Information, so as that any of such Authors, Afters or Abertors as aforesaid thall be apprehended and brought to Justice, shall, upon Conviction of such Offender or Offenders, receive Our most gracious Parlon.

By the KING. A PROCLAMATION. GEORGER.

THEREAS it hath been represented to Us, That, immediately before the Opening of the prefent Seffion of Parliament, a great Number of Persons were collected in Fieldsein the Neighbourhood of the Metropolis, by Advertisements and Hand-Bills, and that divers inflammatory Discourses were delivered to the Perfons to collected, and divers Proceedings were had, tending to create groundless Jealoufy and Discontent, and to endanger the Publick Peace, and the Quiet and Safety of Our faithtul Subjects: And whereas it bath been also reprefented to Us, That divers feditious and treafonable Papers have been lately distributed, tending to excite evil-disposed Persons to Acts endangering Our Royal Person: And whereas such Proceedings have been followed, on the Day on which the prefent Session of Parliament commenced, by Acts of Tumult and Violence, and by daring and highly criminal Outrages, in direct Violation of the Publick Peace, to the immediate Danger of Our Royal Perfon, and to the Interruption of Our Passage to and From Our Parljament: And whereas great Uncasimefs and Auxiety bath been produced in the Minds of Our faithful Subjects, by Rumours and Apprehensions that seditions and unlawful Assemblies are intended to be held by evil-disposed Persons, and that fuch other criminal Practices as aforefaid are insended to be repeated: We, therefore, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to enjoin and require, and We do hereby enjoin and require all Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Mayors, Bailliffs, Confiables, and all other Our loving Subjects throughout Our Kingdom, to use the utmost Diligence to discourage, prevent, and suppress all feditious and unlawful Affemblies: And We do specially enjoin and command all Our loving Subjects, who shall have Cause to suspect that any such Astemblies are intended to be held in any Part of Our Kingdom, to give the earliest Information thereof to

the Magistrates of the several Districts within which it shall be suspected that the same are intended to be held; and if fuch Affemblies shall, nevertheless, in any Cafe, be actually held, to be aiding and affifting, on being required thereto by the Civil Magistrate, in causing Persons delivering instammatory Discourses in such Assemblies, and other principal Actors therein, to be forthwith apprehended, in order that they may be dealt with according to Law. And We have also thought fit, by and with the Advice aforefaid, to enjoin and require, and We do hereby enjoin and require all Juffices of the Peace. Sheriffs, Mayors, Bailuffs, Constables, and all other Our loving Subjects throughout Our Kingdom, to be in like Manner aiding and affifting in bringing to Justice all Persons distributing such seditious and treasonable Papers as aforefaid.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Fourth Day of November, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Ninety-sive, in the Thirtysixth Year of Our Reign.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by His Majesty's Order in Council, bearing Date the Thirteenth of March, 1793. an Embargo was laid on all Ships or Veilels laden or to be laden in any of the Ports of Great Britain, with Salted Provisions of any Kind whatfoever, and alfo upon all Ships and Vestels laden or to be laden with Butter and Cheefe, Peafe, Beans, Rice, Hay. Straw, or Forage of any Kind whatfoever, and with Hides or Leather manufactured or unmanufactured; and it was ordered that the faid Embargo should continue and remain upon all fuch Ships and Veffels until further Order; but it was by the faid Order declared to be His Majesty's Pleasure, that the said Embargo should not extend (amongst other Things) to any Ships or Vessels, being British Ships and Vestels, navigated according to Law, which may be employed in carrying any of the faid Articles abovementioned to any Country in or out of Europe, in Amity with His Majefly: And whereas His Majefly judges it expedient to prohibit the carrying any fuch Articles of Provision as aforefuld to Countries in Amity with His Majesty, it is hereby ordered, that notwithstanding any Thing in the said Order of the Thisteenth of March, 1793, contained to the contrang, the faid Embargo shall, from and after the Publication of this Order in the London Gazette,
