By the KING, PROCLAMA GEORGER.

WHEREAS on the Twenty-ninth Day of this instant Month of October, divers Persons, riotoully assembled and stationed in different Places

in Our City of Westminster, proceeded to commit certain daring and highly criminal Outrages, in grefs Violation of the Publick Peace, to the actual Danger of Our Royal Person, and to the Interruption of Our Passage to and from Our Parliament; West herefore, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, in pursuance of an Address from Our Two Houses of Parliament, do hereby enjoin all Magistrates, and all other Our loving Subjects, to use their utmost Endeavours to discover and cause to be apprehended the Authors, Actors and Abettors concerned in fuch Outrages, in order that they may be dealt with according to Law : And We do hereby promife, That any Person or Persons, other than those actually concerned in doing any Act by which Our Royal Person, was immediately endangered, who shall give Information, so as that any of the Authors, Actors or Abettors concerned in fuch Outrages; as aforefaid, may be apprehended and brought to Junice, shall receive a Reward of ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, to be paid on Conviction of every such Offender; which said Sum of : ONE THOUSAND POUNDS the Lords Commissioners of Our Treasury are hereby required and. directed to pay, accordingly. And We do further promife, that any Person or Persons concerned in fuch Outrages as aforefaid, other than fuch as were actually concered in any Act by which Our Royal Person was immediately endangered, who shall give Information

Enformation, so as that any of such Authors, Actors or Abettors as aforesaid shall be apprehended and brought to Justice, shall, upon Conviction of such Offender or Offenders, receive Our most gracious Pardon.

7HEREAS it hath been represented to Us, That, immediately before the Opening of the present Session of Parliament, a great Number of Persons were collected in Fields in the Neighbourhood of the Metropolis, by Advertisements and Hand-Bills, and that divers inflammatory Discourses were delivered to the Perfons so collected, and divers Proceedings were had, tending to create groundless Jealousy and Discontent, and to endanger the Publick Peace, and the Quiet and Safety of Our faithful Subjects: And whereas it hath been also reprefented to Us, That divers feditious and treasonable Papers have been lately distributed, tending to excite evil-disposed Persons to Acts endangering Our Royal Person: And whereas such Proceedings have been followed, on the Day on which the present Session of Parliament commenced, by Acts of Tumult and. Violence, and by daring and highly criminal Outrages, in direct Violation of the Publick Peace, to the immediate Danger of Our Royal Perfon, and to the Interruption of Our Passage to and from Our Parliament: And whereas great Uneafiness and Anxiety hath been produced in the Minds of Our faithful Subjects, by Rumours and Apprehensions that seditious and unlawful Assemblies are intended to be held by evil-disposed Persons, and that such other criminal Practices as aforesaid are intended to be repeated: We, therefore, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to enjoin and require, and We do hereby enjoin and require all Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Mayors, Bailiffs, Constables, and all other Our loving Subjeas throughout Our Kingdom, to use the utmost Diligence to discourage, prevent, and suppress all feditions and unlawful Affemblies: And We do specially enjoin and command all Our loving Subjects, who shall have Cause to suspect that any such Assemblies are intended to be held in any Part of Our Lingdom, to give the earliest information thereof to

the Magistrates of the several Districts within which it shall be suspected that the same are intended to be held; and if such Assemblies shall, nevertheless, in any Cafe, be actually held, to be aiding and affifting, on being required thereto by the Civil Magiltrate, in causing Persons delivering inflammatory Discourses in such Assemblies, and other principal Actors therein, to be forthwith apprehended, in order that they may be dealt with according to Law. And We have also thought fit, by and with the Advice aforesaid, to enjoin and require, and We do hereby enjoin and require all Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Mayors, Bailiffs, Constables, and all other Our loving Subjects throughout Our Kingdom, to be in like Manner aiding and affifting in bringing to Justice all Persons distributing such seditious and treasonable Papers as aforesaid.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by His Majesty's Order in Council, bearing Date the Thirteenth of March, 1793, an Embargo was laid on all Ships or Vessels laden or to be laden in any of the Ports of Great Britain, with Salted Provisions of any Kind whatsoever, and also upon all Ships and Vessels laden or to be laden with Butter and Cheefe, Peafe, Beans, Rice, Hay, Straw, or Forage of any Kind whatfoever, and with Hides or Leather manufactured or unmanufactured; and it was ordered that the faid Embargo should continue and remain upon all fuch Ships and Vessels until further Order; but it was by the faid Order declared to be His Majesty's Pleasure, that the said Embargo should not extend (amongst other Things) to any Ships or Vessels, being British Ships and Vessels, navigated according to Law, which may be employed in carrying any of the said Articles abovementioned to any Country in or out of Europe, in Amity with His Majesty: And whereas His Majesty judges it expedient to prohibit the carrying any such Articles of Provision as aforesaid to Countries in Amity with His Majesty, it is hereby ordered, that notwithstanding any Thing in the said Order of the Thirteenth of March, 1793, contained to the contrary, the faid Embargo shall, from and after the Bublication of this Order in the London Gazette,

extend to all Ships and Vessels whatsoever, laden or to be laden in any of the Ports of Great Britain with Salted Provisions of any Kind whatsoever, or with Butter, Cheese, Hay, Straw or Forage of any Kind whatsoever, and which Ships or Vessels shall be employed in carrying any of the Articles abovementioned to any Country in or out of Europe, in Amity with His Majesty. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 6th of May last, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pot-Ash or Pearl-Ash (except as in the faid Order is mentioned) will expire upon the 7th Day of this instant November: And whereas it is judged expedient that the faid Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do, at any Time, during the Space of Six Months from the 7th Day of this instant November, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry or convey, or lade or lay on Board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of this Kingdom, any Pot-Ash or Pearl-Ash, without Leave or Permission being sirst had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, " An Act for indemnifying all Persons " who have been concerned in advising or carrying " into Execution an Order of the Lords Commif-" fioners of His Majesty's Treasury respecting the " Exportation of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes; for er preventing Suits in consequence of the same; " for authorizing His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying Coasswife of Pot-Ashes or 46 Pearl-Ashes, and for making further Provisions " relative thereto." But it is nevertheless His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent the Exportation of the faid Articles to Ireland, or to His Majelty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements

on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of the faid Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man. or to His Majesly's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the said Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and fufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are fo entered Outwards, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the faid Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the faid Commissioners, shewing that the faid Articles have been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treafury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain. London, November 10.

On Sunday last William Curtis, Esq; Lord Mayor Elect for the Year ensuing, was sworn at Guildhalt; when the Chair and other Ensigns of Mayoralty were furrendered to him in the accustomed Manner.

Yesterday the new Lord Mayor, accompanied by the late Lord Mayor, the Aldermen, Recorder and Sheriffs, in their Scarlet Gowns, went in their Coaches to the Water-side, the Sword and Mace being carried before them, and the City Officers attending; and from thence proceeded in the City Barge, attended by the feveral Companies in their respective Barges, adorned with Streamers and Pendants, to Westminster; and having walked round the Hall, and folemnly faluted all the Courts, they went to the Exchequer Bar, and the new Lord Mayor did there take the Oaths appointed; and having recorded Warrants of Attorney in the proper Courts, returned by Water to Black Friars, and from thence in Coaches, with the usual Solemnity, to Guildhall, where a magnificent Entertainment was provided; at which were present His Serene Highness the Prince of Orange, several of the Foreign Winisters, the Great Officers of State, divers of the Nobility, Lords of His Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, the Judges; and many other Persons of Quality and Distinction.
