WE, taking into Our most serious Consideration the just and necessary War in which We are engaged, and putting Our Trust in Almighty God that He will graciously bless Our Arms, both by Sea and Land, have resolved, and do, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, That a Publick Fast and Humiliation be observed throughout that Part of Our Kingdom of Great Britain called England, Our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, on Wednesday the Ninth Day of March next; that so both We and Our People may humble Ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain Pardon of Our Sins, and may in the most devout and solemn Manner send up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty, for averting those heavy Judgments which Our manifold Sins and Provocations have most justly deserved; and imploring His Blessing and Assistance on Our Arms, and for restoring and perpetuating Peace, Safety and Prosperity to Us and Our Kingdoms: And We do strictly charge and command, That the said Publick Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in England, Our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His

Wrath and Indignation, and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as contemn and neglect the Performance of so religious and necessary a Duty. And for the better and more orderly solemnizing the same, We have given Directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops, and the Right Reverend the Bishops of England, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to this Occasion, to be used in all Churches, Chapels, and Places of Publick Worship; and to take Care the same be timely dispersed throughout their respective Dioceses.

WHEREAS on the Night of the First of this instant Month of February, some Person unknown, in Company with a few other Persons, to the Number of Twelve or thereabouts, in a Part of Covent Garden, opposite Southampton Street, in Our City of Westminster, threw a Stone, Brick, or other hard Substance, which struck with great Violence one of Our Servants, then standing behind Our Carriage, in which We, together with Our Royal Consort, were then returning from the Theatre in Drury Lane: And whereas afterwards on the same Night, whilst We were so returning, some Person unknown threw with great Violence into Our said Carriage a very sharp-edged and dangerous Flint

Stone, as Our said Carriage was passing along Pall Mall, in Our said City of Westminster, and opposite to John Street, which Stone broke one of the Glasses of Our said Carriage, and afterwards fell in Our said Carriage; and the Acts aforesaid were done in Violation of the Public Peace, and to the actual Danger of the Royal Persons of Us and Our Royal Consort, and are highly criminal and traitorous: We therefore, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, do hereby enjoin all Magistrates, and all other Our loving Subjects, to use their utmost Endeavours to discover and cause to be apprehended the Persons concerned in such traitorous Outrages, in order that they may be dealt with according to Law. And We hereby promise, that any Person or Persons, concerned in the said traitorous Outrages, other than such Person or Persons as actually committed the said Acts of Violence, or either of them, by which the Royal Persons of Us and Our Royal Consort were immediately endangered, who shall give Information, so that any other or others of the Persons concerned therein, or offending as aforesaid, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, shall receive a Reward of ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, to be paid on Conviction of every such Offender; which said Sum of ONE THOUSAND POUNDS the Lords Commissioners of Our Treasury are hereby required and directed to pay accordingly: And We do further promise, that any Person or Persons concerned in such traitorous Outrages as aforesaid, other than such as actually committed the said Acts of Violence, or either of them, who shall give Information, so as that any other or others of the Persons concerned therein, or offending as aforesaid, shall be apprehended and brought to Justice, shall, upon Conviction of such Offender or Offenders, receive Our most gracious Pardon.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 30th Day of December last, for prohibiting the exporting out of this Kingdom any Sort of Rock Salt whatsoever, will expire upon the 19th Day of this Instant February: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty therefore,

therefore, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, That no Person or Persons whatsoever do, at any Time during the Space of Four Weeks, to commence from the said 19th Day of this instant February, directly or indirectly, export, transport, carry or convey, or cause or procure to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of or from any Port or Place in Great Britain, or load or lay on Board, or cause or procure to be laden or laid on Board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of any Port or Place in Great Britain, any Sort of Rock-Salt whatsoever, except as excepted in His Majesty's former Order in Council of the 12th of August, 1795, and subject to the Conditions therein expressed. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Twentieth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in North America and in the West India Islands, and the Countries belonging to the United States of America, and between His Majesty's said Subjects and the Foreign Islands in the West Indies," it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order or Orders to be issued and published from Time to Time, to authorize, or by Warrant or Warrants, under His Sign Manual, to empower the Governor of Newfoundland for the Time being to authorize, in case of Necessity, the Importation into Newfoundland of Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the then ensuing Season only; provided always, that such Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, so authorized to be imported into the Island of Newfoundland, shall not be imported except in conformity to such Rules, Regulations and Restrictions as shall be specified in such Order or Orders, Warrant or Warrants, respectively, and except by

British Subjects and in British-built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law. And whereas it is expedient and necessary that Provision be made for fully supplying the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season, with Bread, Flour, Indian Corn and Live Stock; His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season only, Bread, Flour, Indian Corn and Live Stock be imported into the said Island from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, by British Subjects, and in British-built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, and which shall, within the Space of Seven Months previous to the Time of such Importation, have cleared out from some Port in Great Britain, or some other Port of His Majesty's Dominions in Europe, for which Purpose a Licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, or any other Person or Persons who may be duly authorized in that Kingdom respectively, in the Manner and Form herein after mentioned; which Licences shall continue and be in Force for Seven Calendar Months from the Day of the Date upon which they are respectively granted, and no longer; provided that no such Licence as aforesaid, granted after the Thirtieth Day of September, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Ninety-six, shall be of any Force or Effect: And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, That the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of any Ship or Vessel to whom such Licence shall be granted, shall, upon the Arrival of the said Ship or Vessel at the Port, Harbour or Place in the Island of Newfoundland where he shall discharge such Bread, Flour, Indian Corn or Live Stock, deliver up the said Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs there, having first indorsed on the Back of such Licence the Marks, Numbers and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, and the Number of Live Stock, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture in the said Act mentioned. And the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs at Newfoundland is hereby enjoined and required to give a Certificate to the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of such Ship or Vessel, of his having received the said Licence, so indorsed as before directed, and to transmit the same to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or to the Commissioners of

His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, respectively, by whom such Licence was granted.

Now be it known that the said [Person's Name] hath Licence to lade on board the said Ship [Ship's Name], at and from any Port or Place belonging to the United States of America, Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, the Produce of the said United States, and no other Article whatsoever, and to carry the said Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock to some Port or Place in the Island of Newfoundland; and on the Arrival of the said Ship at any Port, Harbour, or Place of Discharge in Newfoundland, the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of the said Ship, is required and enjoined to deliver up the said Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of His Majesty's Customs there, and to indorse on the Back thereof the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, and the Number of Live Stock, and shall thereupon receive a Certificate thereof from the said Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs.

Licence to import Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, the Produce of the United States of America, into Newfoundland. *W. F.*

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December, 1792, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by his said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February, 1793, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Twenty-eighth Day of this instant February; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended, from the said Twenty-eighth Day of this instant February to the Thirtieth Day of April, next, inclusive: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly. *W. Fawkenner.*

AT a Court of Directors of the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies, held the 19th of February, 1796,

The following DECLARATION, on the Part of the Court, was agreed to and signed, viz.

UPON the great and important Question relative to the Shipping Concerns of the Company, submitted to the General Court on Wednesday the 17th Instant, the Court of Directors think it their indispensable Duty to declare, that all Papers necessary for determining the Question proposed to the General Court were annexed to their Reports, circulated to the Proprietors a Week before, and that all other Papers relative to Shipping were ready to be produced to the General Court; that the Papers referred to, in the Question to be ballotted for, are Papers merely of ordinary Detail of Proceedings, and do not furnish any new Ground of Information for the Decision of the Question so highly important to the Interest of the Proprietors, the Company and the Public, which Papers, nevertheless, have been for some Time past preparing, and will all be printed by Tuesday next; and moreover, that, by the Adoption of the Amendment by the General Court, the Whole of the main Question for confirming the Reports of the Court of Directors is, for the present at least, done away: The Court of Directors therefore trust and hope, that the Proprietors will support the Executive Body, by voting against the Question now to be ballotted for, in order that there may be no further Delay in coming to a decided Opinion whether the System brought forward in the said Reports is or is not fitting to be carried into immediate Execution.
