Captures of the Cape of Good Hope and of Trincomalé by His Majesty's Forces, and the decided Suyeriory of his Fleets, are of the utmost Importance to the Common Caufe, and their Effect must be strengthened by the internal Distresses, the ruined Commerce and increasing financial Embarraffments, which the desperate and unhappy Policy

of the Enemy has brought upon their Country. We learn with the highest Satisfaction, that the Crifis lately depending in France has led to an Order of Things in that Country, fuch as will induce His Majesty to meet any Disposition to Negotiation on the Part of the Enemy, with an earnest Defire to give it the fullest and speediest Effect, and to conclude a Treaty of general Peace when it may be effected on just and fuitable Terms for himself and his Allies.

We humbly thank your Excellency for directing the Treaty of Commerce between His Majetty and the United States of America to be laid before us.

The fafe Delivery of Her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales, and the Birth of a Princess, are Events, which, upon every Confideration, give us

the highest Satisfaction.

We look with Indignation and Horror to those fecret and treasonable Associations, the dangerous Extent and Malignancy of which have in fome De-gree been disclosed on several Trials, and to the Disturbances which have taken Place in some Parts of the Kingdom; and we acknowledge with Gratitude the unremitted Attention and spirited Assistance which your Excellency has given to the Sup-pression of those Outrages. We have observed with great Satisfaction the fuccessful and meritorious Exertions of the Magistrates in feveral Parts of the King-dom, and the Alacriny which His Majesty's Redom, and the Alacrity which His Majesty's Regular and Militia Forces have universally manifelled in Aid of the Civil Power whenever they have been called upon for the Prefervation of the Peace and the Support of the Law. Your Excellency may depend upon our chearful Co-eperation; and we trust that a Continuance of Exertion with fuch additional Powers as have been already established, and may by the Wisdom of the Legislature be created to meet the Evil, will prevent the Return of fimilar Excesses, and reflore a due Reverence for the Laws.

The superior Importance of the Agriculture and Manufactures of the Kingdom, increasing under the auspicious Instuence of our happy Constitution, and the mild Protection of His Majesty's Government, shall command our accustomed Support; and we will not fail in our Attention to the Protestant Charter Schools and other Institutions of publick

Charity and Improvement.

We are especially bound to thank your Excellency for your humane Benevolence in calling our Vigilance and Attention to the general Staie of Profions. Should Circumstances render the Interposition of the Legislature adviscable, we shall adopt fuch Measures as may be applicable to the existing Necessity of the Times.

We are fully sensible of His Majesty's Goodness in continuing your Excellency in the Government of this Kingdom, perluaded that in your Excellency's Hands it will ever be conducted with that Wisdom, Firmnels and Benignity, of which we have had fuch happy Experience

We shall manifest that Spirit of Unanimity and Zeal which is of to great Importance at the prefent

Crisis, in order to impress the Enemy with a thorough Convictions of the Resources of His Majesty's Kingdoms, and to procure a favourable Termination to His Majesty's just and honourable Efforts. We intreat your Excellency to represent in their full Light our faithful Duty and affectionate Loyalty to His Majesty's Royal Person, Family and Government; and to assure His Majesty that he may place the most entire Reliance on our Firmness and Attachment, and on the Fortitude, Spirit and Perseverance of his People of Ireland.
