

7HEREAS on the Twenty-ninth Day of this inftant Month of October, divers Perfons, riotoufly affembled and stationed in different Places

[ Price Three Shillings. ]

AT the Court at St. James's, the 31st Day of in Our City of Westminster, proceeded to commit certain daring and highly criminal Outrages, in gross Violation of the Publick Peace, to the actual Danger of Our Royal Perfon, and to the Interruption of Our Passage to and from Our Parliament; We, therefore, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, in pursuance of an Address from Our Two Houfes of Parliament, do hereby enjoin all Magistrates, and all other Our loving Subjects, to use their utinoit Endcavours to discover and cause to be apprehended the Authors, Actors and Abettors concerned in fuch Outrages, in order that they may be dealt with according to Law : And We do hereby promile, That any Perfon or Perfons, other than those actually concerned in doing any ASt by which Our Royal Perfon was immediately endangered, who shall give information, fo as that any of the Authors, Actors or Abettors concerned in fuch Outrages as aforefaid, may be apprehended and brought to Juffice, shall receive a Reward of ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, to be paid on Conviction of every fuch Offender; which faid Sum of ONE THOUSAND POUNDS the Lords Commissioners of Our Treasury are hereby required and directed to pay accordingly. And We do further promife, that any Perfon or Perfons concerned in fuch Outrages as aforefaid, other than fuch as were actually concered in any Act by which Our Royal Perfon was immediately endangered, who shall give Information,

Information, fo as that any of fuch Authors, Actors or Abettors as aforefaid fhall be apprehended and brought to Juffice, fhall, upon Conviction of fuch Offender or Offenders, receive Our most gracious Pardon.

A PROCLAMATION. GEORGE R.

HEREAS it hath been reprefented to Us, That, immediately before the Opening of the present Session of Parliament, a great Number of Perfons were collected in Fields in the Neighbourhood of the Metropolis, by Advertifements and Hand-Bills, and that divers inflammatory Difcourfes were delivered to the Perfons fo collected, and divers Proceedings were had, tending to create groundlefs Jealoufy and Difcontent, and to endanger the Publick Peace, and the Quiet and Safety of Our faithful Subjects: And whereas it hath been also reprefented to Us, That divers feditious and treafonable Papers have been lately distributed, tending to excite evil-difpofed Perfons to Acts endangering Our Royal Perfon: And whereas fuch Proceedings have been followed, on the Day on which the prefent Seffion of Parliament commenced, by Acts of Tuinult and Violence, and by daring and highly criminal Outrages, in direct Violation of the Publick Peace, to the immediate Danger of Our Royal Perfon, and to the Interruption of Our Paffage to and from Our Parliament: And whereas great Uneafinefs and Anxiety hath been produced in the Minds of Our faithful Subjects, by Rumours and Apprehenfions that feditious and unlawful Affemblies are intended to be held by evil-difpofed Perfons, and that fach other criminal Practices as aforefaid are in-'tended to be repeated : We, therefore, have thought "fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to enjoin and require, and We do hereby enjoin and require all Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Mayors, \* Bailiffs; Conftables, and all other Our loving Subjects throughout Our Kingdom, to use the utmost Diligence to difcourage, prevent, and fupprefs all feditious and unlawful Affemblies: And We do ipeeisity enjoin and command all Our loving Subjects, who shall have Chufe to sufpect that any such Astemblies are intended to be held in any Part of Our Kingdom, to give the earliest Information thereof to

the Magistrates of the several Districts within which it shall be suspected that the same are intended to be held; and if fuch Affemblies shall, nevertheles, in any Cafe, be actually held, to be aiding and allifting, on being required thereto by the Civil Magistrate, in causing Persons delivering inflammatory Difcourfes in fuch Affemblies, and other principal Actors therein, to be forthwith apprehended, in order that they may be dealt with according to haw. And We have also thought sit, by and with the Advice aforefaid, to enjoin and require, and We do hereby enjoin and require all Juffices of the reace, Sheriffs, Mayors, Bailiffs, Constables, and all other Our loving Subjects throughout Our Kingdom, to be in like Manner aiding and affifting in bringing to Juffice all Perfons diffributing fach federous and treafonable Papers as atorefaid.

#### PRESENT,

The KING's Moft Excellent Majefty in Council.

HEREAS by His Majefty's Order in Council, bearing Date the Thirteenth of March, 1793, an Embargo was laid on all Ships or Veffels laden or to be laden in any of the Ports of Great Britain, with Salted Provisions of any Kline whatfoever, and also upon all Ships and Vessels laden or to be laden with Butter and Cheefe, Pcafe, Beans, Rice, Hay, Straw, or Forage of any Kind whatfoever, and with Hides or Leather manufactured or unmanufactured; and it was ordered that the faid Embargo should continue and remain upor all fuch Ships and Veffels until farther Order - but it was by the faid Order declared to be His Majefty's Pleasure, that the faid Embargo should not extend (amor so other Things) to any Ships or Veffels, being British Ships and Veffels, navigated according to Law, which may be employed in cartying any of the faid Articles abovementioned to any Country in or out of Europe, in Amity with His Majerty : And whereas His Majefty judges is expedient to prohibit the carrying any fuch Articles of Provision as aforefaid to Countries in Amity with H.s Mcjefty, it is hereby ordered, that notwithstanding any Thing in the faid Order of the Thirteenth of March, 1793, contained to the contrary, the faid Embargo shail, from and after the Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, . extend

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extend to all Ships and Veffels whatfoever, laden or to be laden in any of the Ports of Great Britain with Soled Provification of any Kind whatfoever, or with Butter, Cheefe, Hay, Straw or Forage of any Kind whatfoever, and which Ships or Veffels fhall be even and in carrying any of the Articles abovesmetter and to any Country in or out of Europe, in Amily with His Majetty. And the Right Honorable the Land: Commifficients of His Majetty's Treafury, and the Konds Commifficients of the Admiralty, are also to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may subjectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. 7: EREAS the Time limited by His Majefly's Order in Council of the 6th of May laft, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pot Ash or Pearl-Ash (except as in the faid Order is mentioned) will expire upon the 7th Day of this inftant November : And whereas it is judged expedient that the faid Prohibition fhould be continued for fome Time longer; His Majefly doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Ferfon or Perfons whatfoever do, at any Time, during the Space of Six Months from the 7th Day of this inftant November, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry or convey, or lade or lay on Board of any Ship, Veffel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of this Kingdom, try Pot-Afi or Pearl-Afh, without Leave or Polmifion being first had and obtained from His Mailly or His Privy Council, upon Pain of include a Forleitures inflicted by an Act paffed Final Thirty-fourth Year of His Majefly's Reign, intituled, " An AG i r indemnifying all Perfons " who have been concerned in advising or carrying " into Execution an Order of the Lords Commif-" Goners of His Majefty's Treafury respecting the " Exportation of Pot-Afhes or Pearl Afhes; for " preventing Suits in confequence of the fame; " for authorizing His Majefty to prohibit the Ex-" pertation or carrying Coaftwife of Pot-Afhes or " Pearl Afhes, and for making further Provisions " relative thereto." But it is neverthelefs His Majesty's Pleafure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be confirued to extend, to prevent the Exportation of the faid Articles to Ireland, or to His Majerty's Iflands of Guernfey, Jerfey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majefty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to New-

on the Coaft of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies ; provided that, upon the Expertation of the faid Articles to Ireland, or to His Majer's Islands of Guernley, Jerley, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majefly's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majefty's Forts and Settlements on the Coaft of Africa, or to the Ifland of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the faid Articles do first make Oath of the true Defination of the fame to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the fame shall be made, and co give full and fufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commiffioners of His Majefty's Cuftoms, to carry the faid Articles to the Places for which they are fo entered Outwards, and none other; and fuch Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the faid Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commiffioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in fuch Form and Manner as shall be directed by the faid Commissioners, shewing that the said Artis cles have been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majelty's Treafury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the neceffary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

#### To the KING's Most Excellent Majelly.

Most Gracious Soucreign,

WE, your Majeity's ever loyal and dutiful Sub-jects, the Prefident, Vice-Prefident, Treafurer, Officers and Body of the Honorable Artillery Company of the City of London, in General Court affembled, humbly approach your Majefly with the most profound Veneration and the most lively Sentiments of our fleady and moft respectful Attachment to your Majesty's Perfon and Government. We beg to express our Indignation and Abhor-

rence of the late most atrocious and diabolical Out-rages committed against the facred Perion of your Majefty, in Defiance of all Law and Authority, and at a Time when your Majelty was about to di charge one of the molt important Functions of your exalted Station.

We are struck with Horror at the Recollection of a Deed, which, but for the Interpolition of Divine Providence, might have robbed the World of the brighteft Example of every Royal and focial Virtue that can adorn a Throne, and have fpread Horror and Difmay throughout the British Empire.

With Hearts full of Gratitude to the Almighty for the gracious Prefervation of a Life fo dear to our Country, we humbly tender our fincere Congratulalions upon this Act of his Divine Mercy extended to us and our Fellow Subjects.

As a Volunteer Corps exifting from ancient Time, under the Authority of your Royal Predec flors, con-firmed by your Majefty's Royal Warrant, we truft that we have ever been found ready, in Aid of the Civil. Power, for the Prefervation of the Peace of the Metropolis, and in Defence of the Property of our Fellow Subjects: And we most humbly beg to tender to your Majefty our most faithful Services in the Protection of your Majesty's facred Perfon and of your illustrious Family; and that your Majesty will be affured that we shall always continue to support, at the Hazard of our Lives and with our Fortunes, the happy Conffitution under which we live, through which we have enjoyed all the Bleffing: of focial Order and civil Liberty in a more compleat and extended Manner than has fallen to the Lot of any other Nation.

## Copy of a Letter from Major-General Irving to Major-General Leigh, dated Kingston, St. Vincent's, OA. 3, 1795.

SIR,

I Have the Honour to report to your Excellency, that, finding this Town extremely fireightened by the Enemy having Poffeffion of the Vigie, I judged it expedient to drive them from it, as the only Means to relieve it. I informed myself, from those best acquainted with the Country, that a Height,

called Fairbane's Hill, commanded the Vigie; upon this I formed my Plan of Attack. The Grenadiers and Light Infantry, with Four Companies of the 40th Regiment, were to gain the Hill on one Quarter, while the 59th Regiment, supported by Two Three-Pounders, were to force it on another; the whole marched at Three o'Clock Yesterday Morning, fo as to be at the Object by Daybreak. The first Divifion gained the Height early in the Morning, with confiderable Lofs; the 59th Regiment was early with-in Fifty Paces of the Lnemy, and made feveral Attempts to gain the Poft, but the natural Strength of the Ground, and the heavy Rain that unluckily fell at Daybreak, rendered the Place inacceffible. The Troops having been exposed the Whole of the Day to great Fatigues, and the Weather being very unfavourable, from violent Showers during the Day, and having no Poffibility of providing the leaft Shelter for them, I thought it most adviseable to return to our former Quarters for the Night. Having fufficient Reafon to suppose the Enemy had abandoned their Posts during the Night, I ordered out early this Morning a strong Detachment of the St. Vin-cent's Rangers to take Possefition of it; and I have the Satisfaction to inform your Excellency, that the British Flap now difplays itfelf there. We found all the Cannon and Ammunition there undertroyed. Brigadier-General Myers, by his able Conduct the whole Day, afforded me the most effential Service; and the highest Praise is due to this Army, both Officers and Men, for the Perleverance, Difcipline and Bravery they manifested in sustaining an Action from Daybreak until Night in this Climate.
