PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-fixth Day of December, 1792, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every fuch Able and Ordinary-Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raifing Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by his said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should fo enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Mafty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty jwas also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the faid Month of February, 1793, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to ferve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, fo that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majefly's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majefty's Sea Officers appointed to raife Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time 1 imited by the faid Proclamations for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirtieth Day of this instant April; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended, from the faid Thirtieth Day of this instant April, to the Thirtieth Day of June next, inclusive: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themfelves accordingly.

HIS Day the Lords being met, a Meffage was fent to the Honourable House of Commons by Mr. Quarme, the Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do defire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the faid Commission, impowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and feveral other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Affent to the faid Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Affent given to

An Act for repealing certain Duties on Legacies an I Shares of Personal Estates, and for granting

other Duties thereon, in certain Cases. An Act to indemnify fuch Persons as have omitted to qualify themselves for Offices and Employments; and to indemnify Justices of the Peace and others who have omitted to register or deliver in their Q a ifications within the Time limited by Law, and for giving further Time for those Purposes; and to indemnify Members and Officers in Cities, Corporations and Borough Towns, whose Admiffions have been omitted to be stamped according to Law, or, having been stamped, have been lost or missial, and for allowing them Time to provide Ad-missions duly stamped; to give further Time to such Persons as have omitted to make and file Assidavits of the Execution of Indentures of Clerks to Attornies and Solicitors; and for indemnifying Deputy Lieutenants and Officers of the Militia who have neglected to transmit Descriptions of their Qualifications to the Clerks of the Peace within the Time limited by Law, and for allowing further Time for that Purpose.

An Act to continue the Laws now in Force for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majetty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the Territories belonging to the United States of America, fo far as the fame relate to the Trade and Commerce carried on between this Kingdom and the Inhabitants of the Countries belonging to the faid United States.

An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order of His Majesty in Council respecting the Exportation of Rock Salt; for preventing Suits in confequence of the fame; for authorizing His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying Coastwife of Rock Salt; and for making further Provisions relative thereto.

An Act to enable His Majesty to grant to George Finch Hatton, Esquire, his Heirs and Assigns, in Fee Simple, all the Estate, Right, Title and Interest remaining in His Majesty in and upon the Lawn of Benefield, and the Bailiwick of Rockingham, in the Forest of Rockingham in the County of Northampton, upon a full and adequate Confideration to be paid for the fame.

An Act to regulate the making and vending of Metal Buttons, and to prevent the Purchafers thereof from being deceived in the real Quality of fuch

An Act for further continuing and amending the feveral Acts, passed for preventing the Frauds and Abuses committed in the Admeasurement of Coals within the City and Liberty of Westminster, and that Part of the Duchy of Lancaster adjoining thereto, and the feveral Parishes of Saint Giles in the Fields and Saint Mary-le-bone, and fuch Part of the Parith of Saint Andrew, Holborn, as lies in the County of Middlesex.

An Act to amend an Act of the Thirtieth Year of His present Majesty, for making and maintaining a navigable Canal from Merthyr Tidvile, to and through a Place called the Bank, near the Town of Cardiff, in the County of Glamorgan; and for extending the faid Canal to a Place called the Lower Layer; below the faid Town.

An Act to explain and amend an Act, passed in the Thirty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majefty, intituled, An Act for making and maintaining a navigable Canal from the River Severn, at Shrewibury, in the County of Salop, to the River Merfey, at or near Netherpool, in the County of Chefter; and also for making and maintaining certain collateral Cuts from the said intended Canal; and for varying and altering certain Parts of the Whitchurch Line of the faid Canal and collateral Cuts, and for extending the fame from Franckton Common to Sherryman's Bridge, in the Parish of Whitchurch, in the faid County of Salop; and for making and maintaining feveral other Branches and collateral Cuts to communicate therewith.

An Act for dividing, allotting, inclosing, draining and preserving certain Commons and Waste Grounds, called the Hern Common and Gore Common, within the Manor and Parish of Ramsey, in the County of Huntingdon; and for repealing an Act, made in the Thirtieth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, An Act for draining and preferving certain Fen Lands and Low Grounds in the feveral Parishes of Ramfey, Bury, Wistow, Warboys, Farceitt, Standground, and Water Newton, in the County of Huntingdon, and of Doddington, in the Isle of Ely and County of Cambridge; and for making more effectual Provision for those Purposes.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of certain Acts of Parliament, made for repairing the feveral Roads in the Counties of Stafford, Worcester and Warwick, so far as relates to the Road leading from a Place called Streetway, in the County of Stafford, through Wolverhampton, to Wordsley Green Gate, and other Roads therein mentioned.

An Act for continuing and enlarging the T. 7m and Powers of an Act, passed in the Seventh Year of His present Majesty's Reign, for repairing and widening feveral Roads leading to and from the Towns of Bala and Dolgelly, in the County of Merioneth, and other Roads therein mentioned in the Counties of Montgomery, Denbigh and Salop; and for repairing several other Roads in the Counties of Merioneth and Denbigh.

An Act for altering, widening, improving and keeping in Repair the Road leading from Maccleifield, by Broken Crofs, to Congleton, all in the County Palatine of Cnester.

ISPATCHES, of which the following are Copies and Extract, have been received at this Office from Sir Edward Pellew, Bart.

Extract of a Letter from Sir Edward Pellew, Captain of His Majesty's Ship Indefatigable, to Mr. Nepean, dated at Falmouth, April 20, 1796.

HAVE the Pleasure to inform their Lordships that on the 13th Instant, at Four P. M. we fell in with, and gave general Chace to a French Frigate to Windward, the Revolutionnaire being far aftern, was tacked by Signal to cut the Chace from the Shore; and I had the Pleasure to see her, just before Dark, in a Situation to weather the Enemy upon a different Board, which obliged her also to tack

The Night fetting in cloudy, we loft Sight of the Chace before Nine o'Clock, when the bore up, but not unobserved by that zealous and attentive Officer Captain Cole, who purfued and closed with her at half patt Eleven; and not being able to prevail upon her Commander to furrender without Refistance, he opened a close and well-directed Fire supon her, which was faintly returned; and, after a fecond Broadfide, the Enemy struck, and proved to be the National Frigate La Unité, from L'Orient to Rochfort, mounting 38 Guns, Twelve and Six Pounders, and manned with 255 Men, Eight or Nine of whom were flain, and Eleven or Twelve desperately wound-La Revolutionnaire happily had no Men hurt; and it appears that the was manœuvered by Captain Cole in the most Officer like Manner, and the Attack made with great Gallantry

I have the Honor to inclose the Report which he has made of the good Conduct of his Officers and Ship's Company upon this Occasion; and, from the high Terms in which he speaks of his First Lieutenant Mr. Ellicott, who I know to be a good Officer, I have thought proper to give him an Order to com-mand the Prize to England.

La Unité was reputed one of the greatest Sailers in the French Navy, and is a very fine Frigate, only

The Wife of the Governor of the Port of Rochfort, Madame Le Large, and her Family, were on Board, who, with her Son, an Enfign of the Ship, I fuffered to return to France in a Neutral Vessel, taking the Parole of the young Man not to ferve until exchanged.

La Revolutionaire, at Sea, April 13, 1796.

SIR, T being fo dark when I came alongfide the French Frigate L'Unité that you could not observe the Conduct of the Two Ships, I beg Leave to report to you, that not being able to prevail upon her Commander, Citizen Durand, to furrender, after fome Minutes Conversation, I opened a close and well-directed Fire upon him. After we had sustained the Fire of his Stern Chases some Time, and upon firing the second Broadside, he called out that he had struck. I had at the same Moment directed the Helm to be put to Port, in order to board him, as the Ships were going under a Press of Sail at the Rate of Ten Knots, and drawing near the Shore.

Allow me, Sir, to express to you how much I feel myself obliged to my First Lieutenant Edward Ellicott, for his very particular Attention in keeping Sight of the Chace, and for his steady and manly Courage when close engaged: The Chearfulness with which he put himself at the Head of the Boarders promised me the happiest Success, if that Event had been necessary, and which was only stopped by the Enemy's calling to surrender.

In this fhort Contest the highest Praise is due to my Officers and Ship's Company, and the Effect of their sleady Conduct is striking in the Number of

Killed and Wounded, of which a Lift is annexed.

I cannot fufficiently express my own good Fortune in not having lost an Officer or Man, which is to be attributed to the Enemy's firing at the Masts and Rigging.

Indefatigable, Falmouth, April 23, 1796.

S I R,

I Have most sensible Pleasure in desiring you to inform my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty of my Arrival at this Port, accompanied by the French National Frigate La Virginie, of 44 Guns, Eighteen and Nine Pounders, and 340 Men, commanded by Citizen Bergeret, Capitaine de Vaisseau, who failed from Brest singly, Four Days ago, to cruize off the Lizard in this favorite Frigate, which is considered the sinest Ship and fastest Sailer in the French Navy, and of the largest Dimensions, being 158 Feet long and 43 broad.

On Wedneiday Morning the 20th Instant, after I had sealed my Dispatches for their Lordships, layingto under the Lizard, with the Squadron waiting for the French Frigate La Unité, our Prize, to weather that Point, I observed a Ship coming in from the Sea, which in my Mind looked rather suspicious; and, on her not answering the private Signal, when she tacked from us, I immediately gave Chace to her, accompanied by the Amazon and La Concorde, (having by Signal directed Le Revolutionnaire to attend her Prize into Port, and the Argo to proceed to Plymouth.) The superior sailing of the Indefatigable gave me the Satisfaction of coming up with her, after a Chace of Fisteen Hours, and running One Hundred and Sixty-eight Miles. Fortunately the Wind prevented her from steering for Ushant, or she must have escaped.

A little past Midnight I commenced Action with the Enemy, which was closely continued, under a crowded Sail, for One Hour and Forty-five Minutes. The Enemy, who fought gallantly, was by this Time

much crippled, her Mizen-Mast and Main-Top-Mast being shot away; the Indefatigable was not much less disabled, having lost her Gast and Mizen-Top-Mast, the Main-Top-Sail was rendered useless by an unlucky Shot cutting both Leech-Ropes. In this Situation we passed the Enemy without the Power of avoiding it, having no After-Sail to back, and I had long discovered we had not only to combat a Ship of large Force, but that her Commander was completely Master of his Profession, in whose Presence I could not commit myself with Impunity, by throwing my Ship in the Wind, without submitting to be raked by him.

She had not at this Time flruck, and we kept c'ofe a-head of her, receiving new Braces to enable us to bring the Ship to, to renew the Attack.

At this Period La Concorde appeared in Sight, close under her Stern; and, upon the Enemy seeing her, she fired a Gun to Leeward, and struck her Light, as a Signal of Surrender.

Although a very few Minutes would have placed the Indefatigable again alongfide of her, I am confident the would not have furrendered without further Refistance, had not the Concorde fo timely come

up.

I am extremely indebted to Captains Hunt and Reynolds, for their very particular Attention in keeping after us during the Night on fo many Courfes, which nothing but the most delicate Obfervance of my Signals would have enabled them to do, their Distance aftern being so great.

Their Lordships are well aware how difficult it is in a Night Action with a flying Enemy, whose Rate of failing is little inferior to her Antagonist, to choose a Situation; and, when it is remembered how often this Ship changed her's in the Action, I need scarcely say what great Attention was paid to my Orders by every Officer under my Command.

To Lieutenants Pellowe, Thomson and Norway, my Thanks are above Expression. Lieutenant Williams of the Marines, and Mr. Bell the Master, who were immediately about my Person, rendered me the utmost essential Services.—The Ship's Company, who have been my faithful Companions during the War, and are endeared to me by their uniform Exertions, manifested on this Occasion nothing but Ardour and Zeal.

But above all other Pleasures I feel is that of informing their Lordships that I have lost neither Officer nor Man in the Contest. The Enemy suffered considerably, having 14 or 15 killed, 17 badly wounded, and 10 slightly: The Ship much shattered in her Hull, and Four Feet Water in her Hold from Shot Holes.

I have fent La Concorde to Plymouth with La Virginie, and shall proceed with the Amazon, who has lost her Head, for the same Place, To-morrow, in order to repair the Damages we have sustained in the Action.

Extract of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Murray. Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels in North America, to Evan Nepean, Esq; Secretary of the Admiralty.

ON the 11th Instant arrived L'Aurore, (French Corvette) Prize to His Majesty's Ship Cleopatra. She had only Fifty Men on Board when taken. Admiralty-Office, April 26, 1796.

Copy of a Letter from Commodore Sir John Borlase Warren, K. B. to Ewan Nepean, Esq; dated on Board His Majesty's Ship La Pomone, at Sea, the 8th of April, 1796.

I Beg you will inform their Lordships, that, on the 7th Instant, Le Bec du Raz bearing N. E. by E. feveral Sail were feen in the N. E. Quarter; and, upon the Signal for a general Chace being made, it was foon perceived that they were a small Convoy flanding through the Straits between the Saints and the Continent. As the Weather appeared settled and fine, I confidered that it was a proper Opportunity to obtain a Knowledge of the Passage, and continued working through, with the Tide in our Favor, after them; but the Wind falling when we were in the Bay on the other Side, I found it was impossible to cut off the Brig who escorted them, as she stood close in towards Camaret Point, at the Entrance of the Goulet going up to Brest, and among the Rocks. The Boats of the Squadron however captured the Vessels in the inclosed List, who are all laden with Corn and Flour. A Sloop belonging to the Convoy got off with the Corvette, which I understand was Le Voltigeur, of 16 Guns.

A Lift of Veffels belonging to the French Republic, captured by the Boats of the Squadron under the Command of Sir John Borlase Warren, K. B. within the Saints on the Coast of France, on the 716 of April, 1796.
