Naples, Jan. 31.

Here is very little to write from hence, all we can tell you is, that they fay from Sicily, that their new Viceroy had caused the Inhabitants of Messina to be all disarmed, and had deprived them of several Priviledges, which they formetly enjoyed, and that by his order the Bells of the Cathedral Church at Messina had been taken away, and melted down.

Dantzicke, Febr. 8. We have Letters from Grodno of the 3d instant, which tell us, that the Moscovite Ambassador had had Audience in the Dyet; that the substance of his Oration to them was, to persuade them to enter into an Alliance with the Czar his Master, for the pursuing the War with their joint Forces against the Turks, and to that end, to represent to them the advantages the Crown of Poland might expect from such a conjunction of their Forces, to which the faid Ambalfador was answered in general terms onely, wiz. that they extremely valued the friendship and near Alliance of the Czar, and would on all occasions manifest that they did fo, and that as to the Overture he the Ambassador, made, it would require a serious consideration, before any answer were given in it, which when it is, will not it's believed, be to the satisfaction of the Moscovite; for the Poles, so lately got out of a great and dangerous War, seem not disposed to renew it at this time. The Letters add, that the Imperial Ambassador had likewise had Audience in the Dyet, to whom he had highly complained of the Polish Troops being sent to the assistance of the Rebels in Hungary, and prayed that the same might be redressed for the future. The difference be-tween the Crown General Wisnowitski, and the Chevalier Lubomirsky, is composed.

Ditto, Febr. 19. The Suedes, after having sustained

feveral great losses in their retreat, are at last got home with the remains of their Army. We are told, that they complain extremely of the Polcs, who they say had not only promised them assistance, but had even invited them to this march into Prussia, but that being come thither, they had been disap-pointed in all they expected from them, and therefore had been necessitated to make this hally retreat, in which they suffered very much from those of Lithuania. What loss they have sustained cannot be particularized; from Coningsberg they write, that of 12000 men which they entred into Prussia with, they have not brought above 3 or 4000 home again; but we must expect to hear what account the Sucdes will give of what has passed; and then we may be able to make a better judgment than as yet we can. The Elector of Brandenburg will now return for Pemeren, to be so much nearer the Negotiations which are faid to be on foot for the ma-king the Peace of the North. From Poland they write, that the Dyet would be determined in few days, though there had not when these Letters dame away, been any resolution taken in the great Point concerning the joining with the Moscovites in their present War against the Turks, &c.

Coningsberg, Febr. 10. A great many prisoners are daily brought hither, and to other places; and we are told that our Troops continue still to pursue the Enemy, who is certainly in a very ill condition, and yet perhaps not in so very ill an one as is said here. It is reported that our Elector hath written to Count Horne, General of the Suedes, to offer him free liberty for himself and his chief Officers to retire through his Territories whither they pleased, upon condition the common Soldiers laid down their Arms, and yielded themselves Prisoners of War, which they had reason to do, considering the condition they were in and that they that escaped the Sword, would in all likelihood be starved.

Ditto, February 17. Our Parties which purfixed the Enemy, and particularly that, commanded by Colonel Schoning, are coming back, having followed them as far as they thought convenient, and almost to the Frontiers of Livonia; from whence we have an account, that on the 10th instant the remainder of the Suedes Army, which might confist in 4 or 5000 men, passed by Mittaw, the Residence of the Duke of Courland, which is about seven Leagues from Riga. On Sunday last the Elector of Brandenburg returned hither, and it's believed will very suddenly take his way back towards Pomeren.

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Hamburg, Febr. 2.1. The Letters we receive by
the last Post from Prussia, do not agree in the account they give us of what had happened fince our former Letters; some say that Major-General Treffenfelt, and Major-General Schoning, having still purfued the Suedes, fell upon them in a Wood, where they had posted themselves, but that they were repulsed with confiderable loss; others say, that the Brandenburgs had obtained a fresh advantage against the Suedes, and had taken many prisoners, Colors, and Standards; but our next Letters will without doubt more clearly inform us of what has passed. There are Letters from Zell, which fay, that the Princes of Lunenburg were treating with France and Sueden; that they offered to restore Bremes to Sueden, upon condition that Pomeren should remain to the Elector of *Brandenburg*, who in confideration here-of will give the Country of *Regensteyn*, and part of that of *Halberstadt* to those Princes; but this we know not what credit to give to.

Strasburg, Febr. 20. Yesterday and the day before the Peace was published in all places in the upper and lower Alface, by order of Monsieur Monclar, who hath sent a Trumpet hither to significe the same to our Magistrates, and to the Commander of the Imperial Troops that are in Garison here, and to let them know that he expects the like will be done on this side. The Soldiers continue however to work on the Fortiscations of the Forts on the Rbine.

Cologne,

Cologne, Febr. 24. The Peace being published, and orders given for the ceasing of all Hostilities, the French Officers come hither with all liberty, to provide themselves with what they have occasion for. From Ments we are told, that the Duke of Lorraine demands great Sums of Money for the Winter-quarters of his Army from Ieveral places upon the Rhine. The Duke of Neuburg's second Son has for three days together treated Monsieur Calvo and all his principal Officers at Duseldorp.

Bruffels, Febr. 28. On Saturday last Lieutenant-General Agurto marched from hence towards Ghent, and the next day Count Salazar with his Regiment entred into, and took possessing of the Cittadel, and yesterday Monsieur Monthron marched with the Gatison out of the City, which at the same time was delivered up to Lieutenant-General Agurto. On Thursday next Courtray will be likewise coxcusted. On Saturday or Sunday next his Excellincy goes for Ghent, to settle the affairs of that Province, and upon his return hither will receive the Order of the Golden Fleece. This day arrived the Spanish Ordinary, the Letters from Madrid say, that the Marriage between the King of Spain and Madamoiselle d'Orleans is concluded, and that several Ladies who are to be of her Majessies Family, are

already appointed.

Antwerp, Febr. 28. Last night arrived here part of the Train and Equipage of the Marquis de los Balbaces from Nimeguen, which will be soon followed by his Excellency himself; the occasion of whose Embassie is now publickly declared to be about the Kings marriage, which our Letters from Madrid, arrived this day, fay, is absolutely concluded, and that the new Queens Houshold is not onely established, but that several Ladies of the first Quality are appointed to attend her at her reception on the Frontiers. The faid Letters add, that the Kings intended journy to Valencia and Catalonia is put off, those Provinces having intimated that they are not ih a condition to receive his Majesty with that splendor and Magnificence that becomes his Royal Per-ford. That the Duke de Medina Celi is appointed to finceed the Conde de Mefellin in the President-Thip of the Council of the Indies; that the Marquis de Sagunas, Brother to the Duke of that name, is made Viceroy of Galicia in the room of the Duke de Verraguas, who is made Viceroy of Valencia, and that the Duke de Sr. German is dead. We have had in great'a Flood in this Country for some days, that there has been no passing between this place and Bruffels. The Dyke of the Bruffels Canal is broken in three or four places by the force of the Waters, and fone hundreds of the people are at work night and day to repair the breaches, which its hoped they will have done in a day or two.

Hagne, Febr. 24. The States of Holland have been affembled fince Wednesday, their deliberations hitherto have chiefly concerned the regulation and improvement of their Revenues. It is said that the next week will be taken into deliberation the demand which is very much pressed by the Spaniards, of having Maesfricht delivered up to them. Here is a discourse as if the Heer Odyke, and the Heer Dickwest, will be called home from France, and that the Freer Borees will remain there alone. The States General are much dissatisfied at the Province of Groningen having resused to call an Assembly of the States, at the request of their Deputies,

and yet more at their refusing when they shall meet, to receive them in their Assembly; but the States General have ordered their said Deputies to repair to Groningen, against the time that the States are to assemble there, and to insist to be received into their Assembly. From Prussia they write, that a party of Brandenburgs, who pursued the Suedes somewhat too closely, had been repulsed with confiderable loss.

Ditto, Febr, 28. The French Ambassadors at Nimeguen having declared that if the King of Dinmark and the Elicot of Brandenburg do not make their peace with Suiden before the end of the next month, the King their Matter will demand of the latter the restitution of Linstadt to the Elector of Cologne, and of both, the reinbursement of the charges he shall be at in continuing the War for the procuring the satisfaction of Sueden. From Francfort they write, that the Ministers of Denmark, Brandenburg, and Lunenburg, were attived there, to assist at the Assembly of Allies that was appointed to be held in that City, which it's believed will now since the Peace is singned, be put off. The Duke of Loriain is said to be very much distatisfied with the said Peace.

Parts, March 1. The Abbot d'Estrades is parted hence on his way to Tarin, whither he goes in quality of Ambassador; it's said he is to negotiate certain important matters. The Dauphin comes often to divert himself here, and yesterday he was at the Opera; from Hancur we have an account, that the Suedes have sustained very great lesses in their retreat, and that of the Army they entred into Prassian with, there remains not above 3000. From Cologue they write, that the Peace had been published there the 17 past; and that Monsieur Calvo had given orders for the ceasing of all Hosti-

lities against that City.
