AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 30th of December, 1795,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 12th Day of August last, for prohibiting the exporting out of this Kingdom any Sort of Rock Salt whatsoever, expired upon the 25th Day of this instant December; And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer: His Majesty therefore, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do, at any Time during the Space of Eight Weeks, to commence from the said 25th Day of this instant December, directly or indirectly, export, transport, carry or convey, or cause or procure to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of or from any Port or Place in Great Britain, or load or lay on Board, or cause or procure to be laden or laid on Board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of any Port or Place in Great Britain, any Sort of Rock Salt whatsoever, except as excepted in His Majesty's former Order in Council of the 12th of August last, and subject to the Conditions therein expressed.— And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners

of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.
