A PROCLAMATION.
GEORGE R.

WHEREAS on the Night of the First of this instant Month of February, some Person unknown, in Company with a few other Persons, to the Number of Twelve or thereabouts, in a Part of Covent Garden, opposite Southampton Street, in Our City of Westminster, threw a Stone, Brick, or other hard Substance, which struck with great Violence one of Our Servants, then standing behind Our Carriage, in which We, together with Our Royal Consort, were then returning from the Theatre in Drury Lane: And whereas afterwards on the same Night, whilst We were so returning, some Person unknown threw with great Violence into Our said Carriage a very sharp-edged and dangerous Flint Stone, as Our said Carriage was passing along Pall Mall, in Our said City of Westminster, and opposite to John Street, which Stone broke one of the Glasses of Our said Carriage, and afterwards fell in Our said Carriage; and the Acts aforesaid were done in Violation of the Public Peace, and to the actual Danger of the Royal Persons of Us and Our Royal Consort, and are highly criminal and traiterous: We therefore, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, do hereby enjoin all Magistrates, and all other Our loving Subjects, to use their utmost Endeavours to discover and cause to be apprehended the Persons concerned in such traiterous Outrages, in order that

they may be dealt with according to Law. And We hereby promise, that any Person or Persons, concerned in the said traiterous Outrages, other than such Person or Persons as actually committed the said Acts of Violence, or either of them, by which the Royal Persons of Us and Our Royal Consort were immediately endangered, who shall give Information, so that any other or others of the Persons concerned therein, or offending as aforesaid, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, shall receive a Reward of ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, to be paid on Conviction of every such Offender; which said Sum of ONE THOUSAND POUNDS the Lords Commissioners of Our Treasury are hereby required and directed to pay accordingly: And We do further promise, that any Person or Persons concerned in such traiterous Outrages as aforesaid, other than such as actually committed the said Acts of Violence, or either of them, who shall give Information, so as that any other or others of the Persons concerned therein, or offending as aforesaid, shall be apprehended and brought to Justice, shall, upon Conviction of such Offender or Offenders, receive Our most gracious Pardon.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Fifth Day of February, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-six, in the Thirty-sixth Year of Our Reign.

AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 13th of *January*, 1796,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Twenty-eighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in North America and in the West India Islands, and the Countries belonging to the United States of America, and between His Majesty's said Subjects and the Foreign Islands in the West Indies," it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order or Orders to be issued and published from Time to Time, to authorize, or by Warrant or Warrants, under His Sign Manual, to empower the Governor of Newfoundland for the Time being to authorize, in case of Necessity, the Importation into Newfoundland of Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the then ensuing Season only; provided always, that such Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, so authorized to be imported into the Island of Newfoundland, shall not be imported except in conformity to such Rules, Regulations and Restrictions as shall be specified in such Order or Orders, Warrant or Warrants, respectively, and except by British Subjects and in British-built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law. And whereas it is expedient and necessary that Provision be made for fully supplying the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season, with Bread, Flour, Indian Corn and Live Stock; His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season only, Bread, Flour, Indian Corn and Live Stock be imported into the said Island from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, by British Subjects, and in British-built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, and which shall, within the Space of Seven Months previous to the Time of such Importation, have cleared out from some Port in Great Britain, or some other Port of His Majesty's Dominions in Europe, for which Purpose a Licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or

the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, or any other Person or Persons who may be duly authorized in that Kingdom respectively, in the Manner and Form herein after mentioned; which Licences shall continue and be in Force for Seven Calendar Months from the Day of the Date upon which they are respectively granted, and no longer; provided that no such Licence as aforesaid, granted after the Thirtieth Day of September, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Ninety-six, shall be of any Force or Effect: And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, That the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of any Ship or Vessel to whom such Licence shall be granted, shall, upon the Arrival of the said Ship or Vessel at the Port, Harbour or Place in the Island of Newfoundland where he shall discharge such Bread, Flour, Indian Corn or Live Stock, deliver up the said Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs there, having first indorsed on the Back of such Licence the Marks, Numbers and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, and the Number of Live Stock, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture in the said Act mentioned. And the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs at Newfoundland is hereby enjoined and required to give a Certificate to the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of such Ship or Vessel, of his having received the said Licence, so indorsed as before directed, and to transmit the same to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, respectively, by whom such Licence was granted.

 to the Collector or other proper Officer of His Ma-
 jesty's Customs there, and to indorse on the Back
 thereof the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each

Permit us to repeat our Assurances to your Majesty, that it shall be our constant Endeavour to instil into the Minds of the Youth intrusted to our Care, those Principles, which may form in them a religious and well-founded Attachment to the Constitution of our Country, and render them duly sensible of the Obligations they are under for its Preservation and Maintenance to the mild and auspicious Government of your Majesty, and the Princes of your illustrious House.
