

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the Thirteenth Day of February last, it was ordered by His Majesty, by and with the Advice of

His Privy Council, in purfuance of an Act paffed in the last Seffion of Parliament, and mentioned in the faid Order, that from and after the Date of the faid Order, until the Thirtieth Day of September next, no Perfon or Perfons whatfoever fhould export, or lay on Board any Ship or Veffel with Intent to export, from any Port or Place of this Kingdom, any Wheat, Rye, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Peafe, Beans, Oats, Indian Corn or Maize, or any Meal or Flour, or Bread, Bifcuit or Malt made thereof, subject to the Provisoes and Exceptions in the faid Order contained ; and further, that it fhould be lawful, for the fame limited Time, to import into any Port or Place of this Kingdom any Foreign Corn or Articles as aforefaid, in any British Ship or Veffel, or in any other Ship or Veffel belonging to Perfons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatfoever; and alfo to take out of Warehoufe, for Home Confumption, any fuch Foreign Corn or other Articles as aforefaid, without Payment of any Duty whatfoever : And whereas it is judged expedient that the faid Prohibition to export, and the faid Permission to import, should be continued for a longer Time; His Majefty therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, purfuant to the Powers given by the faid A&, palled in the last Session of Parliament, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the faid Prohibition to export, or to lay on Board any Ship or Ve::Tel

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^{*}Veffel with Intent to export, any Corn or Articles as aforefaid, fubject to the Provifoes and Exceptions in the faid Order contained, and that the faid Permiffion to import Foreign Corn and other Articles as aforefaid, and to take the fame out of Warehoufe for Home Confumption, without Payment of any Duty whatfoever, fhall continue and remain in Force until the Expiration of Six Weeks from the Commencement of the next Seffion of Parliament. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commiffioners of His Majefly's Treafury are to give the neceffary Directions herein accordingly.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

TATHEREAS the Time limited by His Majefty's Order in Council of the Fourteenth of January last, prohibiting the transporting into .any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rofin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, will expire upon the Twenty-fifth Day of this inftant July : And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majefly's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the faid Prohibition fhould be continued for fome Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of Hi Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Perfon or Perfons whofoever do at any Time, for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the faid Twenty fifth Day of this instant July, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rofin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval . Stores, or thip or lade any of the Articles above mentioned on board any Ship or Veffel, in order to transporting the fame into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majefty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majefty's Reign, intituled; "An Act to ena-. "... ble His Majefty to reftrain the Exportation of Naver val Stores, and more effectually to prevent the Exof portation of Salt Petre, Arms and Ammunition, " when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in " Council." But it is, neverthelefs, His Majefty's Pleafure, that nothing herein contained shall ex-, tend, or be confirmed to extends to any of His Ma-

or Boats, in the Service of His Majefty, or employed or freighted by His Majefty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majefty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Veffel from taking or having on Board fuch Quantities of Naval Stores as may be necessary for the Use of fuch Ship or Veffel during the Courfe of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being ; nor to the Exportation of the faid feveral Articles to Ireland, or to His Majefly's Yards or Garrifons, or to His Majefty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majefty's Forts and Settlements on the Coaft of Africa; or to the Island of St. Helena, or the Britifh Settlements or Factories in the East Indies : provided that, upon the Exportation of any of the faid Articles, for the Purpofes of Trade, to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His MajeRy's Colonies and Plantations in America or the Weft Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or: to 'His Majefty's Forts and Settlements on the Coaft of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of fuch Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the fame to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the fame shall be made, and do give full and fufficient Security by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the faid Articles to the Places for which they are fo entered Outwards, and for the Purposes specified, and none other; and fuch Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up, until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the faid Commillioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commiffioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in fuch Form and Manner as shall be directed by the faid Commissioners, shewing that the faid Articles have been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commifionere of His Majefty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

ISPATCHES from General the Honorable Sir John Vaughan, dated Martinico the 22d and 23d of June, 1795, of which the following are Extracts, have been received by the Right Honorable Henry Dundas, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

T is with infinite Concern I acquaint you, that Brigadier-General Stewart was under the Necetlity of evacuating the Itland of St. Lucia on the

19th Inflant. The natural Strength of Morne Fortune had encouraged me to hope that 1 thould be able to maintain that Post until the Arrival of a Reinforcement; but by the Capture of Pigeon Ifland, when leaft expected, and the fublequent Lofs of the Vigie on the 17th Instant, on which alone depended our uninterrupted Communication with the Carenage, this Evacuation was judged absolutely unavoidable. It accordingly took Place on the Evening of the 18th, and was happily effected undifcovered by the Enemy.

We are indebted to the great Affiduity and uncommon Exertions of Captain Barrett, of His Majefty's Ship Experiment, that the Garrifon was brought off with the Lofs of only a few Sick, who were unavoidably left behind."

I Have the Honor to forward you by this Op-

portunity fome Letters and Papers, which will give you a full Account of the Succels that has fo happily attended His Majesty's Arms in the Island of Dominique.

The whole Body of the Enemy, amounting to 400, having confented to become Prifoners of War, has relieved us from the Anxiety we were under for the Fate of that Island."

Extrast of a Letter from Lieutenant-Colonel Ed-ward Madden to General the Honorable Sir John Vanghan, dated Prince Rupert's, June 22, 1795.

I Have the Pleafure to inform your Excellency, that Captain Bathe, having made a most judicious Difpention of his Detachment, fo as nearly to furround the Enemy in both their Eacampments, on the 17th Infant the first lineampment fant in a Flag, requesting Liberty to lay down their Arms, which Captain Bathe affented to. The Conditions have not been as yet reported to me .- Captain Bithe on the 19th Instant fent a Flag to the fecond En-campment, offering the fame Terms that had been grauted to the first, which they immediately fubmitted to .- I have now Twenty five Officers Prifoners here, Two they call Generals, and Two Hundred and Forty-nine Rank and File. I am informed that Captain Rathe, who is still in Camp, has Seventy-nine more with him .- There are a Number of them difperfed in Two's and Three's in the Woods, that the English Negroes are in Purfuit of, and are | prized by the Earmy on the Night of the 21ft. It

hourly bringing fome in .- I am fending out fmall Parties of Militia (who have behaved uncommonly well) to the different Parishes, in order to root them out entirely, and hope very foon to have to report to your Excellency that there is not a Brigand in the Ifland."

Extrast of a Letter from Lieutenant-Colonal Madden to General the Honorable Sir John Vaughan, dated Prince Rupert's, June 27, 1795.

Have the Pleafure to inform your Excellency, that the Invation of and the Rebellion in this Island is now entirely fettled, every Frenchman that landed being either killed or Priloner, and the Inhabitants of the rebellious Parilhes fent Prifouers to Roleau, there to be disposed of by the Governor.

The Enemy made a third and a fourth Expedition against this Part of the Island, but perceiving that we were prepared to give them a proper Reception, they returned to Marie Galante, firing a Gun and flewing National Colours.

Horfe Guards, August 1, 1795.

BY Difpatches received from General the Honorable Sir John Vaughan, dated Martinico, the 28th of June, it appears, that in the Island of Gic-nada the White French People, who had joined the Brigands, were daily furrendering themfelves at the British Out-Posts; that in the Windward Part of the Island most of the Negroes had returned to their Eftates, and on iome were making Sugar; that a Party of the Brigands, confitting of picked Men, with their Chief Fedon at their Head, had been routed with confiderable Slaughter by a Detach-ment of His Majefty's Troops under the Com-mand of Lieutenant Hinuber, of the 68th Regiment. In this Action Lieutenant Dailing, of the 9th Regiment, and 4 Privates, were lightly wounded. By a Letter from Lieutenant Colonel Leighton to

General Sir John Vaughan, dated St. Vincent's, the 23d of June, it appears, that on the 12th of that Month the Enemy's Post on the Vigie had been carried by Aflault, and that the Commandant was wounded and taken. It is further flated, that very few of the French, who had taken Part with the Charaibs, were left throughout the Island; and that Lieutenant-Colonel Leighton, after this Success, had advanced into the Charaib Country; and taken Polt on Mount Young.

DISPATCHES have been received from Sir J. B. Warren, Bart. K. B. dated La Pomone, at Sea, July 24, 1795, flating, that the Peninfula of Quibe-roon, with Fort Penthievre, which had been taken Possession of by the French Regiments in the Pay of Great Britain on the 3d of that Month, was furappears,

appears, that owing to the Defertion and treacherous Behaviour of fome private Soldiers belonging to fome of the Regiments above mentioned, the Enemy were enabled to get Posseship of the Fort before any effectual Disposition of Resistance could be made. A Part of the Troops, to the Amount of about 900, together with near 1500 of the Royalist Inhabitants, who had joined the Regiments in the Pay of Great Britain, effected their Embarkation on Poard the Snips. The Remainder fell into the Hands of the Enemy, together with fuch Stores and Ammunition as had been landed. A great Proportion of the principal Articles were, however, ftill on Board the Transports which accompanied the Expedition. The Squadron proceeded to the Islands of Houat and Hedic, where the Troops were landed.

Barcelona, June 20.

On the 4th Inflant the Enemy attacked the Spaniards towards Rivas, and on the 7th near Befalu, but were repulled in both Places with confiderable Lofs. On the 14th, at Day-Light, upon the Appearance of fome confiderable Bodies of the Enemy, the whole Spanish Line was got under Arms, and quickly after General Urrutia, feeing the advanced Polls to the Right and Left engaged, pailed the River with the whole Center, except a Referve, on the Bridge juit finished at Bifcara. This Paffage on the Bridge just finished at Bifcara. was opposed by a very imart Fire of Cancon and Howitzers, placed in advantageous Situations, but the Enemy were neverthelefs attacked and driven from all the Polts they occupied in about Two Hours, during a violent Storm of Wind, Thunder and Rain, and purfued to within Musket-Shot of their Camps. The Whole of the Spanish Line was formed in Battle beyond the Hermitage of Pontos, and then retired and repassed the River, after having taken all the Artillery which the Enemy had with them, viz. 1 Eight-Pounder, 1 Four and 1 Republican Two Pounder, 2 Six-Pound Howitzers, with their respective Annaunition Carts ; the Camp Kettles and Meffes, and a Quantity of Blankets and Hand-Barrows. When the greater Part of the Spanish Troops had repaided the River, the Enemy appeared again, and attacked those that were yet on the other Side; upon which a Second Altion took Place, and was still more obstinately disputed than the former. This Second Action began about One o'Clock ; at Three the French retreated precipitately, but the Spanish Light Troops purfued and harrassed them till Six, when the whole Army retired acrois

the Fluvia. Though no correct Statement has been received of the Lofs, on the Side of the Spaniards, in the Action of the 14th, it may be computed, according to the different Accounts, to amount to 36 Officers and about 700 Mcn killed and wounded. The Regiment Fixo de Malaga is fuid to have fuffered much, having borne, with great Firmnels, the Fire of Two of the Enemy's Batteries for a confiderable Time. The most confiderable Lofs, on the Part of the French, was on the Right, where the Spanish Cavalry passed the River, and attacked the Division of the Enemy, command d by General Soret, encamped at Caltillon, confuling of near 6000 Men: They were thrown into Confusion, and killed in great

Numbers by the Spanish Horse, who made no Prifoners: They left a Number of their Dead on the Roads, but carried off the greater Part of their Wounded. All the Spies and Deferters agree in the Report that the Enemy lost about 2,000 Men.

According to the Officer's Report, 25,000 Man had, in the Evening of the 13th, taken the Polts which they occupied the next Morning, in order to protect a general Harvest of Wheat in Lampourdan; 600 Reapers were brought for this Purpole out of Roussillon, and the Troops had Orders to keep their Position to the last Extremity.

Genoa, June 30.

Intelligence has been received here, that, on the 24th Inftant, General De Vins had attacked and carried the different Posts of the Madonna del Monte, from which the French, stationed on the Heights behind Vado, had attempted in vain to diffolge him; that Two Battalions of Thourn and a Division of Croats of Carlstadt, commanded by General Cantu and Licutenant Colonel Marquette, had attacked and driven the French from their strong Intrenchments on the Mountain of St. Giacoms; that Two Companies of the free Corps of Julay had alfo carried the French Intrenchments on the Mo intain of Settepani; that General De Vins, having driven the Enemy from all those Posts, had established himfelf on the Sea-Coaft between Savona and Vado; and that on the Night of the 28th the French had abandoned their Intrenchments at Vado, and fallen back upon Finale, leaving behind them Thirty Picces of Cannon and Two confiderable Magazines of Provisions and Forage.

It appears that General Colli, at the Head of the Piemontefe Army, has attacked the French on the Side of Ormea, and fucceeded in driving them from feveral very important Posts, particularly from that of Spinarda.
