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.
