We cannot fufficiently express our Horror and Iadignation at an Attempt fo acrocious. We recog-nize in it the malignant Character and Effects of those detellable Principles, which are the Scourge and Difgrace of the Age we live in, and which have been diffeminated amongst your Majelly's Subjects, unhappily with too much Success, by ill-defigning Men.

. It is the natural Tendency of fuch Principles to create Difaffection againt'a Life which has uniformly been devoted to the best Interests of a civil Government, placed in a just Medium, unexampled among the Nations of the World, between the Extremes of defpotic Power and popular Licentioufnefs, and including in it the Security of Life, of Freedom, of Property, of Religion, of every Thing that is dear to Man.

We are fenfible that the Wickedness which we deplore is confined to a fmall Number of Perfons; and we truft in God that the reftlefs Endeavours of Scdition can never profper in a Country bleffed with fuch a Confitution, and amongft a grateful and loyal People, who know how to prize the Bleffings which they enjoy from it. We should be as much wanting in our Affection to our Country, as in our Duty to your Majety, if we did not earneftly pray for a long Continuance of your Majefty's Reign over us, and that you may long fee the good Effects of your mild, just and confcientious Administration of a legal Government.

May God's good Providence preferve your Majetty ; and may the Influence of his Holy Spirit aid and direct you in your Exertions to employ the Bowers entrutted to you for the Secarity and Happinefs of your People.
