A PROCLAMATION,

For granting the Distribution of Prizes taken from the Subjects of the United Provinces subjequent to the Fifteenth Day of September, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Ninety-five, the Date of His Majesty's Order in Council for granting General Reprizals against the Ships, Goods and Subjects of the said United Provinces.

#### GEORGE R.

JHEREAS by Our Order in Council, dated the Fifteenth Day of September last, We have ordered that General Reprizals be granted again't the Ships, Goods and Subjects of the United Provinces, To that as well Our Fleets and Ships, as alfo all other Ships and Veffels that fhall be commiffionated by Letters of Marque or General Reprizals, or otherwife, by Our Commissioners for executing Oar Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britair, shall and may lawfully feize all Ships Veffels and Goods belonging to the faid United Provinces, or any Perfons being Subjects thereof, or inhabiting within any of the Territories of the faidt United Provinces, and bring the fame to Judgmen in any of Our Coarts of Admiralty within our Dominions; We, being defirous to give due Encouragement to all Our faithful Subjects, who may have lawfully feized any fuch Ships, Veffels or Goods, fubfequent to the faid Fifteenth Day of September last,

or who shall hereafter seize any fuch Ships, Vessels or Goods, and having declared in Council Our Intentions concerning the Diffribution of all Manner of Captures, Seizures, Prizes and Reprizals of all fuch Ships and Goods as aforefaid, which, fubfequent to the faid Fiftcenth Day of September, 1795, have been, or hercafter, during the prefent Hoftilities, shall be feized as aforefaid, do now make known to all Our loving Subjects, and all others whom it may concern, by this Our Proclamation, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, that Our Will and Pleasure is, that the neat Produce of all Prizes taken as afcrefaid, subsequent to the faid Fifteenth Day of September lait, or which shall hereafter be taken as aforefaid, the Right whereof is inherent in Us and Our Crown, be given to the Takers, (We and except the Produce of fuch Prizes as are or shall be taken by Ships or Veffels belonging to Our Commillioners of Cultoms or Excile, the Difpolition of which Wc referve to Our further Pleafure) but fubject to the Payment of all fuch or the like Caftoms and Duties as the fame are now or would have been liable to if the fame were or might have been imported as Merchandize; and that the fame may be fo given in. the Proportion and Manner hereinafter fet forth; that is to fay, That all Prizes taken by Ships and Veffels having Commissions of Letters of Marqae and Reprizals, (fave and except fuch Prizes as are or shall be taken by the Ships or Vessels belonging to Our Commissioners aforefaid) may be fold and difroled

poled of by the Merchants, Owners, Fitters and others to whom fuch Letters of Marque and Reprizals are granted, for their own Ufe and Benefit, after final Adjudication, and not before. And We do hereby further order and direct, that the neat Produce of all Prizes, which are or fhall be taken as aforefaid by any of Our Ships or Veffels of War, shall be for the entire Benefit and Encouragement of Our Flag Officers, Captains, Commanders and other Commissioned Officers in Our Pay, and of the Seamen, Marines and Soldiers on Board Our faid Ships and Veilels at the Time of the Capture, and that fuch Prizes may be lawfully fold and difpofed of by them and their Agents, after the fame shall have been to Us finally adjudged lawful Prize, and not otherwife.

The Diffribution shall be made as follows; the Whole of the neat Produce being first divided into Eight equal Parts.

- The Captain or Captains of any of Our faid Ships or Veffels of War, who fhall be actually on Board at the Taking of any Prize, fhall have Three Eighth Parts; but in cafe any fuch Prize fhall be taken by any of Our Ships or Veffels of War under the Command of a Flag or Flags, the Flag Officer or Officers being actually on Board, or directing and affifting in the Capture, thall have One of the faid Three Eighth Parts, the faid One Eighth Part to be paid to fuch Flag or Flag Officers in fuch Proportions and fubject to fuch Regulations as are hereinafter mentioned.
- The Captains of Marines and Land Forces, Sea Lieutenants and Mafter on Board, fhall have One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongft them; but that every Phyfician appointed, or hereafter to be appointed, to a Fleet or Squadron of Our Ships of War, fhall, in the Diffribution of Prizes which are or fhall be taken as aforefaid by the Ships in which he fhall ferve, or in which fuch Ship's Company fhall be entitled to fhare, be claffed with the Sea Lieutenants with refpect to the faid One Eighth Part, and be allowed to fhare equally with them, provided fuch Phyfician be actually on Board at the Time of taking fuch Prizes.

The Lieutenants and Quarter-Mafters of Marines, and Lieutenants, Enfigns and Quarter-Mafters of Land Forces, Secretaries of Admirals or of Cominodores, with Captains under them, Boatfivains, Gunners, Purfer, Carpenter, Mafters Mates, Chirurgeon, Pilot and Chaplain on Board, shall have One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them.

- The Midshipmen, Captain's Clerk, Master-Sailmaker, Carpenter's Mates, Boatswains Mates, Gunner's Mates, Master at Arms, Corporals, Yeomen of the Sheets, Cockswain, Quarter-Masters, Quarter-Masters Mates, Chirurgeon's Mates, Yeomen of the Powder-Room, Serjeants of Marines and Land Forces on Board, shall have One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them.
- The Trumpeters, Quarter-Gunners, Carpenter's Crew, Stewards, Cook, Armourer, Steward's Mate, Cook's Mate, Gunfinith, Cooper, Swabber, Ordinary Trumpeter, Barber, Able Seamen, Ordinary Seamen, and Marines, and other Soldiers, and all other Perfons doing Duty and affilting on Board, fhall have Two Eighth Parts, to be equally divided amongft them.

Provided that if any Officer being on Board any of our Ships of War at the Time of taking any Prize shall have more Commissions or Offices than one, fuch Officer shall be entitled only to the Share or Shares of the Prizes, "which, according to the above mentioned Distribution, shall belong to his fuperior Commission or Office. And We do hereby strictly enjoin all Commanders of Our Ships and Veffels of War taking any Prize, as foon as may be, to transmit, or cause to be transmitted, to the Commissioners of Our Navy, a true Lift of the Names of all the Odicers, Seamen, Marines, Soldiers and others who were actually on Board Our Ships and Veffels of War under their Command at the Time of the Capture; which Lift shall contain the Quality of the Service of each Perfon on Board, and be fubfcribed by the Captain or Commanding Officer, and Three or more of the Chief Officers on Board. And We do hereby require and direct the Commissioners of Our Navy, or any Three or more of them, to examine, or caufe to be examined, fuch Lifts by the Musler Books of fuch Ships and Veffels of War, and Lifts annexed thereto, to fee that fuch Lifts do agree with the faid Muller Books and annexed Lists, as to the Names, Quali ies, or Ratings of the Officers, Seamen, Marines, Soldiers and others belonging to fuch Ships and Veffels of War, and, upon Request, forthwith to grant a Certificate of the Truth of any Lift transmitted to them, to the Agents nominated and appointed by the Captors to take Care and dispose of such Prize; and also, upon Application to them, (the faid Commissioners) they thall give or caufe to be given to the faid Agents all fuch Lifts from the Mufter Books of any fuch Ships of War, and annexed Lifts, as the faid Agents shall find requisite for their Direction in paying the Produce

Produce of fuch Prizes, and otherwife shall be aiding and affifting to the faid Agents in all fuch Matters as fhall be necessary. We do hereby further will and direct, that the following Regulations shall be observed concerning the One Eighth Part herein before mentioned to be granted to the Flag or Flag Officers, who fhall actually be on Board at the taking of any Prize, or shall be directing or allisting therein: First, That a Flag Officer, Commander in Chief, when there is but One Flag Officer upon Service, fhall have to his own Ufe the faid One Eighth Part of the Prizes taken by Ships and Veffels under his Command: Szeoadly, That a Flag Officer, fent to command at Jamaica or elfewhiere, shall have no Right to any Share of Prizes taken by Ships or Veffels employed there before he arrives at the Place to which he is fent, and actually takes upon him the Command. Thirdly, That when an inferior Flag Officer is fent out to reinforce a fuperior Flag Officer, at Jamaica or elfewhere, the fuperior Flag Officer shall have no Right to any Share of Prizes taken by the inferior Flag Officer, before the inferior Flag Officer shall arrive within the Limits of the Command of the fuperior Flag Officer, and actually receive fome Order from him. Fourthly, That a chief Flag Officer returning Home, from Jamaica or elfewhere, shall have no Share of the Prizes taken by the Ships or Veffels left behind to act under another Command. Fifthly, That if a Flag Officer is fent to command in the Out-Ports of this Kingdom, he shall have no Share of the Prizes taken by Ships or Veffels which have failed from that Port by Order from the Admiralty. Sixthly, That when more Flag-Officers than One ferve together, the Eighth Part of the Prizes taken by any Ships or Veffels of the Fleet or Squadron, shall be divided in the following Proportions, viz. If there be but Two Flag Officers, the Chief shall have Two Third Parts of the faid Oae Eighth Part, and the other shall have the remaining Third Part; but if the Number of Flag Officers be more than Two, the Chief shall have only One Half, and the other Half shall be equally divided amongs the other Flag Officers. Seventhly, That Commodures with Captains under them shall be effected as Flag Officers with refpect to the Eighth Part of Prizes taken, whether commanding in Chief or ferving under Command. Eighthiy, That the First Captain to the Admiral and Commander in Chief of Our Fleet, and also the First Captain to Our Flag Officer appointed, or hereafter so be appointed, to command a Fleet or Squadron of Twenty Ships of the Line of Battle, and alfo the First Captain to Our Flag Officer appointed, or hereafter to be appointed, to command a Fleet or

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Squadron of Fifteen Ships of the Line of Batt (provided fuch last mentioned Fleet or Squadron thall be composed of His Majefty's own Ships,) shall be deemed and taken to be a Flag Officer, and fhall be intitled to a Part or Share of Prizes as the Junior Flag Officer of fuch Fleet or Squadron. And We do hereby further order, That in cafe of Cutters, Schooners, and other armed Veffels commanded by Lieutenants, the Share of fuch Lieutenants shall be Three Eighth Parts of the Prize, unlefs fuch Lieutenants shall be under the Command of a Flag Officer or Officers; in which Cafe the Flag Othicer or Officers shall have One of the faid Three Eighths, to be divided among fuch Flag Officer or Officers, in the Manaer herein before directed, in the Cafe of Captains ferving under Flag Officers. Secondly, We direct that the Share of the Master, or other Perfon acting as Second in Command, and the Pilot, (if there happens to be One on Board,) shall be One Eighth Part, to be divided into Three equal Parts, of which Two Thirds shall go to the Mafter or other Perfon acting as Second in Command, and the remaining One Third to the Pilot; but if there is no Pilot, then fuch Eighth Part to go wholly to the Master or Perfon acting as Second in Command. That the Share of the Chirurgeon, or Chirurgeon's Mate (where there is no Chirurgeon,) Midshipmen, and Clerk and Steward; shall be One Eighth ; that the Share of the Boatswain's, Gunner's, and Carpenter's Mates, Ycomen of the Sheets, Sailmaker, Quarter-Master, and Quarter-Master's Mate, shall be One Eighth ; and the Share of the Seamen, Marines, and other Perfons on Board, affifting in the Capture, shall be Two Eighth Parts. But it is Our Intention, neverthelefs, that the above Distribution shall only extend to such Captures as shall be made by any Cutter, Schooner, or Armed Veffel, without any of His Majetty's Ships or Veffels of War being prefent or within Sight of, and adding to the Encouragement of the Captors, and Terror of the Enemy: But in cafe any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels of War shall be present, or in Sight, that then the Officers, Pilots, Petty Officers, and Men on Board fuch Cutters and Schooners, or Armed Veffels, shall share in the same Proportion as is allowed to Perfons of the like Rank and Denomination on Blard His Majcity's Ships and Veilels of War.
