Senfible of the Bleffings we derive, not only from the Monarchy but the Monarch, and justly connecting the Safety of your Majesty's Person with the Happiness of your Subjects, and the Security of our Rights and Liberties, we are impelled by every Sentiment of Duty and Interest, (though on this Occasion we feel the additional Impulse of grateful Affection) to assure your Majesty with what Abhorrence we view the daring and flagitious Outrage committed against your Majesty's sacred Person, and how sincerely we congratulate not only your Majesty but ourselves, that an Attempt so atrocious and dark has been attended with no other Effect than to call forth additional Proofs of the Attachment and Loyalty of your People.

May the same Almighty Power which has hitherto protected your Majesty from the Furor of the Maniac and the Maiignity of the Assassin, continue to frustrate those Designs which, whilst Atrocity meditates, no human Forefight or Precaution can guard against; and we beg your Majesty to believe, that confcious as we are but one Sentiment of indignant Abhorrence pervades all Ranks of your Majesty's Subjects on this Occasion, none feel more warmly this Sentiment, none are more fincerely attached to your Majesty's Person and Family, and from none will your Majesty continue to receive more convincing Proofs of affectionate Attachment than from the loyal Inhabitants of the County of Surrey.

If a Crime of fuch extensive Mischief, and of fuch peculiar Malignity, could possibly admit of any Aggravation, we might presume to observe, that, at a Moment to folemn as that when your Majesty was proceeding to open your High Court of Parliament, it argued more than common Depravity in those infatuated Miscreants, who, ceasing to consider themselves as Subjects, had cast off the Feelings of Men, and scrupled not to attempt the Life of their Sovereign, engaged in the highest Functions of his

Regal Office.

We spare ourselves the Pain of reciting, and your Majesty of recollecting the wicked Arts by which this Influence has been produced on weak Minds by defigning and ambitious Men. The fcandalous Mifrepresentations which have been practifed to seduce the Unwary, the criminal Hopes instilled into the Idle and Profligate, all aiming at one and the fame Object, the Degradation and Extinction of Monarchy, and the Subversion of our established Conflitution in Church and State.

Animated with these Sentiments, and partaking in that Joy which the late important Successes of our Allies have diffused through all Ranks of your Majetty's faithful Subjects, we address our fervent Prayers to the Disposer of all human Events for a long Continuance of your Majesty's Reign in Health, Prosperity and Glory, and with an ardent Hope for the Restoration of the Blessings of Peace, whenever the same can be secured to us on Terms confishent with the Stability of your Majesty's Throne, and the lasting Interests of your People.
