P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the Thirteenth Day of February last, it was ordered by His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, in pursuance of an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, and mentioned in the said Order, that from and after the Date of the said Order, until the Thirtieth Day of September next, no Person or Persons whatsoever should export, or lay on Board any Ship or Vessel with Intent to export, from any Port or Place of this Kingdom, any Wheat, Rye, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Pease, Beans, Oats, Indian Corn or Maize, or any Meal or Flour, or Bread, Biscuit or Malt made thereof, subject to the Provisoes and Exceptions in the said Order contained; and further, that it should be lawful, for the same limited Time, to import into any Port or Place of this Kingdom any Foreign Corn or Articles as aforesaid, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any

Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; and also to take out of Warehouse, for Home Consumption, any such Foreign Corn or other Articles as aforesaid, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Prohibition to export, and the said Permission to import, should be continued for a longer Time; His Majesty therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, pursuant to the Powers given by the said Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Prohibition to export, or to lay on Board any Ship or Vessel with Intent to export, any Corn or Articles as aforesaid, subject to the Provisoes and Exceptions in the said Order contained, and that the said Permission to import Foreign Corn and other Articles as aforesaid, and to take the same out of Warehouse for Home Consumption, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever, shall continue and remain in Force until the Expiration of Six Weeks from the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit; any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brasses, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted shall offend again he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforesaid, such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of, before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of one Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind

him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And, if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Goal till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Judiciary, or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brasses, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland, into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Judiciary, or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with, or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Goal of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in Case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on Board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Offence, forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on Board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Effin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on Board

Board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Suffrance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

Statutes 14, 21, 25 and 26 of His present Majesty.

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil or Implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Linen, Steel or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above mentioned, in the Case of Tools and Utensils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that on the Morning of the 11th Instant, some Person or Persons, at present unknown, did shoot at and kill Matthew Hawkins, in the Park of the Lord Bishop of Winchester, in the Parish of Farnham in the County of Surrey, who was employed with the Park-keeper and another Person to protect the Deer therein.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the above mentioned Murder, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person

who actually killed the said Matthew Hawkins) who shall discover his Accomplice or Accessories therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

PORTLAND.

And, as a further Encouragement, a Reward of FIFTY POUNDS is hereby offered to any Person or Persons (except as before excepted) making such Discovery as aforesaid, upon Conviction of any one or more of the Offenders, by

It is supposed the Person who killed the above-mentioned Matthew Hawkins was wounded in the Head with Shot, as the said Matthew Hawkins fired his Gun the Moment before he fell, and it seemed to take Effect on the Man, as he fell immediately, and left his Hat behind him, which had a great Number of Shot Holes in it. It is therefore earnestly entreated, that in case any of the Faculty should be applied to for Assistance by a Person wounded in the Manner before mentioned, they will immediately order him into Custody; and give Notice thereof to Mess. Shotter and Trimmer, at Farnham.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that Jonathan Surtees, Ralph Davison, Edward Middlemas, Thomas Nicholson and William Middlemas, stand charged with having, on the Evening of Sunday the 21st Ultimo, (in Conjunction with other Persons now in Custody) wilfully murdered Thomas Purvis, of the Town and County of Newcastle upon Tyne, Carver and Gilder, and late one of the Volunteers of the said Place; and that the said Jonathan Surtees, Ralph Davison, Edward Middlemas, Thomas Nicholson and William Middlemas, have since absconded.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the Murder aforesaid, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person or Persons who actually gave the mortal Blow) who shall discover the Perpetrator or Perpetrators of the atrocious Murder above-mentioned, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

PORTLAND.

And, as a further Encouragement, the Sum of TEN GUINEAS is hereby offered for apprehending of each of the Five Persons above mentioned: The same to be paid by the Treasurer of the General Committee of the Newcastle upon Tyne Volunteers, on each such Person being lodged in any of His Majesty's Gaols in this Kingdom.

N. B. The said Jonathan Surtees is by Trade a Blacksmith, and lately worked with Mr. Jesseries, of the Ouse Burn, in Newcastle upon Tyne; he is about Twenty-four Years of Age, five Feet six or seven Inches high, of a fair Complexion, with light brown or flaxen Hair tied behind, and is an Inhabitant of Slaley, in the County of Northumberland, where it is supposed he is gone.

The said Ralph Davison is by Trade a Pitman, and lately lived and worked at Benton in the County of Northumberland; he is about five Feet five Inches high, fair Complexion, reddish Hair, and has been accustomed to play on the Violin in Public Houses.

The said Edward Middlemas is by Trade a Pitman, and lately lived and worked at East Benton, or at By-

ker Hill in the County of Northumberland; he is about five Feet five Inches high, of a dark Complexion, with brown Hair, and stout made.

The said Thomas Nicholson is also by Trade a Pitman, and lately lived and worked at East Benton aforesaid; he is about five Feet five Inches high, stout made, of a dark Complexion, with dark brown Hair, and has a large Scar on the Side of his Face, and who, with Edward Middlemas, is supposed to have gone to Cocker-mouth or Whitehaven.

And the said William Middlemas is also by Trade a Pitman, and lately lived and worked at Lambton or Hurraton, in the County of Durham; he is about Twenty-four Years of Age, five Feet seven Inches high, brown Complexion and dark brown Hair.
