Then, by His Majesty's Command, Rear Admiral Christian was introduced into the Royal Presence, between Lord Bridport and the Right Hon. Sir George Yonge, the Two Junior Knights Companions present, preceded by the Gentleman Usher of the Order, with Reverences as before.

The Sword of State was delivered to the Sovereign by Sir William Gordon, the Second Knight Companion in Seniority present, and Admiral Christian kneeling was knighted therewith. His Royal Highness the Duke of York, Senior Knight, then presented the Ribbon and Badge to the King, and His Majesty put them over the Admiral's Right Shoulder, who, being thus invested, had the Honor to kiss the Sovereign's Hand; and the Procession returned to the Privy Chamber in the Order as aforesaid.

This Ceremony was performed in His Majesty's Closet, several of the Great Officers of the Court and Foreign Ministers being present.
