the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt-Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt-Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition:" — And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

any Time, for the Space of Six Months from the said 10th Day of this instant December, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry or convey, or lade or lay on Board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of this Kingdom, any of the Wood called Lignum Vitæ, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury respecting the Exportation of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes; for preventing Suits in consequence of the same; for authorizing His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying Coastwise of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, and for making further Provisions relative thereto." The Time chosen, when your Majesty was passing to your Parliament in the Midst of unsuspecting and loyal Multitudes, afforded a proper Opportunity for Concealment; the unmerited Insults of an insatuated Rabble, all uniting in the same savage Outcries of Disaffection and Disloyalty, continued and repeated with the unabated Rage of Malice and Disappointment to the very Doors of your Majesty's Palace; these are Circumstances strongly marking the Direction of Aiders and Abettors of a premeditated Plan: Not to mention the unexpected Confusion which a Deed of so much Horror, had it taken Place, must have produced in the Midst of the just and necessary War in which we are engaged.

We are extremely concerned to remark that political Jealousies, which have no Foundation but in the Misrepresentations of a few, should, in any of your Majesty's Subjects, have prevailed over the better and stronger Principles of Religion and Humanity.

We trust, however, that out of this detestable Enormity much Good may arise. The Minds of all your Majesty's best Subjects, by far the Majority of the Nation, will, in Abhorrence of such Violence, be more firmly united in the Defence of your Person and Government. Your faithful Parliament, to whom the Security of the whole Community is intrusted, who are the most considerable and the best-informed Part of your People, will meet the seditious Spirit of the Times with the proper Restraint of a salutary Law, effectually checking in future all unwarrantable and arbitrary Attempts to destroy our excellent Constitution, and to rob us of those invaluable Liberties which this Country, above all others, has so long and so happily enjoyed under that Protection.

Under all these Considerations it is our bounden Duty, with the Rest of our Fellow Subjects, if this Nation is worthy of so great a Blessing, earnestly and devoutly to pray that the same good Providence of God, which has so wonderfully preserved our much-loved Sovereign in the Hour of imminent Danger, will, through a long and prosperous Reign over us, continue to be his Defender and Keeper, and give him Victory over all his Enemies.
