

unless by the exprefs Permission of His Majesty, signified under the Hand of One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State:—And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, by and with the Advice aforefaid, that Notice of this Order shall be printed in different Languages, and shall be affixed in public Places in the different Ports of this Kingdom, and shall alfo be delivered by the Custom-House Officers to the Master of every fuch Ship, Veffel or Boat arriving at any Port or Place in this Kingdom, except as aforefaid, and to all Foreigners arriving in any fuch Ship, Veffel or Boat: Provided always, That this Order shall not extend to any Foreign Ambaffador, or other Public Minifter duly authorized, or the Servants actually attendant upon any fuch Ambaffador or Public Minifter, or any Alien Merchant, being fuch within the true Intent and Meaning of the faid Act of the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, or any domeftic Servant of any natural-born Subject of His Majesty, or of any Subject to whom Letters of Denization have been or fhall be hereafter granted, or any domeftic Servant of any of His Majesty's Subjects who now are or fhall hereafter be naturalized by Act of Parliament, fuch Servants refpectively being actually and bona fide employed in the Service of their refpective Masters, and actually at the Time attendant upon their refpective Masters; nor to any Mariner, actually engaged and employed in the Navigation of any Ship or Veffel, during the Time that fuch Mariner fhall remain fo actually engaged and employed, and certified, in the Manner in the faid Act mentioned, to be fuch Mariner, by the Master or Commander of fuch Ship or Veffel upon his Arrival in any fuch Port or Place as aforefaid. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commiffioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commiffioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the neceffary Directions herein as to them may refpectively appertain.

The KING's Moft Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 12th Day of February laft, for prohibiting the exporting out of this Kingdom any Sort of Rock Salt whatsoever, will expire upon the 18th Day of this instant March: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the faid Prohibition fhould be continued for fome Time longer; His Majesty

therefore, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, That no Perfon or Perfons whatsoever do, at any Time during the Space of Four Weeks, to commence from the faid 18th Day of this instant March, directly or indirectly, export, transport, carry or convey, or caufe or procure to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of or from any Port or Place in Great Britain, or load or lay on Board, or caufe or procure to be laden or laid on Board of any Ship, Veffel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of any Port or Place in Great Britain, any Sort of Rock Salt whatsoever, except as excepted in His Majesty's former Order in Council of the 12th of Auguft, 1795, and fubject to the Conditions therein expreffed. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commiffioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commiffioners of the Admiralty, and Lord the Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the neceffary Directions herein, as to them may refpectively appertain.

THIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was fent to the Honourable Houfe of Commons by Mr. Quarme, the Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majesty's Commiffion for declaring His Royal Affent to feveral Acts agreed upon by both Houfes, do defire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable Houfe in the Houfe of Peers, to hear the Commiffion read; and the Commons being come thither, the faid Commiffion, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and feveral other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Affent to the faid Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Affent given to*

An Act for defraying the Charge of the Pay and Cloathing of the Militia of that Part of Great Britain called England for One Year, beginning the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thoufand feven hundred and ninety-fix.

An Act to continue feveral Laws relating to the giving further Encouragement to the Importation of Naval Stores from the British Colonies in America; to the Encouragement of the Silk Manufactures; and for taking off feveral Duties on Merchandize exported, and reducing other Duties, to the preventing the clandestine Running of Goods, and the Danger of Infection thereby; to the encouraging the Growth of Coffee in His Majesty's Plantations in America; to the free Importation of Cochineal and Indigo; to the granting a Bounty on certain Species of British and Irish Linens exported, and taking off the Duties on the Importation of Foreign Raw Linen Yarns made of Flax; to the importing Salt from Europe into
