The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Fourteenth of January last, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, will expire upon the Twenty-fifth Day of this instant July: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever do at any Time, for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Twenty fifth Day of this instant July, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, or ship or lade any of the Articles above mentioned on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first

had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the Exportation of Naval Stores, and more effectually to prevent the Exportation of Salt-Petre, Arms and Ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council." But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships or Vessels or Boats, in the Service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on Board such Quantities of Naval Stores as may be necessary for the Use of such Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being; nor to the Exportation of the said several Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Ports and Settlements on the Coast of Africa; or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of any of the said

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said Articles, for the Purposes of Trade, to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of such Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are so entered Outwards, and for the Purposes specified, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up, until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

*Extract of a Letter from Rear-Admiral Murray, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels employed in North America, to Evan Incepan, Esq; Secretary to the Admiralty, dated Halifax, June 22, 1795.*

ON the 7th of January I sent the Oiseau and Argonaut to cruize, and on the 11th the Argonaut returned, bringing with her the French Corvette L'Esperance, which she took on the 8th.—No. 2. is a Copy of Captain Ball's Letter to me, mentioning the Circumstances of her Capture. As I found the Esperance completely fitted and in good Repair, and being much in Want of a Vessel of the Kind, on the 31st of January I sent her and the Lynx to cruize. These Vessels took a Privateer from Charlestown, named La Cocarde Nationale, mounting Fourteen Guns and Six Swivels, and carrying Eighty Men. They also retook the Ship Norfolk, of Belfast, and Brig George, of Workington. The former they sent to Providence, and the latter to Halifax.

The Squadron retook an American Ship called the Ceres, laden with Dutch Property, from Amsterdam to Surinam, which had been captured near the Port of her Destination by a French Privateer from Baltimore, and sent her to Halifax.

I HAVE the Satisfaction to acquaint you, that on the 8th Instant, Cape Henry then bearing E. S. E. about Eighteen Leagues, I captured a French Republican Ship of War called the Esperance, mounting Twenty-two Guns, (Six and Four Pounders) and One Hundred and Thirty Men, commanded by Monf. De St. Laurent, a Lieutenant de Vaisseau.

She is a very complete Vessel and sails well. She had been out Fifty-six Days from Rochfort, and was bound to the Cheapeake.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the Murder aforesaid, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person or Persons who actually gave the mortal Blow) who shall discover the Perpetrator or Perpetrators of the atrocious Murder above-mentioned, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further Encouragement, the Sum of TEN GUINEAS is hereby offered for apprehending of each of the Five Persons above mentioned: The same to be paid by the Treasurer of the General Committee of the Newcastle upon Tyne Volunteers, on each such Person being lodged in any of His Majesty's Gaols in this Kingdom.

N. B. The said Jonathan Surtees is by Trade a Blacksmith, and lately worked with Mr. Jefferies, of the Osse Burn, in Newcastle upon Tyne; he is about Twenty-four Years of Age, five Feet six or seven Inches high, of a fair Complexion, with light brown or flaxen Hair tied behind, and is an Inhabitant of Slaley, in the County of Northumberland, where it is supposed he is gone.

The said Ralph Davison is by Trade a Pitman, and lately lived and worked at Benton in the County of Northumberland; he is about five Feet five Inches high, fair Complexion, reddish Hair, and has been accustomed to play on the Violin in Public Houses.

The said Edward Middlemas is by Trade a Pitman, and lately lived and worked at East Benton, or at Byker Hill in the County of Northumberland; he is about five Feet five Inches high, of a dark Complexion, with brown Hair, and stout made.

The said Thomas Nicholson is also by Trade a Pitman, and lately lived and worked at East Benton aforesaid; he is about five Feet five Inches high, stout made, of a dark Complexion, with dark brown Hair, and has a large Scar on the Side of his Face, and was, with Edward Middlemas, is supposed to have gone to Cockermouth or Whitehaven.

And the said William Middlemas is also by Trade a Pitman, and lately lived and worked at Lambton or Hutton, in the County of Durham; he is about Twenty-four Years of Age, five Feet seven Inches high, brown Complexion and dark brown Hair.

It is supposed the Person who killed the above-mentioned Matthew Hawkins was wounded in the Head with Shot, as the said Matthew Hawkins fired his Gun the Moment before he fell, and it seemed to take Effect on the Man, as he fell immediately, and left his Hat behind him, which had a great Number of Shot Holes in it. It is therefore earnestly entreated, that in case any of the Faculty should be applied to for Assistance by a Person wounded in the Manner before mentioned, they will immediately order him into Custody, and give Notice thereof to Mess. Shotter and Trimmer, at Farnham.
