WHEREAS on the Twenty-ninth Day of this
instant Month of October, divers Persons,
riotously assembled and stationed in different Places

in Our City of Westminster, proceeded to commit
certain daring and highly criminal Outrages, in
gross Violation of the Publick Peace, to the actual
Danger of Our Royal Person, and to the Interrup-
tion of Our Passage to and from Our Parliament;
We, therefore, with the Advice of Our Privy Coun-
cil, in pursuance of an Address from Our Two
Houses of Parliament, do hereby enjoin all Ma-
gistrates, and all other Our loving Subjects, to use
their utmost Endeavours to discover and cause to be
apprehended the Authors, Actors and Abettors con-
cerned in such Outrages, in order that they may be
dealt with according to Law: And We do hereby
promise, That any Person or Persons, other than
those actually concerned in doing any Act by which
Our Royal Person was immediately endangered,
who shall give Information, so as that any of the
Authors, Actors or Abettors concerned in such
Outrages as aforesaid, may be apprehended and
brought to Justice, shall receive a Reward of ONE
THOUSAND POUNDS, to be paid on Con-
viction of every such Offender; which said Sum of
ONE THOUSAND POUNDS the Lords Com-
missioners of Our Treasury are hereby required and
directed to pay accordingly. And We do further
promise, that any Person or Persons concerned in
such Outrages as aforesaid, other than such as were
actually concerned in any Act by which Our Royal
Person was immediately endangered, who shall give
Information,

Information, so as that any of such Authors, Actors or Abettors as aforesaid shall be apprehended and brought to Justice, shall, upon Conviction of such Offender or Offenders, receive Our most gracious Pardon.

WHEREAS it hath been represented to Us, That, immediately before the Opening of the present Session of Parliament, a great Number of Persons were collected in Fields in the Neighbourhood of the Metropolis, by Advertisements and Hand-Bills, and that divers inflammatory Discourses were delivered to the Persons so collected, and divers Proceedings were had, tending to create groundless Jealousy and Discontent, and to endanger the Publick Peace, and the Quiet and Safety of Our faithful Subjects: And whereas it hath been also represented to Us, That divers seditious and treasonable Papers have been lately distributed, tending to excite evil-disposed Persons to Acts endangering Our Royal Person: And whereas such Proceedings have been followed, on the Day on which the present Session of Parliament commenced, by Acts of Tumult and Violence, and by daring and highly criminal Outrages, in direct Violation of the Publick Peace, to the immediate Danger of Our Royal Person, and to the Interruption of Our Passage to and from Our Parliament: And whereas great Uneasiness and Anxiety hath been produced in the Minds of Our faithful Subjects, by Rumours and Apprehensions that seditious and unlawful Assemblies are intended to be held by evil-disposed Persons, and that such other criminal Practices as aforesaid are intended to be repeated: We, therefore, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to enjoin and require, and We do hereby enjoin and require all Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Mayors, Bailiffs, Constables, and all other Our loving Subjects throughout Our Kingdom, to use the utmost Diligence to discourage, prevent, and suppress all seditious and unlawful Assemblies: And We do specially enjoin and command all Our loving Subjects, who shall have Cause to suspect that any such Assemblies are intended to be held in any Part of Our Kingdom, to give the earliest Information thereof to

the Magistrates of the several Districts within which it shall be suspected that the same are intended to be held; and if such Assemblies shall, nevertheless, in any Case, be actually held, to be aiding and assisting, on being required thereto by the Civil Magistrate, in causing Persons delivering inflammatory Discourses in such Assemblies, and other principal Actors therein, to be forthwith apprehended, in order that they may be dealt with according to Law. And We have also thought fit, by and with the Advice aforesaid, to enjoin and require, and We do hereby enjoin and require all Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Mayors, Bailiffs, Constables, and all other Our loving Subjects throughout Our Kingdom, to be in like Manner aiding and assisting in bringing to Justice all Persons distributing such seditious and treasonable Papers as aforesaid.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by His Majesty's Order in Council, bearing Date the Thirteenth of March, 1793, an Embargo was laid on all Ships or Vessels laden or to be laden in any of the Ports of Great Britain, with Salted Provisions of any Kind whatsoever, and also upon all Ships and Vessels laden or to be laden with Butter and Cheese, Pease, Beans, Rice, Hay, Straw, or Forage of any Kind whatsoever, and with Hides or Leather manufactured or unmanufactured; and it was ordered that the said Embargo should continue and remain upon all such Ships and Vessels until further Order: but it was by the said Order declared to be His Majesty's Pleasure, that the said Embargo should not extend (among other Things) to any Ships or Vessels, being British Ships and Vessels, navigated according to Law, which may be employed in carrying any of the said Articles above-mentioned to any Country in or out of Europe, in Amity with His Majesty: And whereas His Majesty judges it expedient to prohibit the carrying any such Articles of Provision as aforesaid to Countries in Amity with His Majesty, it is hereby ordered, that notwithstanding any Thing in the said Order of the Thirteenth of March, 1793, contained to the contrary, the said Embargo shall, from and after the Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, extend

extend to all Ships and Vessels whatsoever, laden or to be laden in any of the Ports of Great Britain with Salted Provisions of any Kind whatsoever, or with Butter, Cheese, Hay, Straw or Forage of any Kind whatsoever, and which Ships or Vessels shall be employed in carrying any of the Articles above-mentioned to any Country in or out of Europe, in Amity with His Majesty. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 6th of May last, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pot-Ash or Pearl-Ash (except as in the said Order is mentioned) will expire upon the 7th Day of this instant November: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do, at any Time, during the Space of Six Months from the 7th Day of this instant November, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry or convey, or lade or lay on Board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of this Kingdom, any Pot-Ash or Pearl-Ash, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury respecting the Exportation of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes; for preventing Suits in consequence of the same; for authorizing His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying Coastwise of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, and for making further Provisions relative thereto." But it is nevertheless His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent the Exportation of the said Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements

on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of the said Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the said Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and to give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are so entered Outwards, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's ever loyal and dutiful Subjects, the President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Officers and Body of the Honorable Artillery Company of the City of London, in General Court assembled, humbly approach your Majesty with the most profound Veneration and the most lively Sentiments of our steady and most respectful Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government.

We beg to express our Indignation and Abhorrence of the late most atrocious and diabolical Outrages committed against the sacred Person of your Majesty, in Defiance of all Law and Authority, and at a Time when your Majesty was about to discharge one of the most important Functions of your exalted Station.

We are struck with Horror at the Recollection of a Deed, which, but for the Interposition of Divine Providence, might have robbed the World of the brightest Example of every Royal and social Virtue that can adorn a Throne, and have spread Horror and Dismay throughout the British Empire.

With Hearts full of Gratitude to the Almighty for the gracious Preservation of a Life so dear to our Country, we humbly tender our sincere Congratulations upon this Act of His Divine Mercy extended to us and our Fellow Subjects.

As a Volunteer Corps existing from ancient Time, under the Authority of your Royal Predecessors, confirmed by your Majesty's Royal Warrant, we trust that we have ever been found ready, in Aid of the Civil Power, for the Preservation of the Peace of the Metropolis, and in Defence of the Property of our Fellow Subjects: And we most humbly beg to tender to your Majesty our most faithful Services in the Protection of your Majesty's sacred Person and of your illustrious Family; and that your Majesty will be assured that we shall always continue to support, at the Hazard of our Lives and with our Fortunes, the happy Constitution under which we live, through which we have enjoyed all the Blessings of social Order and civil Liberty in a more compleat and extended Manner than has fallen to the Lot of any other Nation.

We devoutly wish also, that the Measures adopted, with Advice of Parliament, for the Discovery of the Actors and Abettors of the late disgraceful Tumults, may be followed with Success, in order that, being convicted of the Offence done to your Majesty, and in your Person, as their lawful Sovereign, to your People, they may be held forth as the deserved Objects of public Disapprobation, and may serve as Examples, by which the Ignorant and Wicked may be warned of the Danger of all such base and illegal Counsel and Proceeding.

Devoutly acknowledging the Divine Interposition in your Majesty's late Escape from Danger, we offer our Petitions at a Throne of Grace that no Acts of similar unprecedented Atrocity may stain the History of these Lands; that all the Machinations of your Enemies may prove abortive; that under your happy and mild Government the Hearts of the Disobedient may be turned to the Wisdom of the Just; and being long spared to promote the best Interests of your People, that you may finally be exalted to the Rewards of a Kingdom that shall never be moved.

S I R,

I Have the Honor to inclose, for your Information, the Copy of a Letter I have received from Major-General Irving, dated at St. Vincent's, October 3, and to congratulate you on the good Behaviour of the Troops, and on the Success of His Majesty's Arms by the Possession of the important Post of the Vigie on that Island.

Copy of a Letter from Major-General Irving to Major-General Leigh, dated Kingston, St. Vincent's, Oct. 3, 1795.

S I R,

I Have the Honour to report to your Excellency, that, finding this Town extremely streightened by the Enemy having Possession of the Vigie, I judged it expedient to drive them from it, as the only Means to relieve it. I informed myself, from those best acquainted with the Country, that a Height,

called Fairbane's Hill, commanded the Vigie; upon this I formed my Plan of Attack. The Grenadiers and Light Infantry, with Four Companies of the 40th Regiment, were to gain the Hill on one Quarter, while the 59th Regiment, supported by Two Three-Pounders, were to force it on another; the whole marched at Three o'Clock Yesterday Morning, so as to be at the Object by Daybreak. The first Division gained the Height early in the Morning, with considerable Loss; the 59th Regiment was early within Fifty Paces of the Enemy, and made several Attempts to gain the Post, but the natural Strength of the Ground, and the heavy Rain that unluckily fell at Daybreak, rendered the Place inaccessible. The Troops having been exposed the Whole of the Day to great Fatigues, and the Weather being very unfavourable, from violent Showers during the Day, and having no Possibility of providing the least Shelter for them, I thought it most advisable to return to our former Quarters for the Night. Having sufficient Reason to suppose the Enemy had abandoned their Posts during the Night, I ordered out early this Morning a strong Detachment of the St. Vincent's Rangers to take Possession of it; and I have the Satisfaction to inform your Excellency, that the British Flag now displays itself there. We found all the Cannon and Ammunition there undestroyed. Brigadier-General Myers, by his able Conduct the whole Day, afforded me the most essential Service; and the highest Praise is due to this Army, both Officers and Men, for the Perseverance, Discipline and Bravery they manifested in sustaining an Action from Daybreak until Night in this Climate.
