after the Thirtieth Day of September, One Thou fand Seven Hundred and Ninety-fix, shall be of any Force or Effect : And His Majefty is hereby further pleafed to order, That the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of any Ship or Veffel to whom fuch Licence shall be granted, shall, upon the Arrival of the faid Ship or Veffel at the Port, Harbour or Place in the Ifland of Newfoundland where he shall discharge fuch Bread, Flour, Indian Corn or Live Stock, deliver up the faid Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Cuftoms there, having first indorfed on the Back of fuch Licence the Marks, Numbers and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, and the Number of Live Stock, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture in the faid A& mentioned. And the Collector or other proper Officer of the Cuftoms at Newfoundland is hereby enjoined and required to give a Certificate to the Malter, or Perfon having the Charge or Command of fuch Ship or Veffel, of his having received the faid Licence, fo indorfed as before directed, and to transmit the fame to the Commiffioners of His Majefty's Cuftoms in England or Scotland, or to the Commissioners of His Majefty's Revenue in Ireland, respectively, by whom fuch Licence was granted.

Now be it known that the faid [Perfon's Name] hath Licence to lade on board the faid Ship [Ship's Name], at and from any Port or Place belonging to the United States of America, Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, the Produce of the faid United States, and no other Article whatfoever, and to carry the faid Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock to fome Port or Place in the Island of Newfoundland ; and on the Arrival of the faid Ship at any Port, Harbour, or Place of Discharge in Newfoundland, the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of the faid Ship, is required and enjoined to deliver up the faid Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of His Majefty's Cuftoms there, and to indorfe on the Back thereof the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, and the Number of Live Stock, and shall thereupon receive a Certificate thereof from the faid Collector or other. proper Officer of the Cuftoms.

## Whitehall, February 2.

As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, bave, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majeflies King George the First and Second and of His prefent Majefly, for preventing fuch Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons whe may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Difobedience to them : And it will be observed, that fuch Penalties likewife extend to those who are any ways concerned or infrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufasturers out of theje Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themfelves.

## Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

I F any Perfon fhall contract with, entice, or folicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brafs, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Atificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and fhall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Weftminfter, or at the Affizes or Quarter-Seffions, he fhall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the firlt Offence, and fhall be imprifoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Perfon having been once convicted fhall offend again he fhall be fined at the Difcretion of the Court, and imprifoned,
