British Subjects and in British-built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law. And whereas it is expedient and necessary that Provision be made for fully supplying the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season, with Bread, Flour, Indian Corn and Live Stock; His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season only, Bread, Flour, Indian Corn and Live Stock be imported into the said Island from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, by British Subjects, and in British-built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, and which shall, within the Space of Seven Months previous to the Time of such Importation, have cleared out from some Port in Great Britain, or some other Port of His Majesty's Dominions in Europe, for which Purpose a Licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, or any other Person or Persons who may be duly authorized in that Kingdom respectively, in the Manner and Form herein after mentioned; which Licences shall continue and be in Force for Seven Calendar Months from the Day of the Date upon which they are respectively granted, and no longer; provided that no such Licence as aforesaid, granted after the Thirtieth Day of September, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Ninety-six, shall be of any Force or Effect: And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, That the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of any Ship or Vessel to whom such Licence shall be granted, shall, upon the Arrival of the said Ship or Vessel at the Port, Harbour or Place in the Island of Newfoundland where he shall discharge such Bread, Flour, Indian Corn or Live Stock, deliver up the said Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs there, having first indorsed on the Back of such Licence the Marks, Numbers and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, and the Number of Live Stock, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture in the said Act mentioned.
